

PARLIAMENT TO MEET IN CHINA 1ST TIME 5 YRS.

PEKING, July 31.—(By the Associated Press)—China's parliament is expected to convene here tomorrow, the first meeting since 1917. Upon its opening, the parliament will discuss the re-union of China, the plan and the hopes of President Li Yuan Hung.

Today there was uncertainty whether sufficient members would be available to form a quorum, but members who have arrived at Peking asserted they would continue in session until able to function.

Problems facing parliament included the depleted national treasury, discord among the provinces and hostility of militarists who do not want their troops disbanded.

President Li described the situation as the gravest since the republic was established.

President Li wants parliament to decide his status as president. He said he was willing to retire if parliament elects another man to the position. In this connection General Tasso Kun and General Wu Pei Fu have been mentioned as possibilities for the presidential chair.

Among the schemes which President Li urges parliament to adopt are reduction of the present 1,500,000 soldiers to a number sufficient for defensive purposes, abolition of the Tachuns and formation of a federation of provinces under a capable central government and the reorganization of the nation's finances.

China will not be prosperous and China will not be free of foreign loans, President Li declared, until the provinces contribute their proper share of payment toward federal expenses.

The majority of Chinese newspapers consider the president's proposals impossible of immediate fulfillment.

The newspapers assert that so long as Sun Yat Sen, deposed president, remains about Canton, the southwest section of China is unlikely to join the unification plan.

LAWRENCE STRIKE ENTERS 19TH WEEK

BOSTON, July 31.—The textile strike in Lawrence in its nineteenth week, today appears to have settled into a grim test of endurance. Mill owners and operatives alike have announced that they would maintain their ground "to the bitter end," and neither side appears to show signs of weakening.

The number of workers idle in Lawrence because of the strike and the closing of the Arlington mills is estimated at 18,000.

NON-PARTISANS LOSE CONTROL OF NORTH DAKOTA

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 31.—Control of the Non-Partisan league's economic program in North Dakota has passed completely out of the hands of the league supporters.

State enterprises, such as a central state bank, the huge new state central elevator and flour mill at Grand Forks, state insurance and other farm enterprises, will be managed in the future by the opponents of the Non-Partisan league.

In other words, all of the economic experiments to help the farmers of North Dakota out and to break the grasp which it was said the big private millers of Minneapolis had on the wheat growers of North Dakota will now pass into the hands of the enemies of the league for administration. The economic program for the agriculturalist has been regarded as the foundation stone of the league.

Final returns from the recent primary in North Dakota have served to demonstrate the truth of the foregoing, it was known within three days after the primary that the Non-Partisan league had been successful in nominating its candidate for United States senator, Lynn J. Frazier, ex-governor, while it had failed to defeat Governor Nestos, anti-league, in his race for re-nomination.

But not until within the last few days was it learned definitely that control of the state industrial committee, charged with administration of the state enterprises, had passed out of the hands of the Non-Partisan league. That was the vital question in the state economic experiment, and the league believed for several days after the primary that it had won.

The final figures, however, show that out of a total vote of more than 225,000 in the state the anti-league candidates won in both instances by a margin of approximately 1000. This gives the Independent Voters' league complete control of the governing board of the state.

REPORT SUN YAT REPULSED, NEW ATTACK ON CHEN

CANTON, China, July 31.—(By Associated Press). Attacks by the reorganized forces of Sun Yat Sen, deposed president of South China, on Chen Chiang-Ming's lines at Shichow, 130 miles north of here, have been repulsed according to advices received through sources friendly to Chen.

Sun's troops have been driven back several miles, the reports from Shichow said.

This is the first definite news received here of the fresh engagement which was begun at Shichow Saturday when Sun's suddenly revived army from Kiangsi, 25,000 strong, launched a drive against Chen's front, defended by 20,000 troops. At the same time Sun's generals sent a flying column composed of one division southward in an effort to take their enemy in the rear about twenty miles below Shichow and cut his railway communications with Canton, from where he has been rushing reinforcements northward.

WILLS NOT LOGICAL TITLE CONTENDER NORTHWEST THINKS

PORTLAND, Ore., July 31.—How does it happen that Harry Wills, the negro heavyweight, has been matched to meet Jack Dempsey for the title? That is what boxing fans in this section of the country are asking, since a match between Dempsey and the New Orleans ginger-drop seems virtually assured.

Of all negro heavyweight maulers why should Wills be chosen as the logical man to meet the hard-pounding Mr. Dempsey?

Boxing enthusiasts of the northwest simply cannot swallow Wills as an opponent for the fast slugger who hammered Fulton Fitzsimmons, Brennan and Carpenter into submission.

And their opinions are based on first hand evidence, for the northwest has seen Wills in four bouts during the last six months. In none of these scraps did he show anything which appeared to entitle him to consideration as an opponent for Dempsey and in two of them—those against Bill Tate—he was decisively beaten and relieved of his so-called crown as negro heavyweight champion.

The sports world should know that Wills didn't leave Portland for the east with any laurels added to his fistie record and in consequence northwest boxing fans were all the more surprised when announcement was made that he was to be pitted against the chief nabob of the heavyweight tribe.

Louttit is Astonished
The most astonished man in the United States is Tom Louttit, retired undefeated amateur heavyweight champion of the Pacific coast, who refereed all four of Wills' pugilistic encounters in Portland. Incidentally, Louttit explains why he awarded Tate the decision in the first fight with Wills, and called the second a draw, although admitting that Tate had maulled Wills into a pulp.

"I awarded Tate the first scrap," says Louttit, "because Wills deliberately fouled him and apparently intentionally disobeyed my instructions. They were fighting under clean-break rules. The men were clinched in Tate's corner. I tapped them on the shoulder and ordered them to break. Tate dropped his hands and stepped back. Then Wills half turned Tate around, by catching one of his elbows, and holding him with one hand stepped in and delivered a smash to the jaw."

Tate dropped, dazed, but not knocked out, and looked at me to see what I would do. The foul was so palpable that I at once picked Tate up and raised his hand as the victor. The bout cost Wills the so-called negro heavyweight title. Wills looked like a rank amateur.

"In the second bout, fought one week later, I called the bout a draw because Wills had done most of the leading and had been the aggressor, although he had not landed a clean blow and had been outboxed, outhit and outmaneuvered by Tate. I believe Tate could have scored a knockout any time after the seventh round."

"Tate proved himself to be Wills' master in every department of the game, better in footwork, cleaner in his hitting, surer of his distance and, above all, shrewder and more deliberate in his head work. Wills never displayed any of the qualities of a champion."

ST. LOUIS AGAIN IN FIRST PLACE AMERICAN RACE

NEW YORK, July 31.—The pennant chasing St. Louis Browns, without the services of George Sisler and Hank Severid, but with able hurling by Wright and Kenneth Williams' 25th home run, have moved into first place again. Their fellow citizens, the Cardinals, nosed a game from Robinson's dodgers and gained a length on the Giants, who dropped their second straight contest to the Pirates.

The upward movement of the Browns was due to the defeat of the Yankees by the White Sox as well as their own victory over the Red Sox. Walter Hoyt, the Yankees' 1921 ace, was ineffective in six innings against the White Sox, who found him for 12 hits.

Ty Cobb had another good day at bat and so did his men, defeating the Athletics 7 to 2. Cleveland, with Uhl in hurling form and his teammates in a batting mood, won from Washington 11 to 3.

Home runs again proved the undoing of the Giants. Max Carey, who drove for the circuit on two occasions Saturday, duplicated his feat, and Russell, another Saturday home runner, added another to his string. Besides, Morrison was in better pitching form than Douglas.

In Brooklyn the Cardinals took advantage of a couple of infield bobbles to win 3 to 2. The victory cost

Brooklyn its hold on fifth place, as the Pirates moved there.

ST. LOUIS—Kenneth Williams again took the lead in home run honors in the American League when he smashed out his 25th circuit drive yesterday.

OMAHA—Wray Brown, St. Louis, won the Missouri valley tennis championship, defeating Phil Hagby, Kansas City, 6-3, 6-2, 6-2.

LONDON—The world chess tournament opens here today with experts of two hemispheres competing for the championship.

lives Walter F. Antle. He was accused by Bert Moses, S. B. Sandifer, and J. H. Leggett, with saying that Terrill had "tipped" him off regarding a raid by Sandifer. The vote stood Terrill 76; Lowe 4.

In Eagle Point where lifelong friends of the sheriff live, he received 142 votes to his opponents 49. Every precinct in the Butte Creek country went for Terrill.

Signs of Lowe strength manifested itself in the northern end of the county. Gold Hill "wrestled" a draw, the vote standing Lowe 61, Terrill 60; Rogue River went for Lowe 59 to 25, Foothills for Terrill 24 to 6; and Sams Valley, Lowe 39, Terrill 22; Antioch, the last precinct to report went Lowe 35; Terrill 14.

Medford Majority Wins

In Medford, the storm center of the fight, Terrill won by a majority of 309, receiving 1181, to Lowe's 872. Lowe carried two precincts, Northeast Medford and Southwest Medford. Terrill carried the remaining ten precincts by good majorities. Many voters were sworn in, by both sides, and there were many tireless workers. The activity of one county official from the Grape street headquarters was a surprise to many people, his auto making many trips.

About 60 per cent of the total vote went to the polls; a fair ratio and the interest throughout was intense. The heaviest vote was cast in the afternoon, and in some instances people did not get to the voting places in time to cast their ballots.

It was generally conceded that the affidavits cast about during the campaign made votes for Terrill, particularly those charging drinking and cigarette smoking filed by Ashland people. The one alleging the sheriff threatened to shoot E. A. Fleming of Jacksonville, was generally conceded to have acted as a boomerang in Jacksonville and the Applegate where the facts were known.

A freely expressed opinion in all quarters was that the Rogue River valley return to its fields and orchards and daily pursuits, and forget the hallucination of "saying mankind" by bitter community fights.
