

PLANS FOR NEW MEDFORD ARMORY ARE COMPLETED

Work will begin on Medford's new National Guard armory as soon as the plans for the structure, which are being drawn for the state by John Hunziker, the Eugene architect, are approved by the general staff of the Oregon National Guard. Mr. Hunziker was in the city this week on this work, but departed for home yesterday, leaving pencil drawings of the plans for general use by the local organizations interested. It is expected that the big structure will be completed and ready for use by January 1st next.

The new armory, which will be a sort of civic as well as military center for Medford, as seen by the preliminary

plans will be one in which the city will take much pride. The building, which will be erected at a cost of \$75,000, will be 120 feet wide and 184 feet deep, of possibly brick or concrete material, with ornamental front, standing in a lot 150 by 250 feet in dimensions, bounded by North Bartlett, Jackson and Third streets. The armory will front on Bartlett street.

The armory will consist of a basement running the entire length of the building and main floor above. In the basement will be located the kitchen, dining room, shooting gallery, bowling alley, etc.

The main floor will be divided into the National Guard headquarters, officers' rooms, and quarters for the G. A. R., W. R. C., American Legion and Ladies' auxiliary and Spanish-American War Veterans organizations, and a large auditorium.

The main public interest centers in this auditorium which will be used for conventions, large public meetings, concerts and theatrical entertainments. This auditorium will be 80 by 120 feet in dimensions with galleries on three sides, and will have a seating capacity of 3000 people. The stage of the auditorium will be 60 by 20 feet with a proscenium arch of 25 feet.

The cost of the building and lot, which will be \$50,000, the lot costing \$7000, has already been raised by taxation. The city and Jackson county each stand \$25,000 of the expense and the state stands \$40,000 of it.

At the city council chamber last night the preliminary plans of Architect Hunziker were gone over by representatives of the various organizations interested, who made recommendations for a number of changes to better fit local needs. Among those present were Captain Canada and Lieutenant Wright and Marshall of Separate Company A, Mrs. A. J. Hanley, representing the Greater Medford club; Earl C. Gaddis, representing the city council and Chamber of Commerce; Floyd Hart, representing the American Legion; Captain A. J. Vance, representing the Craters club, and F. W. Carnahan and N. J. Wylie, representing citizens generally.

LOCAL MINISTERIAL ASSOCIATION AGAIN ENDORSES THE RECALL

To the Editor:

Inasmuch as the name of the Medford Ministerial association has been variously associated with the propaganda and news pertaining to the recall of Sheriff C. E. Terrill, we the undersigned members of the above named association desire to make the following statements, to-wit:

Whereas, previous to the bringing in of special officers for the enforcement of the prohibition laws, "bootlegging," with the abominations and immoralities incident thereto, was freely practiced throughout Jackson county in defiance of the constitution of the United States and of the state of Oregon, and

Whereas, the sheriff was either unable or unwilling to bring the principal offenders to justice, and

Whereas, the report of the grand jury, dated Feb. 25, 1922 incorporated the following statement in regard to the sheriff's office:

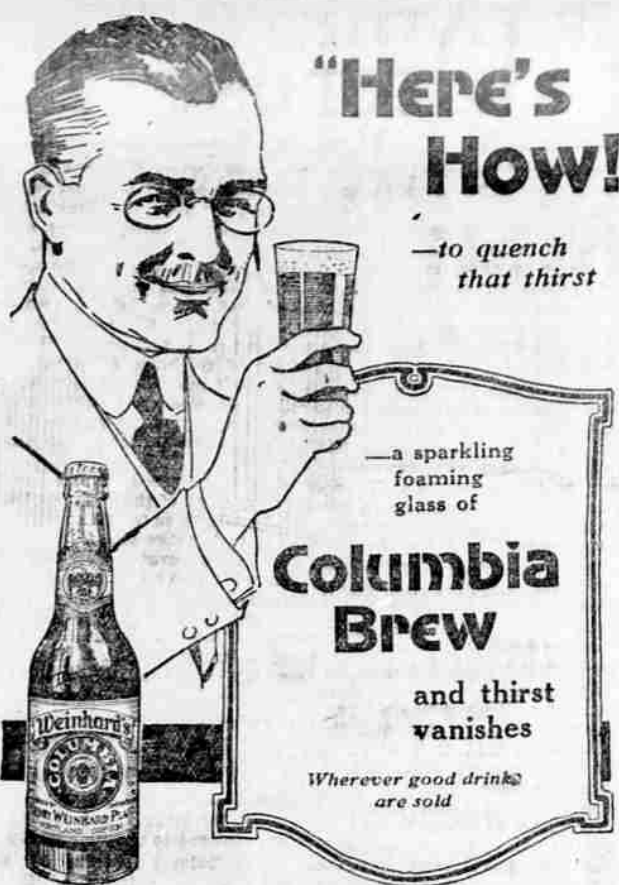
"This jury expresses its opinion to the people of Jackson county that the sheriff is far from doing his duty, if not deliberately allowing wrongdoers to escape the consequences."

Therefore, be it resolved that we, the undersigned members of the Medford Ministerial association do hereby express our conviction that it will serve the best interests and moral welfare of the citizens of Jackson county to exercise the right of franchise in recalling Sheriff C. E. Terrill from office as sheriff of Jackson county.

And be it further resolved that, whereas we have the assurance that D. M. Lowe is in sympathy with, and will give his best efforts to the enforcement of, the prohibition and all other laws, we do hereby reaffirm our endorsement of the said D. M. Lowe as candidate for sheriff of Jackson county.

Be it further stated that this action is taken without request from any organization or representative of any organization, but because of our conviction that (petty politics, personalities and other objectionable features incident to the recall agitation, aside) the question resolves itself in the final analysis to a moral issue centering around the enforcement of the 18th amendment of the constitution of the United States and our state prohibition laws.

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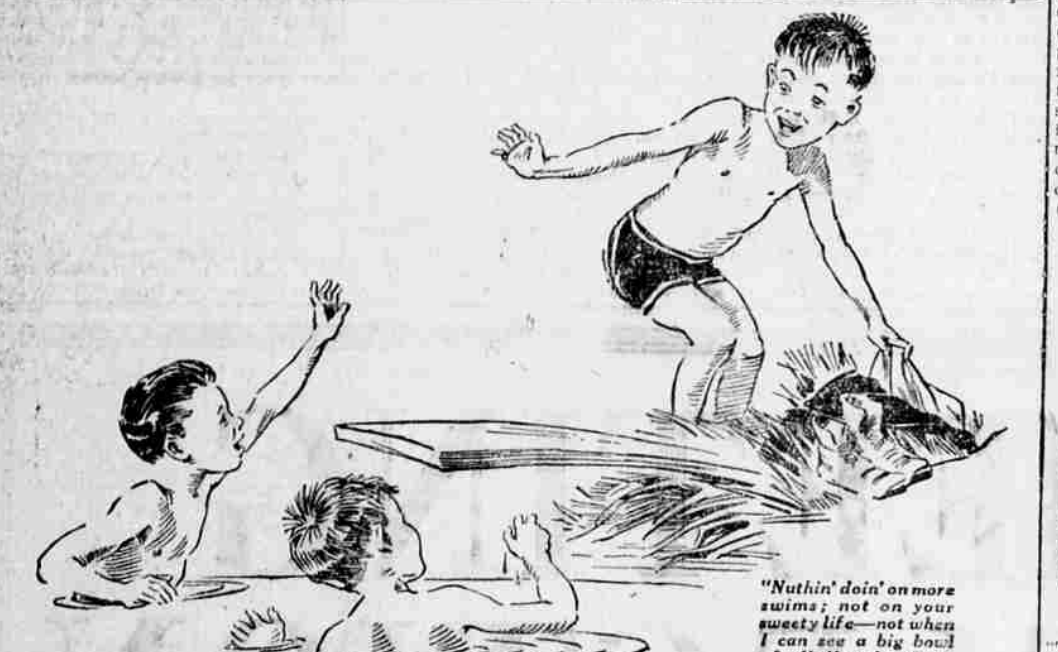
