ASK INJUNCTION AGAINST THE RECALL

EXPENSE OF ELECTION IS BIG FACTOR

Petition Filed to Halt Terrill's Recall—Judge Calkins to Hold Hearing July 26th—Members Ku Klux Klan Are Named—Expense Declared Illegal Burden.

The Case in Brief
Recall movement against Sheriff Terrill is a Ku Klux Klan plot to secure control of the sheriff's office.
Recall is founded upon "misrepresentation and fraud," and enumerates "libelous and scandalous statements" used to induce people to sign the recall petitions.
That the 1921 grand jury report, Mr. J. W. Elden, foreman, makes no charges of malfeasance as persistently rumored.
That no specific charge is set forth in the recall petitions, permitting the sheriff to exercise his constitutional right of defense against charges.
That the county clerk failed to withdraw names from the petitions upon written requests.
That the county clerk failed to notify the plaintiff C. E. Terrill of the filing of the petition.
That the sheriff is willing to submit the question of recall to the voters at the general election, if specific charges are filed, and the required number of qualified electors secured in signature thereto.
That the attacked official does not desire to thwart the will of the majority by legal processes.
That the financial stability of Jackson county will be impaired by the holding of the special election, as set forth under the state constitution.

Application for an injunction against the county clerk to enjoin him from holding the special recall election against Sheriff Charles E. Terrill on Saturday, July 29th, was filed late Wednesday afternoon, and an order was signed by Judge F. M. Calkins, setting the date for the hearing next Wednesday morning.
The document, which is 11 typewritten pages in length, attacks the legality of the election, the validity of the expenditure of between \$3000 and \$4000 of county funds for the purpose, the refusal of the county clerk to withdraw names of signers of the recall petitions, when requested in writing to do so, and charges that the power behind the recall movement is the Ku Klux Klan.
The plaintiffs in the application are named as C. E. Terrill, W. C. Daley and all others who might desire to be joined as parties plaintiff. Daley is a pioneer farmer of the Eagle Point district and a heavy taxpayer.
The defendants as named, aside from the county clerk, are D. M. Lowe, recall candidate for the sheriff.
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BILL WHITE AND "HENRY AND ME" FALL OUT OVER RAILROAD STRIKE

COAL SITUATION IS DARK AGAIN NO MINES OPEN

In Spite of President's Order Little Prospect of Work in Near Future—Operators Claim They Can't Afford It—Lewis Talks.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, July 20.—Southern Ohio coal operators declared today that few if any mines would be re-opened in the Hocking Valley district until definite wage agreements are reached with the striking miners.

Walter D. McKinney, secretary of the Southern Ohio Coal exchange was still in Washington today but individual operators asserted that they could not afford to comply with President Harding's invitation to resume work under existing conditions.

BELLAIRE, Ohio, July 20.—Charles J. Albion, secretary of the Pittsburgh Vein Coal Operators association which includes operators producing more than one-third of all coal mined in Ohio, today stated that members of the association would not attempt to reopen the mines under "President Harding's protection plan."

HILLSBORO, Ill., July 20.—There is no prospect of an immediate resumption of coal production in Illinois. Rice Miller, president of the Illinois Coal Operators' association told the Associated Press on his arrival here today from Washington, where he attended the coal operators' conference.

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IRISH ARMY NEARS CORK PEOPLE FLEE

Rebels Dig Trenches and Mine Roads in Preparation for Attack in Force—Civilians Flee Limerick—Irregulars Hold Barracks in Considerable Force.

DUBLIN, July 20.—(By the Associated Press)—Most of the roads leading into Cork have been trenched and mined by the irregular army forces. Inside the city the preparations for the coming of the regular army include the smashing of the walls of houses for use as machine gun bastions, the heavy barricading of the streets and the occupation of all strategically situated buildings.
Limerick is entirely beleaguered and in response to a warning from the mayor, many of the civilians have fled the city. Every approach to the city is blocked, but the national troops are endeavoring to clear away the obstructions and the mines preparatory to an advance. Irregular troops hold the barracks in considerable force.

DUBLIN, July 20.—(By the Associated Press)—A statement issued today by the Irish provisional government says the national army forces are supreme in the whole of twelve counties.
"They still have opposition to deal with," it says, "in Donegal and Sligo and some harder work to do in Galway, Limerick and Tipperary, while Waterford, Cork and Mayo are in subjection to the irregulars. The term subjection is used advisedly, for in the counties the people are overwhelmingly in favor of the Anglo-Irish treaty and the irregulars rule there by no other authority than that of armed forces. The election results showed this clearly."

BELFAST, July 20.—The Telegraph's Belfast correspondent reports the destruction of the Port Marna bridge in Galway. The structure was one of the most important in that neighborhood and cost 100,000 pounds sterling.

GRAND JURY TO MEET MONDAY FED'L BUILDING

The special grand jury called to convene next Monday, July 24, will not be held at the courthouse at Jacksonville, but in the Federal building in this city, the subpoenas issued Wednesday by the county clerk, and served by the sheriff's office, so instructing the witnesses.
This will facilitate the proceedings, and permit of the handling of the large business expeditiously. The grand jury quarters at Jacksonville are somewhat cramped, and those in the federal building are large, modern, and fitted with plenty of desks, etc. The vexatious and delays of getting to and from the county seat will also be overcome. As a number of government officials and out of town people will be called to testify, they will find the new place of meeting handy, and obliterate the noon time delays.
No announcement has yet come from the state's attorney general's office relative to the naming of the assistant attorney general to handle the state interests, but it is reliably reported there will be two of them. The report that Assistant Attorney General Liljeqvist would not be assigned to the investigation came as a surprise, as he is well known locally, and is regarded as an able prosecutor, handling the most difficult of the Bank of Jacksonville cases.
The first batch of subpoenas for the quiz were all served Wednesday.

SIX KILLED WHEN TRAIN HITS AUTO

BUFFALO, N. Y., July 20.—Six persons were killed and one seriously injured this afternoon at Stevensville, six miles from Bridgeburg, Ont., when a Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo railroad train struck an automobile at a grade crossing.
The automobile bore a Colorado license.
The dead are reported to be Daniel Fritz, his wife, two sons and one daughter and the ten year old son of Mrs. James Baker of Stevensville. The Fritz family come from Colorado but their home city has not been learned.

HYLAN NOT TO RUN

NEW YORK, July 20.—Mayor Hylan announced today he would not be a candidate for governor this fall under any circumstances. His statement came after William Randolph Hearst had visited him at the city hall.

JUDGES UPHOLD OLCOTT'S VIEW REGISTRATION

SALEM, Ore., July 20.—Circuit Court Judges Bingham and Kelly this afternoon sustained the motion made by attorneys of Governor Olcott to strike out of the petition filed by R. R. Coster in behalf of Charles Hall asking for a recount of votes cast in the May republican primaries for governor; those petitions attacking the right of a voter to change his registration at the polls. The other five specifications in the Hall petition were sustained and July 25 set as the date for the filing of the Olcott answer to the Hall recount petition quoting section 4063, Oregon laws, which says that "it shall be the duty of all official registrars and election boards before whom such registration is made, to send both such cards (forms A and B) to the county clerk of the county in which such elector registers." Judge Bingham held that the law, by implication, contemplates a change of party affiliation at the polls, to the fact that an election board functions only on election day.

HOW ABOUT BANK OF JACKSONVILLE?

WASHINGTON, July 20.—A house bill to relieve 7,500 subscribers of Liberty loans through banks have failed finally was passed yesterday by the senate and now goes to conference after being passed by the house last November. The claims involved a total of \$250,000. Banks named in the bill include Santa Rosa, Cal., and the Farmers and Merchants' bank of Denmark, North Dakota.

California Spirit Comes Up Again

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.—California counts in its resources today 30,757,627 gallons of alcoholic liquor in United States government bonded warehouses.
Those figures were made public by United States Internal Revenue collector John S. McLaughlin in a recapitulation today of the liquor under his jurisdiction. During the fiscal year ending June 30, production of wine in California exceeded withdrawals by 2,877,480 gallons. The total amount of wine on hand at present is 19,750,060 gallons.

Pickwick Stage Drops 25 Feet Into Ravine, 11 Passengers Hurt

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.—Eleven passengers were injured, two seriously when a Pickwick auto stage running from Los Angeles to San Francisco, dropped 25 feet into a ravine at San Ardo, 200 miles south of here today. Defective steering gear caused the accident.

CLAIMS HENRY WOULD MAKE A TERRIFIC SUM

Senator Norris in Official Report Declares Ford's Profit Would Be Over 14 Billions Over Half of U. S. Cost of the World War.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—In a comprehensive report submitted to the senate today by Chairman Norris of the senate agricultural committee Henry Ford's officer for the purchase and lease of the government's war-initiated projects at Muscle Shoals, Alabama, is condemned in unusually strong language, while the Nebraska senator's bill, proposing development of the properties under a government-owned and controlled corporation, is described as the most wonderful plan that has ever been proposed in the history of the country.

On the question of the Ford bid the report says eight senators concur with the chairman. With reference to the government ownership proposal, the report gives the name of five senators who favor its passage by the senate for the solution of the Muscle Shoals problem. The Ford offer is dealt with in no uncertain terms.
"The country has been given to understand that Mr. Ford pays the government four per cent interest on its investment in the two dams," says the report. "Giving his corporation credit for its investment he will be paying the government less than three per cent."

"Assuming that a fair interest rate in the commercial world is six per cent, this would give his corporation during a hundred year period a total gift of cash of \$236,250,000 and if this money were compounded, Mr. Ford asks the government to compound that \$236,250,000, more than half of our total cost of the world war."

The Norris plan is described in part by the following excerpt by the committee's report:
"We believe the government is justified not only as a war measure but as a peace proposition, to expend all of the money that may be necessary for economical experiments with a view to cheapening fertilizer. Instead of turning over all the surplus power to any one individual or to one corporation to be used for his financial benefit, it would be supplied as electrical power to cities hundreds of miles distant from Muscle Shoals."

NEBRASKA'S GOVERNOR RACE LIKE OREGON'S; BRYAN'S BROTHER WINS

OMAHA, Neb., July 20.—(By the Associated Press).—Adam McMullen of Beatrice was leading Charles H. Randall of Randolph by 162 votes for the republican gubernatorial nomination when 1761 out of 1913 precincts in Nebraska had reported at 11 a. m. today.
The vote stood: McMullen 45,797; Randall 45,635; A. H. Byrum of Bloomington 11,664; G. W. Sterling of Omaha 8,411.
Charles W. Bryan of Lincoln was increasing the lead by which he apparently was nominated in Tuesday's primaries as democratic candidate

R. R. STRIKE TO BE OVER IN 2 WEEKS

So Says B. M. Jewell, President of Shop Craft Strikers—Claims Railroads Are Being Brought to Their Knees—More Trains Are Discontinued.

CHICAGO, July 20.—B. M. Jewell, president of the six federated shop crafts predicted today that the railroads will capitulate and settle the strike within two weeks.
"The strike is becoming more effective daily," he said, "and the roads will yield as soon as we bring them to their knees."
"The railroads know they cannot justify their fight against the legal adjustment board," Mr. Jewell said. "The transportation act provides for the establishment of 'adjustment boards,' and attempts have been made several times by board members to have regional adjustment bodies established, but without success."

BUFFALO, N. Y., July 20.—Police armed with riot guns and under orders to shoot to kill, rode the 71 street cars, which started out from the car barns today, following a warning by Mayor Schwab to striking car men that further rioting would have serious consequences.
State troopers were ordered here today.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., July 20.—Several passenger trains in the Milwaukee territory on the Chicago and Northwestern road were discontinued because of the coal situation, Charles Thompson, general agent announced.

MILWAUKEE, July 20.—One of a trio of men fired upon by F. H. Lee, deputy United States marshal on duty at the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul shops early this morning. Lee returned the fire and reported to Marshal Ed Benn that he believed he wounded one of the men in the shoulder. This is the first act of violence reported at the shops here, where more than 2,500 employees of two railroads are on strike.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Announcement was made today by Postmaster General Work that "any menace endangering the delivery of mails arising out of the strike of railway shopmen had passed."

Superintendent Vandervoort of the railway mail service at Seattle advised the postoffice department of the annulment of a total of ten trains in Washington and Montana.

Mrs. Montgomery Ward Faces Charge

CHICAGO, July 20.—Federal prosecution was a possibility today as a result of trips together to eastern cities, disclosed in the suit of Mrs. Katherine Gordon Thorne to annul a \$350,000 trust fund established by her for William "Billy" Camp.
Mrs. Thorne is the widow of William C. Thorne, late vice president of the Montgomery Ward and company.
