

LEGION STARTS DRUM FIRE ON DOCTOR SAWYER

Colonel Sprague, Chairman of American Legion's Rehabilitation Committee, Asks the President's Physician to Stand Aside.

CHICAGO, July 25.—(By Associated Press.) Colonel A. A. Sprague, chairman of the American Legion's national rehabilitation committee, in a letter to Brigadier General Charles E. Sawyer, personal physician to President Harding and chief co-ordinator of the federal board of hospitalization made public today, charged General Sawyer is standing in the way of proper care for wounded and shell shocked veterans, and holding up hospital plans voted by congress.

"I recognize the fact," Colonel Sprague wrote to the president's physician, "that before becoming chief co-ordinator of the federal board of hospitalization you had no contact with the men and women who were serving in the army and navy during the war and experience either in the field, or in government service that would give you a chance to really know how men feel who lose their nerve, their health and their minds in devotion to duty, or how their families look upon these men who went out in the strength of their youth to invest life in their nation's service."

Appealing to General Sawyer to "stand aside," Colonel Sprague said "over 4500 mental cases are still confined in contract institutions and that of the remaining 4715 victims of mental disorders only 3500 are in government institutions, devoted entirely to their care."

The controversy between General Sawyer and the legion official is the outgrowth of a letter written by the general July 12 to Colonel Sprague, dealing with the legion's demands for hospital care for the wounded, under the Langley appropriation bill.

officer and agent of the clan, handling money a bond premium, while, in fact, no bonds are in existence. Mr. Wade charged further that "the Klan purchased 250 acres of land in Fulton county for \$150,000 and sold the most valuable part of it to an organization in which Clarke is the dominant stockholder for \$35,000, thereby placing upon the Klan the burden of paying \$115,000 for the less valuable portion."

Concluding, Mr. Wade declares that Mrs. Tyler remains at the head of the propagation department, and that she and Clarke brought the injunction suit "not for the good of the order, but to suppress the truth and perpetuate themselves in power."

will begin to function within 48 hours.

Secretary Hoover in making this announcement today said ratification of the emergency plan for dissolution of unfair prices by the operators' association was expected within 48 hours, but if co-operation was withheld in any district the government would proceed to appoint the necessary local committees.

The emergency coal control plan, Mr. Hoover stated, is intended to apply to all coal produced whether in the non-union or union fields and it was indicated that service orders by the inter-state commerce commission providing for priorities in the allocation of coal cars may be expected almost immediately.

As regards the coal strike itself, Mr. Hoover declared the government had exhausted every means toward a settlement that it had offered arbitration which had been rejected and the matter to be taken care of now was the matter of the distribution of coal as produced. The secretary emphasized the intention of the government to prevent advancing coal prices and declared that under the emergency program no freight fare would be allocated to those who try to "rob the public."

Sharo advances in prices have been reported to the commerce department from some localities, he said, reaching as high as \$13.50 a ton in Western Kentucky.

As to small irregularities and technicalities of law I felt they should be passed upon by the courts and not by me.

I have endeavored to let no personal elements enter into my actions, but to carry the matter through according to law I have seen it, and if I have erred the court will straighten the matter out.

Water Damage Great

The damage to the apartment building by fire was not as great as the damage caused by water and the fire damage being to the north side of the building and to the roof and third floor on the north side. The flames gutted the attic of the building however and burned through the roof in several spots. A large amount of replastering will be necessary.

The building is in the restricted fire area and whether or not the city authorities will permit rebuilding is not yet known. Mayor C. E. Gates said this noon that he had not yet inspected the damage, but that if it was damaged 50 per cent or more of its value it could not, under the law, be repaired.

Families Homeless

Between 1 and 20 families were deprived of a home by the fire and apartments or houses in the city are practically unobtainable at the present time as all of the few which were for rent were snapped up by vacators of the apartments this morning. One man after hunting vainly for a house all morning ran across one with a "For Rent" sign on it. He hurriedly gathered together his belongings, went to the house, opened the door and threw them inside, determined to beat the other fellow to it if possible.

James Slorah, proprietor of the laundry, states that he is ordering new machinery and will rebuild at once, and that in the meantime he will arrange to have the work of his patrons done by the Medford Domestic Laundry. Due to the large loss entailed by him and the cost of rebuilding his establishment, he announces that he will be unable to stand any losses entailed by patrons with property in his laundry at the time of the fire.

CAUGHT TERRILL SMOKING CIGARET KINGSBURY SPGS.

Another series of affidavits, attacking Sheriff Charles E. Terrill, and accusing him of being opposed to the prohibition law enforcement were scattered about the city this afternoon by boys.

The circular is headed, "Does not Believe in Enforcement," and is signed in a general way, "Authorized By the General Committee, W. D. Hughes, chairman." What "the general committee" is, is not stated. Mr. Hughes is the proprietor of a vulcanizing and repair shop on Grape street, and, in the application for an injunction against the recall to be heard tomorrow morning in the circuit court, he is alleged to be a member of the Ku Klux Klan.

The opening affidavit is by J. A. Hemstreet, who subscribes and swears before F. C. Edmeades as notary public, "that while sitting in the police station on or about the first of June, 1921, in conversation with Mr. Terrill about the enforcement of the prohibition law, Mr. Terrill remarked to me that he did not believe in the enforcement of the prohibition law, as the prohibition law was not popular with the people."

Hemstreet was a member of the local police force at the time, and was ousted from his position, as a result of a hubbub arising from the Bulfinch revival meetings, and it is generally known that Hemstreet was considerably put out by his forced retirement from office.

Praise for Prohibition Officer Sandifer, and his "savings" to the county are alleged, also in the circular.

Mrs. G. Jordan, 203 East Main street, Ashland, alleges that while attending a dance at Kingsbury Springs December 3, 1921, "that I did smell liquor on said C. E. Terrill's breath."

Edward Coovling, 176 Mountain avenue, Ashland, swears that at the same place, and time as above, that "said C. E. Terrill was smoking cigarettes, and smelled strongly of liquor."

Mrs. Coovling submits a substantiating affidavit.

It is hinted in the circular that there will be more affidavits forthcoming between now and Saturday.

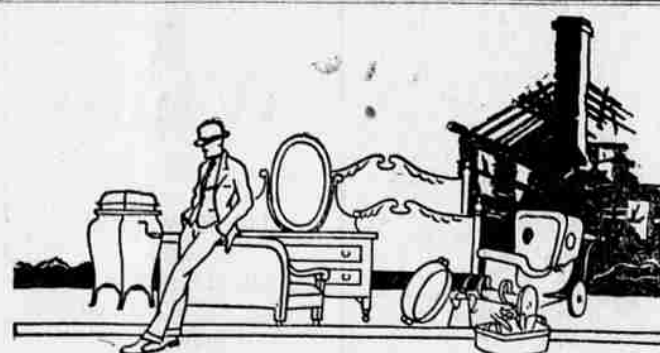

Mrs. Helen S. Gale called as a witness is reputed to have testified relative to an alibi, offered early the Saturday morning following the hanging, and Mr. and Mrs. Howard A. Hill, called as witnesses, are supposed to have offered evidence along the same lines.

Kleagle Is Called

Still other witnesses scheduled for appearance today were H. E. Griffiths, Kleagle of the local Klan realm, and his associate with the same official capacity, John J. Hoogstraet, who was out of the city today, but would respond to the subpoena on return. George A. Coddling, former district attorney, had a subpoena issued for his appearance, but it was not served until after he had left for the north to attend the annual state convention of the American Legion. Mr. Coddling was not cognizant of the existence of the summons, it being placed in the hands of Sheriff Terrill too late for service.

Miss Lorain Stolz, whose questioning by the department of justice agents, created something of a local furor, and aroused the ire of Dr. Sawyer, Klan lecturer, when he delivered an address at the Page theater, was also a witness Tuesday afternoon. Miss Margaret Dailey told her story also, their testimony, it is said, having to do, with schoolyard chatter, forecasting the Hale episode, a day or two in advance of its actual happening. Pat H. Dailey, deputy state game warden, was also called as a witness, presumably to substantiate his daughter's testimony.

No Immunity Promised

Regarding the report that in some quarters "immunity" had been sought, Assistant Attorney General Liljeqvist said Monday night, he had "heard nothing about it," and, stated further, "nobody needs an immunity bath to get at the whole truth, we can get it without it. Its all very interesting, if I could tell you." The assistant attorney general also announced that "no public statements would be issued relative to the investigation."

It is expected that another day will be devoted to the hearing of testimony in the Hale case, but the subpoenas are kept secret till served.

Following the Hale case, the grand jury will delve into the Henry Johnson affair. Johnson is a resident of Jacksonville, and his case, is said to have more ramifications than the present one, its inception being novel and unique and somewhat comic, if taken in a less serious light.

It is also rumored that the grand jury, before its sessions are concluded, will probe a closely guarded local happening, of which little has been divulged.
