

15-YR.-OLD GIRL KILLS MARRIED MAN IN GROVE

MONTGOMERY, Ala., July 22.—Indications were today that Mildred Brewer, 15-year-old girl, alleged self-confessed slayer of Alexander Portia McKelthen, 36 and married, in a lonely grove on the Haynesville road near here Thursday would be tried in juvenile court.

The body of McKelthen, with a bullet wound in his head, was found after the girl had been brought back to the city from the grove where she said she met the man. A pistol was found near the body, claimed to be the property of McKelthen, with one cartridge discharged.

The girl, when she appeared at police headquarters where she was accompanied by an officer who had started to the scene of the shooting and met her on the way to the city to give herself up, turned in a pistol of large caliber, said to be her own.

Police officials declared the girl admitted killing McKelthen after he had been driven to the lonely thicket by the roadside by a negro employed by him. The motive has not been established.

The girl's mother, Mrs. Miriam Brewer-Brown-Richardson, studied law and was admitted to the bar some years ago and is prominent in club and civic work in the community.

EAST COAST IS GETTING COAL FROM ENGLAND

LONDON, July 22.—(By Associated Press). The demand for ships to convey coal to America is increasing daily. Many steamers have been loaded in the United Kingdom this week for sailings to the various American ports, the freight rate being from eight to ten shillings a ton.

PHILADELPHIA, July 22.—Several cargoes of British coal purchased by local public utility corporations will arrive here within a fortnight, it became known today. Approximately 25,000 tons was purchased a week ago in Wales and southern England by the Philadelphia Electric company while other public utility companies placed large orders at the same time.

WASHINGTON, July 22.—In an effort to bring about resumption of mining operations in the anthracite coal fields, a conference in which John L. Lewis, head of the United Mine Workers, is expected to participate will be held Monday, either in Scranton, Pa., or New York, John F. 22 YEARS IN HOUSE OF COMMONS AND MADE NO SPEECH

LONDON, July 22.—Attention, members of the congress of the United States!

This is the tale of a man from whose book many members of the congress of the United States might take a leaf and bring joy to the American public. John Hope has been a member of the British house of commons for twenty-two years and has not yet made his maiden speech.

Hope is a regular attendant at the house of commons and has the rare record of having won out in seven contested elections, in which he has fought every political party.

"Why don't I speak in the house?" echoed Hope when he was questioned. "Well, I have found that I can do more by not talking."

"When I entered the house first of all I had no idea of never making a speech."

"But time went on, and the maiden speech was still undelivered—although I have been tempted to do it more than once, and friends have urged me to break the record—and now I am afraid it will never be delivered."

Hope's reluctance to speak is not because of any inability to do so, for he can orate effectively. He is not shy. When he wants anything he goes directly to the responsible minister of the cabinet, and generally gets what he wants, because he is one man who has never attempted to browbeat the cabinet members across the chambers of the house of commons.

Hope bids fair to keep his word and be the one speechless member of the house of commons, and if he does so he will take away the record created by William Gerard Hamilton, who in the eighteenth century gained for himself the name of "Single Speech Hamilton," because he is supposed to have never made but one speech in commons.

GERMANY INVITED BY LEAGUE OF NATIONS

LONDON, July 22.—(By Associated Press). The council of the League of Nations today decided to invite Germany to appoint a member of the league's health commission.

Appreciation was expressed for the gift of \$25,000 by the American Red Cross for control of epidemics.

The proceedings were enlivened when M. Lang Tsai-Fou, Chinese delegate made a spirited protest against the opium committee's report which stated that China was cultivating large areas of opium poppies. The report inferred that China had not lived up to the treaty obligations.

BENNY LEONARD WILL MEET EVER HAMMER

CHICAGO, July 22.—Benny Leonard, the lightweight champion today was matched to meet Ever Hammer of Chicago in a ten round contest in Floyd Fitzsimmons' new arena at Michigan City, Ind., on the afternoon of August 5. The state convention of Elks will be held there on that date. Leonard defeated Rocky Kansas, the Buffalo challenger, in the same arena on July 4th.

KERENSKY WRITING STARTLING HISTORY RUSS REVOLUTION

LONDON, July 22.—Startling revelations respecting the dethronement and death of former Emperor Nicholas are promised by Alexander Kerensky, one time president of the Russian Republic, who has been quietly writing his memoirs in a London flat. Kerensky's plan was to spirit the emperor out of Russia to a neutral European country or to the United States, but this, he contends, was frustrated by Great Britain.

The book of the former Russian dictator will begin with the inception of the war and cover the final collapse of the empire. It will explain not only the causes of the Russian overthrow, but the failure of Kerensky's own government.

The writer declares that if the allies had been willing to let Russia remain passive for a period, they could have kept her as a valuable ally. The book will point out that the entente insisted on Russia displaying energy on the front while in the throes of a revolution at home.

His own overthrow Kerensky attributes to simultaneous pressure from the two extreme parties, the royalists on the right and the bolsheviks on the left, aided by the hostility of the army.
