

VISION OF FAIR PROMOTERS WILL BECOME REALITY IN SEPTEMBER EXPECT 40,000 PEOPLE TO ATTEND

The vision of those who have looked forward to the day when southern Oregon and northern California might participate in displaying their products, viewing educational exhibits of the home, school, shop, machinery and up-to-date appliances and enjoying a real fair, will become a reality this fall with the 1922 Jackson County Fair, September 13 to 16 inclusive.

Decision was made several years ago to discontinue the Jackson county fair with such time as the purchase of permanent grounds, erection of adequate buildings and other facilities would permit displays and provide accommodations worthy of the district tributary to the enterprise. On the beautiful tract of land one mile south of Medford which was purchased for use as a fair grounds there is now nearing completion probably as fine an aggregation of county fair buildings as any county in the northwest possesses.

To accommodate an estimated attendance of 40,000 for the four days of the fair a modern automobile and pedestrian main entrance building has been constructed which fronts directly upon the Pacific highway. This building which conforms to up-to-date practice will do away with all congestion usually found at fair ground entrances and in addition is a very slight addition to the other building units.

All the exhibition buildings and grandstands are built upon the multi-plan, permitting enlargement as required. The livestock building which provides 75 by 75 feet of floor space, and the agricultural and horticultural palace, which measures 75 by 105 feet are well ventilated and lighted and these buildings together with the women's building, which comprises three large rooms, conform to the best practice in county fair equipment and latest architecture. The grandstand which faces the mile-and-one-eighth track will have a capacity of over 1000 people. This structure is also capable of enlargement, the first unit measuring 42 by 144 feet.

In addition to the permanent buildings mentioned there will be several temporary display pavilions erected for use this year. The poultry, rabbits and pet stock will be exhibited near the main livestock building as will also the hogs, sheep and goats.

"Auto row" will this year occupy a temporary exhibition floor 60 by 150 feet and this display promises to be one of the most complete ever attempted in this territory. The merchants' industrial building as at present contemplated will provide a display space 60 by 132 feet, which will be supplanted later by a permanent structure.

Approximately \$5000 will be expended in premium money, the list including exhibitions of every nature interesting to the farmer, the housewife and the "ultimate consumer." The premium list will be ready for distribution about August 1st.

Prize money to be hung up during the four days racing will aggregate \$5000 to be divided among winners in the speed contests. Motorcycle, speed wagon, Ford bug and free-for-all races are included in the program with trotting, running and relay races. The race track is designed on the "super-elevation" principle, extreme turns being banked over four feet and when in condition is capable of holding a machine doing 80 to 90 miles per hour.

Within the race track an aviation field is provided which, according to the pilots who used the field July 3rd, is one of the best on the coast owing to the light top soil and absence of clouds and bumps.

Ample auto parking space has been considered in laying out the grounds and under systematized parking visitors will be able to come and go at will in their machines without congestion delays.

No gambling devices will be permitted among the amusement concessions, the directors being unanimous on this feature. Riding devices and other carnival paraphernalia will be provided for the children and a fine dance pavilion for the grown-ups.

Livestock entries, which will be one of the main features of the fair already have reached proportions which ensure a successful exhibition.

The Jackson county fair will draw from an immense territory, there being no other attraction on a similar scale between Salem on the north and Sacramento on the south. It is believed that eventually this annual exposition will equal the Spokane Inter-State fair which draws from eastern Washington, northern Idaho and western Montana.

LEONARD TO FACE CRISIS OF CAREER IN TENDLER MATCH

JERSEY CITY, N. J., July 27.—The crisis of his career will be faced by Benny Leonard in the arena here tonight when he crawls through the ropes to defend the ownership of his crown against the hard-hitting aggressive Mr. Lew Tandler.

Tandler, the younger of the two maulers by three years, is looked upon as the logical successor to the throne of lightweightdom. Without doubt he is the toughest opponent now seeking to have Leonard abdicate from his zardom over the division.

Benny, however, is a bone-such champion. He has clung tenaciously to what he claims is his and had met practically all challengers who have disputed his right to continue in public acclaim as the lightweight champion of the world.

Forty thousand fight enthusiasts are expected to jam the stadium tonight. The advance seat sale according to Promoter Tex Rickard, has been heavier than was anticipated.

In points of physique Leonard and Tandler are almost evenly matched. Tandler, if either, has a slight advantage as they stack up in ring regalia.

NEW YORK, July 27.—(By the Associated Press)—The second "battle of the century" at Boyle's Thirty Acres in Jersey City—this time with the lightweight championship at stake—will take place tonight when Benny Leonard defends his title against Lew Tandler, Philadelphia, challenger in a twelve-round contest. Both boxers pronounced themselves fit and confident on the eve of the bout, perhaps unparalleled in interest in the history of the lightweight ranks and rivaling as a fistie attraction the memorable encounter a year ago on the same battleground when Jack Dempsey successfully defended his heavyweight crown against Georges Carpentier.

Old timers recalled the Joe Gans-Battling Nelson battle at Goldfield some years ago and contrasted it with tonight's bout.

Leonard finished his training with the flat declaration that he would "win by a knockout—within seven rounds."

Tandler was no less confident of his ability to land a decisive blow. Both men weighed in at or under the lightweight limit, 135 pounds, at two o'clock this afternoon and have posted forfeits of \$15,000 as guarantees. Under the New Jersey boxing laws no decision can be given if the bout goes the limit. Thus Tandler's only chance to displace Leonard as champion is by scoring a knockout or by a foul.

Arrangements have been made to handle the largest throng that ever attended a lightweight championship contest. Tex Rickard estimated the attendance at 75,000 and the gate receipts at between \$400,000 and \$500,000.

The bout is insured against rain and in addition Rickard insured each of the principals for \$25,000 against accident or inability to perform.

Two Homers in One Game.
CHICAGO, July 27.—(By the Associated Press)—Adolph Rettig, Connie Mack's sand lot sensation who made his major league debut a week ago by beating the Browns, lost to Cleveland, 2 to 0, although holding the Indians to four hits while the Athletics gathered seven off Uhl.

Dutch Beuther, Brooklyn ace, returned to form after losing three straight and blanked Pittsburgh, 7 to 0, besides driving in two of his team's runs.

Seven home runs punctuated Philadelphia's double victory over Cincinnati, 12 to 7 and 5 to 4. Lebourveau, a pinch hitter, tied the last game in the ninth by hitting a homer with one on and Fletcher won the contest in the thirteenth with another circuit clot.

Three former Yanks, Jack Quinn, Johnny Mitchell and Elmer Miller, helped Boston defeat the Chicago White Sox, 3 to 1. Miller drove out two home runs and Mitchell scored the other tally after tripling.

Gharriy's homer in the ninth gave Washington a 5 to 4 win over Detroit. Ty Cobb increased his lead in the individual batting race to ten points by registering three safe blows, while Siler went hitless.

A. MITCHELL PALMER ENDORSES SCHEME TO SELL ALIEN PROPERTY

WASHINGTON, July 27.—The Underwood bill to create an American commission to adjudicate American war claims against Germany and Austria and to pay such claims out of seized enemy alien property was endorsed by A. Mitchell Palmer, former attorney general, and alien property custodian today before a senate judiciary sub-committee.

Mr. Palmer and another former alien property custodian, Francis P. Garvan, head of the Chemical foundation and the present alien property custodian, Thomas W. Miller, appeared before the sub-committee today at the opening of hearings on the bill.

"The Underwood bill," Mr. Palmer declared, "is clearly defensible and an entirely proper method under the treaties and the trading with the enemy act in disposing of this enemy property, or passing upon, adjudicating and paying meritorious claims of American citizens and of the United States government."

Chairman Cummins of the sub-committee announced in opening the hearings that they would be limited to the propositions—creation of a claims commission and disposition of the seized enemy property.

"We are not going into any investigation of the former or present alien property custodians," said Chairman Cummins.

Mr. Palmer expressed the opinion that under the treaty of Versailles and what he termed the "separate treaty of peace with Germany," all American rights were retained including the rights to use seized property to pay American claims.

MORE WAR VETERANS ASSAIL DR. SAWYER

CINCINNATI, July 27.—Declaring that Brigadier General Charles E. Sawyer's connection with the government hospitalization program for men wounded and disabled in the world war had been "meddlesome, troublesome and void of any beneficial results whatsoever," Captain C. Hamilton Cook, Buffalo, national commander of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War, in a statement today said the organization which he heads, comprising more than 90,000 disabled men, "would leave no stone unturned until General Sawyer has been removed from the position he holds."

Boy Drowned Puget Sound
SEATTLE, July 27.—Jack Wreglesworth, 13, son of Mrs. Florence Wreglesworth of this city was drowned in Puget Sound when he fell from the deck of the passenger steamer Volante while enroute from Camp Parson, Hood's canal.

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YANKEES ONLY ONE GAME AND A HALF BEHIND ST. LOUIS

ST. LOUIS, July 27.—Confident that their batting assault yesterday on four local pitchers had restored the early season punch, the New York Yankees today were inspired with renewed hope of reducing the Browns' lead of one and one-half games and thus gaining the leading position of the league tomorrow. Each team has thus far won one of the games of this important series.

Should the Yankees take the remaining two, the New York team will remain the lead by half a game. Should the teams break even the locals will retain their original lead of one and one-half games.

The apparent return of Babe Ruth, who slammed out two homers yesterday, to last year's home run slugging propensities has apparently strengthened the hope of the visitors of seeing the mighty slugger playing an important part in the remaining two games.

The Browns also have regained their heavy hitting stride, and with both teams going at their best, it appears the pitchers of both teams are facing any thing but easy work.
