

SHERIFF FACES ACCUSERS AT ASHLAND HALL

County Official Explains His
Warning to Prowlers About
Jail at Night—Smoked First
Cigarette On 45th Birthday
—Mud Slinging Scored.

Charlie Terrill's side of the recall election squabble was told to citizens of Ashland at the armory last night. A pretty close to 500 people were present to hear the addresses, and the speakers minced no words in laying the issues before the audience. The sheriff himself was present, and answered questions, before, after, and during the meeting. W. M. Briggs, a pioneer lawyer of Ashland presided. He asked that all study and consider what they heard before they voted, and "to be fair."

Mr. Briggs also dwelt upon the nose accuracy of affidavit makers. He said he came in contact with the breath of a well known Ashland resident a day or so ago, and accused him of imbibing moonshine. The citizen maintained it was "Whistle" and proved it.

Judge W. M. Colvig was the first speaker of the evening. He declared that Sheriff Terrill "had been as efficient a sheriff as any ever elected in Jackson county," and backed his words with the declaration that he knew them all, for he had lived here 70 years, or so. He pointed out that the sheriff had handled over a million dollars in the last year, but this was overlooked, because of the vigor of his conduct of his office was read, and what the county was paying \$3,000 a year for doing nothing but trying to catch liquor violators. He urged Ashland voters to be fair.

Gordon Voorhies spoke next. He said that all the Ku Klux Klan had done was to divide the people of the Rogue River valley into two factions, and that the present bitterness and discussion was driving away prospective investors and settlers.

Dry Law Is Enforced
Attorney Porter J. Neff gave a short talk, in which he declared that "it was time for the voters to sit down on agitators," and "that the liquor laws were nowhere so drastically enforced as here." He charged that the county court was making a "goat" out of the sheriff, and that he was "not getting a fair deal from them. I honestly believe."

Judge C. B. Watson in a short address said "that the Ministerial association and the W. C. T. U. was being made a catapaw of the Ku Klux Klan, in an effort to elect one of their own number to the sheriff's office." He said the people would wake up soon to find out they had been "suckers."

Attorney B. F. Lindsas was the closing speaker. He charged that the recall election was a Ku Klux Klan plot, and that it was decided upon when the sheriff refused to join the organization. He gave the details of Elmer Simonds case, and said "that when D. M. Lowe

signed Simonds' bond, it was the first time on record that a reform candidate helped to get a bootlegger out of jail."

Sheriff Terrill then answered questions. A query was offered in regard to the threat "to shoot E. A. Fleming." Fleming is one of the Simonds bondsmen, and active in the affair. The sheriff explained that the "courthouse yard was a public place, but he would have to quit prowling around nights, peering into the jail windows, as he was liable to get hurt, as I didn't want a jail break on my hands."

Admits Smoked Cigarette
A facetious member of the audience asked, "What do you mean by smoking cigarettes at Kingsbury Springs?"

Sheriff Terrill admitted the charge, but explained that he was 45 years old before he committed the offense. He also said it helped his catarrh.

An elderly gentleman in the front row arose and wanted to know why the sheriff had refused to get up when a woman with a baby in her arms stood. The sheriff was unable to remember the incident.

It was also stated that one of the makers of the "I smelled booze" affidavits had been arrested for speeding, before his sense of smell became so acute.

The audience was composed entirely of Ashland voters with the exception of 14 Medford people, which included the orators and the sheriff. E. J. Kaiser of Ashland, said "It is a good crowd for this town."

GRAND JURY ISSUES INVITE

Wednesday, April 12, the outstanding facts in the case being as follows, and as reported at the time:

Sunday night's developments began with Alec Norris, his son-in-law, Mr. Gooding, garage man; Paul York, aged 17 years, and Henry Johnson, aged 22 years, all of Jacksonville, leaving that city at 5 p. m. in an auto truck to get some machinery at Ashland. They did not get the machinery and were on their way home when near the Voorhies crossing their lights went out and a short time later two cars in which were seven masked men approached them and held them up at the point of revolvers. The men all wore flimsy veils with eyeholes cut out. This was at 11 p. m.

The masked band ordered Gooding and Norris to drive further up the road. Then one of the men took young York to one side, admonished him to go to work and never be seen with Johnson again. Then five or six of the others took Johnson away a short distance and accused him of chicken stealing that had been going on in Jacksonville. This Johnson stoutly denied, whereupon his captors shouted for a rope which they put around his neck and pulled taut.

Johnson still denied that he had ever stole chickens and then was asked if he ever peddled any booze and if he ever associated with any white women. He also denied these imputations vehemently. In the meantime the captors had gone through the motions of searching the auto truck as if they expected to find some moonshine there.

Finally they asked Johnson, "Nigger, could you run, and let him go with the warning to speed away. They had addressed him as 'nigger,' all the way through.

TRUCK GAS TANK IGNITED BY MATCH RIVERSIDE STATION

A dangerous fire was narrowly averted at the Riverside Standard Oil station this morning when two men drove in with a truck and Myrl Garnett, service station operator, began filling the gas tank.

One of the men with the truck, standing at least five feet from the filling vent of the gas tank, lit a cigarette. The wind was blowing toward him and the vapor from the vent caught fire from the flame of the match. The gasoline began to blaze and flames roared from the vent of the tank.

Garnett withdrew the hose, grabbed the two small fire extinguishers on the outside of the station and handed them to the truckmen who used them on the flames while Garnett got the large extinguisher from the inside of the station. The entire contents of the small extinguishers and three gallons of extinguishing fluid from one of the large extinguishers were used before the fire was entirely put out.

DR. REBEC GIVEN A WARM FAREWELL

The annual summer banquet of the University of Oregon public speaking department, Portland center, which was held Monday night at the Benson hotel, was in the nature of a farewell for Dr. George Rebec, director of the Portland center. Mayor Baker, President P. L. Campbell of the University of Oregon, and Dr. R. M. Wendley of the University of Michigan were among the speakers.

Praise for Dr. Rebec and talks on the early struggles of the extension work and what it has come to mean, marked the short talks of the other speakers. They included Earl Kilpatrick, director of the extension division of the university; Prof. Mabel Holmes Parsons, professor of English literature, Portland center; Colin Dymond, dean of the literary department, University of Oregon, and Dr. R. M. Wendley, professor of philosophy, University of Michigan.

An evidence of the appreciation of the workers and students of the Portland division was the warm and comfortable looking steamer rug presented to Dr. Rebec and a smart Gladstone bag which Mrs. Rebec received.—Portland Journal.

Dr. Rebec formerly lived in Medford and still owns a ranch here. Mrs. Parsons is also an ex-Medford resident.

been taken from every voter in the county. Of course, I presume in that case, another recall petition can be circulated, and the ground gone over again, but if the court is going to grant an injunction in this case, it would establish a precedent for granting it in the next recall instituted. And it requires no argument that as between the private right of an individual and the public right of every voter in the county, the individual's right must yield.

"A temporary restraining order should never usurp the functions of a demurrer; and this is what plaintiffs ask."

"In spite of the disqualification of Judge Hamilton in this case, after considering the complaint, which I sent him at the time the restraining order was asked, and many of plaintiff's authorities, and hearing counsel's first argument, and Defendant Florey's argument, he fully concurs with me in the conclusions I have reached."

"I have purposely avoided any expressions of opinion on the law of this case, which may come up on the merits later, and it is not my purpose, to intimate that plaintiff's contentions, or that defendant's contentions are correct, for that can only be known from a full and fair hearing of all the facts."

"But for the reasons set out herein, I am filing an order denying plaintiff's application for a temporary restraining order."

Prior to the regular semi-monthly meeting of the directors of the Jackson County Fair association last evening, they visited the grounds and made an inspection of the improvements under way. The progress being made is most satisfactory.

The details of the fair program were fully discussed and as a result there will be an especially strong evening entertainment. The employment of bands from Yreka, Grants Pass and Ashland as well as the Elks and D. O. K. K. bands of Medford was considered, but no action was taken as quotations received from some of them were beyond the financial ability of the fair association to assume.

The chairman of the committee in charge of the premium book reported that the same would be ready for distribution by the first of August.

The directors were advised that a number of local speed demons were making preparations to enter the automobile races and one resident has ordered an eight-cylinder car of a well known racing type.

The plans for the automobile show were approved and the proposed merchants building was considered necessary and the directors decided to ask the merchants of the county to double their efforts to get a building started as soon as possible even if the same is half the size originally planned. This would be the merchants' contribution to the success of the fair.

Many applications have been received for concessions and arrangements are now being made for merry-go-round and other riding devices. No shows of questionable character nor games of chance will be permitted.

The directors are more enthusiastic than ever as to there being a good attendance as the publicity committee has a program of advertising that cannot help but bring the people here.

JACKSON COUNTY WILL HAVE FULL TIME HEALTH DEPT.

Jackson county is to have a model full time health department which has been made possible by the liberal offer of \$5580 by the state of Oregon and the Rockefeller Foundation. This money was secured by making an appropriation of \$1500 in addition to the amount now being paid for the county nurse and county physician.

Commercial and civic organizations of Ashland, Central Point, Phoenix and Medford and the Jackson County Health association had representatives before the county commissioners yesterday afternoon to urge the adoption of this health program which calls for a full time physician, two nurses and a laboratory assistant.

Jackson county is the second of the five counties of Oregon, to whom this offer has been made, to accept same. This department will be for the prevention of sickness, rather than the treatment of the sick, although the poor of the county will be relieved in the future as in the past.

This full time health department will be installed on the first of January.

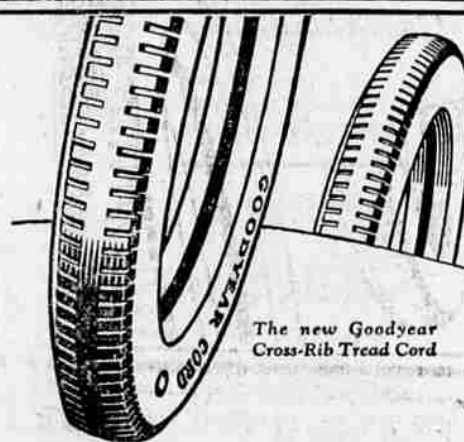
