

WAR REPARATIONS TO BE SETTLED AT NEW CONFERENCE

PARIS, July 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—A meeting of the allied premiers to discuss the reparations problem is expected within the next ten or fifteen days, probably in some Italian city. This was indicated today in official circles where the reparations issue is occupying attention to the exclusion of all else.

The report of the committee on guarantees as a result of its prolonged investigation in Germany recently, probably will be formally presented to the reparations commission Thursday or Friday.

The commission will then carefully consider the whole question and its decision will be communicated to the various governments, probably by the end of next week.

The return to Paris today or tomorrow of Sir John Bradbury, from London, where he has been conferring with Premier Lloyd George and other British government officials is expected to give considerable impetus to the plan for a new reparations settlement involving the cancellation of the French debt to England and the reduction of the German indemnity to 50,000,000,000 gold marks.

MOB OF CHILDREN STORM CITY HALL

JUAREZ, July 19.—Mexico had today what is said to be the most unusual "mob" in its history when more than 100 small children voluntarily banded themselves together and stormed the city hall, asking for the city schools to be opened.

Groups of children on streets this morning assembled together until a crowd was formed. They had tried to go to school, but had found all doors closed, the teachers being out on a strike.

For two months there has been little money in the city treasury, so the teachers, some of them in dire needs, decided to quit teaching as a means to force city and state officials to pay.

FEDERAL PROBE OF SEA TRAGEDY NEAR, HEROISM SHOWN

SEATTLE, July 19.—Investigation has been started into the sinking of the steam schooner Henry T. Scott off Neah Bay in the Strait of Juan de Fuca early Sunday in which four lives were lost, it was announced at the local offices of the United States steamboat inspection service today.

The Scott, bound for Seattle from San Francisco was struck during a dense fog by the freight steamer Harry Luckenbach and sank within a few minutes. The Luckenbach escaped serious damage and proceeded to Seattle with survivors of the wreck.

According to survivors signals of the Luckenbach could be heard for some time before the accident, but they seemed to come "from all directions," and when the ship was finally discerned, although both vessels went full speed astern, it was too late to avoid the crash.

T. W. C. Spencer, chief engineer of the Scott was drowned as he stood at his post of duty in the engine room, refusing to leave even when it appeared there was no chance for the vessel to remain afloat.

N. R. Nilson of San Francisco, third assistant engineer, rushed back to a stateroom for money he had left there and was not seen again. E. Logan, oiler, and L. Jacobson, able seaman, went down with the ship.

The Scott's two passengers, Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Kilpatrick of San Francisco, escaped death by a miracle when they clung to a hatch that drifted between them.

Boats from the Luckenbach rescued the 21 surviving members of the Scott's crew who clung to the wreckage.

CONVICTS DISOBEY, 1 DEAD, FIVE HURT

SANTA FE, N. M., July 10.—Martin Boldonado, a convict in the state penitentiary here was killed and five other prisoners were slightly wounded today when eight guards stationed in towers along the walls opened fire on a mob of convicts after they had refused to enter the cell house. Boldonado sentenced for six years for bigamy, was shot through the back and died within a few minutes.

Alaska Aviator Missing
DAWSON, Y. T., July 20.—Searching parties from Eagle and Fairbanks, Alaska, were scouring the thickly wooded country between the two communities today for trace of Clarence O. Prest, the aviator who started from Eagle Sunday morning for Fairbanks. The usual time for such a trip is three hours but Prest has not been heard from since he hopped off.

First Woman Judge Seeks Place on Ohio Supreme Court

CLEVELAND, O., July 20.—And now a woman comes forward, knocks at the portals of Ohio's highest court and asks the men now occupying that august bench to draw their robes closer about them and make room for the first representative of the sex that has begun to taste the fruits of complete emancipation and participation in the affairs of government.

This woman is Judge Florence E. Allen, of the common pleas court of Cuyahoga county, with much creditable work upon the bench to her credit. Miss Allen, however, is not making her campaign upon the basis of sex, but on merit, and while she expects the almost solid support of Ohio women she counts also upon receiving the votes of thousands of men. Upon her committee appear the names of former Judge Frederick A. Henry, of the appellate court, and William L. David, one of the leaders of the Cleveland bar.

"I believe it is just as important that moral standards exist and actively function in public as in private life. The question we should ask is not whether the people concerned in any proposed transaction are rich or poor, powerful or weak, or whether personal animus exists, but whether the thing proposed is right. The test of action in government on all basic matters should be a moral test."

Elaborates Platform Planks
Thus Judge Allen, first and only woman common pleas judge in the United States, elaborated one of the "planks" in the platform upon which she will seek the support of Ohio voters this fall.

Six things, Miss Allen said, constituted her creed for the guidance of public officials. These are:

1. Law enforcement.
2. Justice for all.
3. Business methods applied to the courts.

"I believe," she continued, "whatever laws we have should be enforced, whether these laws are good or bad. If a law is defective or inadequate, then it ought to be enforced in order that its defects may become apparent. I am against lax enforcement, as it breeds contempt for the law."

Would Disregard Riches
"Justice should be administered without regard to personality or condition of the parties before the court, but wholly upon merit. It ought not to make any difference whether the parties concerned are rich or poor, black or white. No other consideration should have weight with the court but the merits of the case."

"I believe that business methods should be applied to the business of the courts. By this I mean that we should have efficient business administration in our court system. The report of the Cleveland Foundation survey, which was approved in its main findings by the Cleveland Bar association, shows that efficient business methods in many instances are not followed in our administration of justice. Steps should be taken at once to the end that our courts may be placed upon a firm foundation, calculated to inspire the respect of all."

"I believe in respect for law. Unless the community does have respect for the law we cannot have law enforcement, nor can we protect individual rights through the law. The thing which differentiates us from Russia is the orderly adjustment of controversies through established tribunals. Unless respect for law and order and the courts exists we cannot administer justice properly."

"One reason why injustice is sometimes done through our courts is because of our lack of respect for law and order and our unwillingness to cooperate in the enforcement of the law."

CONSCIENCE HURTS, MAN RETURNS SAW

WENATCHEE, Wash., July 10.—Bothered by a guilty conscience, a former employee of F. J. Cummings, a Riverside, Wash., merchant, in a letter to his former employer, admits the theft of a hand saw several years ago. The letter reads as follows:

"Two years ago while in your employ, I took from your store a 26-inch diamond edge hand saw and didn't pay for it. I am now trying to find complete salvation in the Lord and this hand saw is standing in my way, so I am cheerfully making restitution. I hereby admit my wrong and humbly beg your pardon and am enclosing my check for the amount of the price of the saw."

WENATCHEE'S AD PLAN HAS HARD SLEDDING

WENATCHEE, Wash., July 19.—The campaign to sign contracts for the "eat Wenatchee apples" advertising plan, will come to a close Saturday. By that date sufficient acreage must be obtained or else it will be impossible to go ahead with the plan this year.

CALIFORNIA TO START FOOTBALL PRACTICE SOON

BERKELEY, Cal., July 20.—Football days will soon reappear on the University of California athletic calendar here, Coach Andy Smith having announced that aspirants for the varsity will start practicing about the middle of August.

Members of the varsity team which has won the Pacific Coast conference championship for two years, will not be allowed, under conference rules, to start team practice until September 15.

California expects a harder fight this year than it has had for the past two years during which its eleven moved down team after team and went through two seasons undefeated.

Although Coach Smith expects 18 veterans back, he must practically rebuild his line, which from tackle to tackle, was lost through graduation. Smith's ends will be particularly well taken care of, "Brick" Muller, "Brodie" Stephens and Bob Berkeley, all stars, being expected back. Charley Erb, quarterback, will captain the team.

MORE CRACK BALL PLAYERS NOW THAN GENERATION AGO

NEW YORK, July 20.—There are more than a thousand more ball players than ever before—more good ones in proportion to the poor ones—and it requires more of an all-around better man to break in and stick in, big leagues than it did during the departed "immortal" generation ago.

This is the studied opinion of Tyrus Cobb, one of the greatest players of all time, who stands today on the threshold of the cloister inhabited by half a dozen managers who have been handed consistently losing, down-hearted teams, rejuvenated them and made sturdy, classy pennant contenders out of their new combinations.

Cobb always has been an individual star. He holds the American league record for the highest batting average, .420; the highest life time average, now is fighting it out with George Sisler for this year's title.

Late in 1920 Cobb succeeded Hugh Johnson as manager of the second division Tigers. He retained the nucleus of a club and now has an aggregation within calling distance of first place.

CHICAGO, July 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—Cleveland, separated by only six and a half games from the league-leading St. Louis club as the result of a winning streak of ten games, today loomed as a fifth entrant in the already spectacular American league pennant hunt.

Coveleskie twirled the Indians to their tenth straight victory over Washington, 4 to 1.

All five contenders were bunched a trifle closer as a result of the Browns' defeat at the hands of Philadelphia and the eighth victory of Ty Cobb's Tigers over the Yankees, 5 to 1, while the Chicago White Sox continued their winning drive by trouncing Boston 8 to 0.

The Athletics owe their 5 to 3 victory over the league-leaders to the terrific hitting of Tillie Walker, who crashed out two homers and took the American league clubbing lead from Ken Williams with a total of 23 four-base blows.

Rogers Hornsby, whose heavy hitting has been the main-spring in the drive that has carried the St. Louis Cardinals within half a game of the Giants, pulled victory out of the fire for Riskey's men with a homer in the ninth that scored three runs and beat the Boston Braves, 7 to 6.

Nehf's pitching enabled the Giants to defeat Cincinnati in the first game of the series, 5 to 2; Wilbur Cooper of the Pirates shut out Philadelphia, 2 to 0 and Brooklyn lost to Chicago 8 to 6 after getting away to an early lead.
