

SUN YAT SEN IN SUDDEN ATTACK ON CHEN FORCE

CHINA, July 29.—(By Associated Press.) Heavy reinforcements for the army of Sun Yat Sen, deposed president of South China, coming down out of the north, launched an attack in force on Chen Ching Ming's lines in Shichow, about 130 miles north of here today. Another wing of Sun's army is attempting to take Chen's troops in the rear twenty miles farther north.

The source of Yat Sen's confident assertions that he soon would be restored to power in Canton, in whose harbor he is virtually interned aboard his cruiser Wingtung, was revealed when his leaders in the north today launched a drive. Sun reiterated he would regain control when his divisions, sent into Kiangsi province several months ago in a campaign towards the Yangtze valley returned to turn the tables on Chen Ching Ming.

Five weeks passed and but little encouragement in the form of troops appeared out of the north to bolster Sun's waning cause.

Sun, however, refused to lose heart, he said, his army would come back and today it came in force. A total of 50,000 troops are said to be marching under Sun's banner in the double attack launched at Chen's lines and Chen has 20,000 with which to meet the onslaught. Besides the front attack at Chihui, one division was rushed southward in the hope that they can cut Chen's lines of communications 100 miles north of the latter city.

DRY ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS HERE

DUBLIN, July 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—Travelers in Dublin today who said they saw Eamon DeValera at Clonmel early this week declared he was carrying a rifle and that he looked worn and haggard.

Today's national army communiqué announces that Free State troops captured the village of Bruce, two miles from Kilmallock last night with the insurgent occupants of the village with their arms and ammunition. The irregulars had established a strong position there after their retreat from Limerick.

FAMILY IS INDICTED FOR GIRL'S MURDER

NEW YORK, July 28.—Mrs. Minnie Reiser, her sons Morris and George, and her brother, Max Katz, were indicted by a grand jury in Brooklyn today for first degree murder in connection with the slaying of Mrs. Reiser's sister, Bertha Katz, whom Mrs. Reiser accused of stealing the love of her husband "John the Barber" Reiser, widely known sport promoter. The quartet entered pleas of not guilty and were remanded to jail to await trial.

the telephone, that he was in the city, that he had been spending a two weeks vacation at Woodruff Meadows, and, that he was not trying to evade appearing before the grand jury. "I was surprised to read in the Portland papers that I had skipped out," said he, "and I did not hear that I was wanted until I arrived." Mr. Sandifer expressed a willingness to go before the grand jury.

The Portland Telegram's version of the affair, published Friday evening is as follows:

A Portland man, whose identity will be revealed at the hearing, drove the automobile which left the Sandifer home shortly after 4:05 on the morning of July 20 with Mr. and Mrs. Sandifer and the latter's daughter, according to the charges. The jury will hear how, a few minutes previously, a truck containing four men and provisions for two weeks' duration, left the place to be followed by the auto.

How the two machines left the city, headed for the secluded mountain districts, only to discover that they were being trailed; how the men occupying the truck hastily changed places with the Sandifers, and how the Portlander with his quartet of passengers swung about to follow another road, will be recounted during the probe, it is maintained here.

The first intimation that the alleged "kidnaping" was to take place leaked out in Medford, July 19, when the possible indictment of prominent Klansmen as a result of the grand jury investigation, was the foremost topic of discussion.

Local men who first learned of the rumors gleaned the report that the Sandifers were to be spirited into the mountains early the following morning, the duration of the stay to depend upon the physical condition of the witness, who was said not to have been feeling as well as usual. The proposed move was even discussed by the Klan at its meeting that night, it is reported.

Conclude Next Week

It is now expected that the grand jury will complete its work in full by Wednesday of next week. Assistant Attorney General Lilleqvist and assistants and the grand jury, left Saturday for the hills, and outings to get away from the strain of the probe, as the hearing of testimony with its tiring details has been a strain, mentally and physically on all.

SPORTS BOTH NEW YORK TEAMS LEADING IN BIG LEAGUES

CHICAGO, July 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—Both New York clubs are again showing the way in the major league pennant races today as a result of decisively beating their St. Louis rivals in the two crucial series.

The Yankees on top for the first time since June 16, held a margin of a half game over the Browns. They took their third straight from Fohli's clan, 7 to 3, Witt leading the attack with two doubles and a homer, while Sam Jones returned to form, holding St. Louis to six hits. Ken Williams cracked out his 23rd homer in the first inning.

The Giants made it four out of five from the Cards by breaking even in the doubleheader that concluded a series marked by the sensational hitting of the champions. McGraw's club pounded out 70 hits for 42 runs in the five games and increased their lead to two and a half games. Hornsby's 27th homer in the first game yesterday equalled the National league mark made by Ed Williamson in 1884.

Lee, the Phillies' first baseman, hit two homers in a game for the second time in the series and Cy Williams knocked out his 16th, but Cincinnati emerged an 11 to 7 victor in a slugfest match with Philadelphia. Brooklyn climbed back to fifth place in the National league when Dizzy Vance bested Babe Adams of Pittsburgh in a 3 to 2 encounter.

Same Line-up Big Leagues.

CHICAGO, July 29.—Chicago baseball fans picked up their morning newspapers today, turned to the sports pages and glanced at the major league standings.

"New York, St. Louis, Chicago," they read without particularly noticing the heading over the table of percentages. Yes, that must be the National league standing. But—

And again they looked, yes it was the same in both leagues. Then they looked further and discovered that in every city which boasts a team in each league, the fans must be having the same thrill.

By nosing the Browns out of the lead in the American league yesterday the Yankees not only took first place, but finished the job of putting the American league in the same lineup of teams as the National, so far as could be done. No similar instance could be collected, even by the oldest fans.

COBB NOW LEADS WITH BIG STICK

CHICAGO, July 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—Throwing a jolt and punch into the Detroit Americans which is being felt by every American league club, the veteran, Ty Cobb, Tiger pilot, excelling his every past performance at the bat today, led out in front of all American league contenders for 1922 hitting honors, and is leading his mates convincingly in the close pennant race. Ty is showing his men how to hit and this has carried him past George Sisler, St. Louis star for the batting honors of the league, which he lost to Speaker and Sisler in the past two seasons.

Cobb, in his last six games, cracked out 13 hits, better than two a game and boosted his mark from .405 a week ago to .418 while Sisler, who led the batters with an average of .418 a week ago, dropped to second place with an average of .404. He was able to acquire only six hits in as many games.

SANT CATHERINES, Ont.—American athletes were victorious in three of the principal events on the program of the Canadian Henley races.

HOUSTON—Johnny Dundee, New York junior lightweight champion, outpointed Kid Koster, Houston, in 12 rounds, according to newspaper men.

DENVER—Harry Schuman, Denver, won a decision in 12 rounds over Jack Perry, Pittsburgh welterweight. Kid Belt, Cannon City and Joe Berger, Chicago, featherweights fought a ten-round draw.

CLEVELAND—Manager Speaker, when he saw the Indians apparently beaten, replaced every man on the team except Jamieson, Joe Sewell and Pitcher Lindsey.

BROOKLYN—Max Carey, speedy Pirate outfielder, stole four bases against the Dodgers yesterday, but was unable to score a run.

NOT MORE THAN 60 PER CENT VOTE RECALL ELECTION

At 2 o'clock this afternoon County Clerk Florey, who is head of the county election board, said that from the polls in Medford and vicinity he had visited or had reports from 350 to 600 per cent vote would be cast in the city at today's recall election. His advice from Ashland was that a heavy vote was being cast in that vicinity. He lacked information from the rural districts.

Mr. Florey said that the election was passing off smoothly. The usual minor troubles at the polls in getting started right were encountered, and were quickly straightened out.

Through a mistake made by the county clerk's office in making arrangements for the polling places and publishing them, it was announced and published in the Mail Tribune on Friday that the voting place of the North Riverside precinct would be at the High School building instead of at Lincoln school, the usual voting place for that precinct. Many early forenoon voters were discommoded by this wrong announcement, but shortly after 10 a. m. word of the mistake was spread broadcast, and notices were posted on the doors of the high school entrances proclaiming that the voting place of the North Riverside precinct was at Lincoln school.

Leaders and workers on both sides of the recall issue were busy at work all day from the time the polls opened, and the usual rumors of illegalities and irregularities were spread about by overzealous workers on both sides—probably in an effort to influence the later voting.

The all absorbing topic of conversation on the streets everywhere was "How is the election going?" It was generally conceded that the election hinged on the way the women cast their ballot. A heavy late afternoon and early evening vote was looked for. The polls are open until 8 p. m.

Unless the election is close the result will probably be known by midnight, judging by the returns received from Medford, Ashland and the towns of the county. If the election is close it will probably be Monday before the result is known.

There was much swearing in of votes in the Medford precincts.

South Newtown, Washington school: 50 votes out of a total registration of 320 had been cast by 11 a. m.

North Main, Smith's hall, Grape street: 40 votes out of a total registration of 312 had been cast by 11 a. m.

South Main, C. B. Watkins' Shoe shop: 29 votes out of a total of 193 had been cast by 10:30 a. m.

South Central precinct, rear of Paul's electric store: 48 votes out of about 250 registered voters of the precinct, had been cast at 11 a. m.

East Medford, at Pacific & Eastern depot: 43 out of 225 registered voters had been cast by 10:20 a. m.

City hall precinct: 25 out of about 239 registered voters had been cast at 10 a. m.

Lord in prayer. But its no use to talk about an animal after you have heard him bray."

Shouting that he would insist that the investigation "proposed from the other side for political purposes," should proceed, Senator Gooding declared that if he had violated any law he was ready to resign.

Ready to Resign. "By the Eternal Gods I will resign!" Senator Gooding exclaimed, pounding his desk.

"I plead guilty to owning a few sheep," continued the Idaho member, adding that he would fight, "to the last ditch for that industry because his state could not exist without it."

Asserting that his conscience was clear in the matter of a wool duty and that when he got through this term he would be able "to sleep with my conscience," Senator Gooding charged that if any refection was made on any man in the senate, no man would be more ready to cast it than Senator Caraway. Senator Bursum described the resolution as an attempt to capitalize partisan politics and said the senate was giving undue attention to matters daily in the opposition press. Intervening in the debate Senator Warren, republican, Wyoming, said:

"This investigation would probably prove that the only men eligible for the senate would be hoboes riding on the brake beams. I have no objection to this resolution, but it would amount to just what such investigations always have amounted to—these damn fool nonsensical investigations we have from time to time."

Hoboes vs. Millionaires. Senator Caraway, with considerable indication of temper, said that of course Senator Warren would think his resolution was a "damn fool measure," and Senator Warren apparently believed only rich men should be in the senate. He added that he doubted if the country would be worse off if the senate was made up of hoboes than of millionaires.

Senator Johnson, democrat, New Mexico, told the senate he had been interested in the production of wool but had disposed of his entire interests in 1904. While so engaged he said he had acquired some personal knowledge of the industry and could state that even with the protection proposed in this bill, the business of the wool grower still would be in a precarious condition. He added that there was no assurance that even with the 33 cents a pound of secured content duty the industry would thrive.
