

CHARGE OF EXTRAVAGANCE IN SHERIFF TERRILL'S OFFICE EXPLAINED, SANDIFERS GET NEARLY \$8,000

Sheriff Terrill is charged with being negligent in causing the arrest of violators of the prohibition laws but the records show that he has effected more arrests for such violations than any sheriff who ever held the office in Jackson county.

Mr. S. B. Sandifer is the prohibition agent. He has nothing to do except to give attention to this one subject. Since August 29th, 1921, there has been paid him and his assistants from the county treasury the sum of \$7,928.98, as follows:

"The black robes of the Klan," he alleged to have been "burned in a furnace," and the meetings held on the East Side, were also told to the grand jury, it is reported. This was when the local Klan was in its infancy.

SPORTS LEONARD RETAINS TITLE, BUT TENDLER GIVES HIM SCARE

NEW YORK, July 28.—(By the Associated Press.)—Benny Leonard still holds the world's lightweight boxing championship, but realizes that Lew Tandler, Philadelphia fighter, is "neither a second rate" nor a "dub."

Champion since 1917 when he bowled over English Freddie Welch, Leonard walked out of the great pine bowl on Boyle's 28 acres last night with the crown perched far back on his head. Tandler put it there. Had the challenger the stamina to hold the lead he gained early in the rounds he would have knocked it off. Leonard won by the palest of shades.

The bout went the full 12 rounds and under the law of New Jersey there was no official decision. The verdict is that of a majority of the newspaper writers at the ringside. Silent throughout the arduous days of training to belittling statements that Leonard made about him, Tandler gave his answer last night. It came hard and straight from the left shoulder.

The champion of yesterday is the champion of today because he had the reserve strength to take the lead when Tandler faltered after boxing him all over the ring.

CHICAGO, July 28.—The Sox, white and red, played airtight ball, for ten innings before the Chicago outfit was able to take the game, 4 to 2, by piling up two tallies with one out in the last half of the tenth. It also took the Braves on their home field ten innings to defeat the Cubs 8 to 7. Powell's triple and Nixon's single turned the trick with two outs.

In Cleveland the Athletics put up a war dance that left the Indians bemused a defeat of 11 to 2. A seventh inning rally by the Phillies with a homer by Williams with two men on base gave the home team a victory of 6 to 5 over Cincinnati. It was Cy's fifteenth home run of the season.

BURGLAR'S RAID ON EAST SIDE GAINS 1 WATCH

A raid was made by a burglar or burglars on the east side of the city last night, which was only discovered when the occupants of the several houses visited awoke this morning. At two of the places visited the burglars were frightened away by dogs.

So far as can be learned the only proceeds obtained by the night visitors were John C. Mann's gold watch, which he had carried for thirty years, and some small change taken from his trousers pocket. The main purpose of the burglars was evidently to procure money.

At the Mann home, No. 815 East Main street, entrance was obtained by

prying a screen off an open window on the east side of the house. At the home of C. W. McDonald, No. 823 East Main street, entrance was also gained by removing a screen. The downstairs part of the house was searched but nothing of value was taken. The next house in the neighborhood to be visited was the home of Dr. L. D. Phillips, No. 825 East Main street, where the screens were pried from all the downstairs windows only to find the windows were securely locked and could not be forced open without making considerable noise.

Then the homes of Paul McKee, on Geneva street, Harvey Fields at No. 24 Crater Lake avenue and T. E. Daniels at No. 835 East Main street were visited. Entrance to the McKee home was effected by prying off a screen, but nothing was taken from the house. At the Fields home the intruders tried to unlock a door but were frightened away by the barking of the house dog.

When the burglars reached the Daniels home, which is guarded inside by two Irish police dogs or terriers, named Fritz and Helme, they were scared away by the snoring or growling of the two canine watchers.
