

MEDFORD PASTOR TO GIVE SERMON NEXT CONVENTION

Rev. and Mrs. F. R. Leach attended the present week the Oregon Baptist state convention at Columbia City. The Baptists have purchased property at that point on the Columbia river, valued at \$10,000. The young people also hold their annual gatherings at this beautiful spot. A large assembly meets next week.

The past year was the best year in the history of the denomination. Larger additions and gifts were reported than in any other year of the convention. The missionary fund reached nearly \$100,000. An outstanding feature was the report on new church buildings. In the next three years outside of two Portland church buildings more money will be put in new churches than have been invested in all previous years. Mention was made of the new building planned by the local Baptists.

Among the special speakers were Dr. C. M. Hill of Berkeley, Calif., known to many of our Medford people. Resolutions were passed which placed the Baptists of Oregon firmly in favor of the conservatives in theology. A mid-winter conference is to be held in interest of missions, evangelism and doctrinal matters.

The Medford Baptist church was recognized in the election of Rev. F. R. Leach as alternate preacher of the annual convention sermon next year. Mrs. Leach was also placed on one of the committees.

MRS. JAY TO PLAY RIALTO ORGAN

In line with the progressive policy of the Rialto and Page theatre managements, Alice Smythe Jay, one of the country's well known organists and director, has been secured as organist at the Rialto theatre. Mrs. Jay made her first Medford appearance at the city park last night when she directed the Elk's band in playing "Yakima" a selection of her own original composition, which made a decided hit with the large audience.

Mrs. Jay, for three years, was organist at the Auditorium, Brooklyn, New York. She was in Honolulu two years in musical work at which time she gave special study to music of the Orient, and spent one year as organist under Ripley & Dolan at Aberdeen, Wash. She has made a special study of character music and is the originator of the "Music Score to Moving Pictures," covering theme setting, cueing and timing. For this she owns and controls the patent. At the Pan-American exposition in 1915, Mrs. Jay acted as special musical demonstrator. It is also interesting to know that Mrs. Jay was the originator of the popular war time song, "Tipperary" and holds American copyrights for that song.

Medford people are indeed fortunate in having Mrs. Jay as a resident. Her coming to this city is but another step toward making Medford the musical center of this part of the state. Her selections on the organ will be a regular feature of Rialto performances for some time.

M. EVANS RESIGNS FROM O. GROWERS

Announcement has been made that M. O. Evans, field manager of the Oregon Growers Co-operative association has placed his resignation to take effect August 1st. The reason being, it was stated, that the board of directors have authorized the elimination of this as a separate unit, to be combined with other departments in an effort to reduce expenses.

Mr. Evans has been with the association for two and one-half years, during which time he has given every effort to the upbuilding of the organization. He is well known throughout southern Oregon and the Willamette valley and the members of the association have been well pleased with his accomplishments and regret to see him leave. He will take a few months' vacation before entering other work.

EAGLE PT. IRRIGATION NOW ON SOUND BASIS

The Eagle Point district, one of the oldest and soundest farming communities of the Rogue River valley has acquired adequate water supply from Big Butte creek for irrigation purposes. The cost of the improvements is figured at but \$20.22 per acre of the entire district or \$24.43 per acre of the land to be irrigated. Production, prosperity and population are increasing in this valley and are based on a sound foundation.

COLLEGE HIKERS STOP IN MEDFORD

Dow Smith, Jr., and Walter D. Spelman, students at Syracuse, Uni-

versity, N. Y., passed through Medford this noon on their way to Los Angeles. They are hiking and "bumming" rides from passing motorists and have come from Syracuse since June 28th. They expect to make the return trip and arrive in Syracuse in time for the opening of the fall term, September 15.

The young men stopped here at noon and went to the Chamber of Commerce building where they secured a map of California and the Pacific highway which they intend to travel. Smith asked, "Is it hot in California like it is here," and was told that he would do well to take the coast route if he thought that 87 in the shade was warm, because the mercury quivered all day and half the night between 118 and 120 in the shade in places in California and that there was little shade.

He stated that they nearly froze in Yellowstone national park. When asked whether they intended to take in Crater lake they stated that they did not, as time was limited. They left about 1:30 for the south.

KEEN COMPETITION FOR FAT PURSES AT COUNTY FAIR

Judging by reports reaching the board, there will be keen competition at the Jackson county fair this fall for the fat purses hung up on the automobile races. One report from Ashland is to the effect that a Granite City speed demon is grooming an entry for the Ford classic that is geared up like a Stutz Bearcat and holds the road like a three-ton truck. Another embryo Ralph DePalma is working on the chassis and engine of an old bus that has more cylinders than a Liberty motor and cuts gas like it was formerly owned by John D. Rockefeller. It is claimed for this machine however, that the driver when he gets on the fair ground track will shake more speed out of it than anything on four wheels has ever developed in Jackson county.

The speed which may be attained by putting a "Lizzie" in first class shape mechanically and gearing up the transmission is surprising. The fair ground track is so constructed that a high speed may be attained if the machine is capable of hitting the breeze.

Ashland speed enthusiasts seem to be in the majority in preparation for the coming events, but Medford automobile experts claim that when the starter's flag drops at the fair grounds there will be a Medford entry or two that will show the way to anything else which may undertake to compete.

NEW HANSON PLAN IS SUSTAINED BY JUDGE HAMILTON

Judge J. W. Hamilton of Roseburg has just handed down a decision in favor of the city of Medford in the case of Earl H. Fehl vs. City of Medford. This case involved the constitutionality of the amendment to the city charter known as the amended Hanson plan. Judge Hamilton, in his opinion, held that this charter amendment was constitutional.

This suit was started in May against the city. Plaintiff Fehl filed an affidavit of prejudice against Judge Calkins and the case was sent to Judge Hamilton of Roseburg for hearing. An application for a temporary injunction against the city of Medford was made to Judge Hamilton by the plaintiff. Upon the hearing on the application Judge Hamilton refused to issue a temporary injunction restraining the city of Medford from issuing deeds of property for delinquent assessments.

On July 10, 1922, the final hearing upon the merits of the case and for a permanent injunction was held before Judge Hamilton at Roseburg. Judge Hamilton has given a decree in favor of the city of Medford, dismissing the case with costs against the plaintiff Earl H. Fehl.

H. F. Lindsay was the attorney for the plaintiff in this suit, while Fred W. Mears, city attorney, represented the defendant city of Medford.
