

RAISING SCHOOL STANDARDS PLEA YEOMAN SPEAKER

An appeal for a higher standard of intelligence, a higher standard of physical fitness and a charge to the American people of the responsibility which rests with them in respect to developing these things, was delivered by A. N. Farmer when he addressed the chamber of commerce forum luncheon at the Hotel Medford this noon.

Mr. Farmer quoted statistics derived from army investigation of men examined for military service during the world war and many of the figures quoted were astounding. He stated that out of 1,700,000 men examined during the war the average intelligence was equal to that of a boy of 13. Of this number of men many were from the best homes in America and had received college educations. He also stated that one-third of the men examined were physically unfit.

If the American nation is to maintain its ideals and to preserve its prestige the standard of intelligence and physical condition must be raised, stated the speaker.

Education of Children
The children of the nation must be educated and given attention. It is true that the American nation has already done much in this direction but it has merely made a good start. In the opinion of the speaker much is yet to be done. Nothing can be done by the government as a whole to eradicate illiteracy and physical deficiencies. It rests with the community, the small unit.

The great influences in the development of the race are the home, the church and the school. The speaker did not dwell upon the two former institutions but said a few words regarding the latter and that that every community has as good schools as it deserves. A community which has poor schools is populated with citizens either unwilling or not intelligent enough to provide good ones.

That the standards must be raised in order to preserve the ideals of Washington and Lincoln was one of the most important statements made by the speaker.

In order to raise the standard of intelligence and physical well being of the nation the fatherless and motherless children, many of whom become liabilities to the nation and to society

in general, should be cared for, trained in vocations and schooled.

The speaker who is working in the interest of the home for orphans to be established by the Brotherhood of American Yeomen explained the plan of the home.

Plan Is Outlined
It will not be a conventional type of orphanage of a large building with hundreds of homeless children under one roof receiving no personal attention, but will be made up of a number of units each housing 10 or 15 children and each under the supervision of a person who understands and has a natural adaption for children. There will be a school building and a high school building and each child will be given the equivalent of a high school education under the best instructors obtainable in the country. A church where Protestants and Catholics children as Catholics will be included in the equipment of the community as well as stores, farm buildings, farm equipment and vocational training shops. Fifteen hundred or eighteen hundred children will be cared for and educated with personal attention which will bring out the best in them and make them fit for future citizenship. The school community will approach a total population of 2000. The children will work in the shops and on the farm and will be taught the advantages of life and the necessity to overcome obstacles in order to reach the goal of success.

After explaining the combined home and institute for the training of future citizens Mr. Farmer stated that he had enjoyed his visit here as had Mrs. Farmer and that they had enjoyed the renewal of their friendship with Mr. and Mrs. Getchell.

Dorothy Getchell presided and in making his speech of appreciation for the address given by Mr. Farmer praised the latter by saying that he who works in the interest of little children may look destiny in the eye and defy it.

It is rumored that the home to be established by the Yeomen may be situated in the district between the California line and the Columbia or within a radius of 500 miles from Chicago. The selection of a location will likely depend greatly upon the spirit with which the people of the different communities receive the proposition, according to report.

CARDINALS ARE CREEPING UP ON LEAGUE LEADERS

CHICAGO, Aug. 1.—(By the Associated Press).—St. Louis clubs in both major leagues today continued trudging pennantward. As Ken Williams poked out his 26th home run, the Browns won from the Red Sox, 6 to 2 and increased their lead over the Yanks who lost another close tilt to the White Sox 3 to 2, to a game and a half.

The Cardinals, finding Dutch Reuther, the Brooklyn ace, easy, won another victory over the Dodgers and crept to within half a game of the leaders when the Giants succumbed to the dashing, spirited attack of the Pirates and dropped the third straight contest to them, 12 to 5.

And the Cubs, still harboring pennant hopes, pounded an easy victory out of the Phillies, 13 to 5, thereby staying off the tantalizing Reds, who with Luque's combination of hitting and pitching, defeated the Braves, 6 to 3.

A feature of the Cubs-Phillies game was the home runs of the Phillies. Williams, Lee and Henline each accounted for one.

The White Sox victory over the Yankees kept them in third place, ahead of Cobb's men who won another decision from Philadelphia, 11 to 1. Ty Cobb, in his last trip to the plate, prodded a two-base hit out of the ball. Speaker hit his sixth homer of the season, his men being in a hitting mood too, and the Indians won from Washington, 14 to 5. The Senators' hurriers were in bad form.

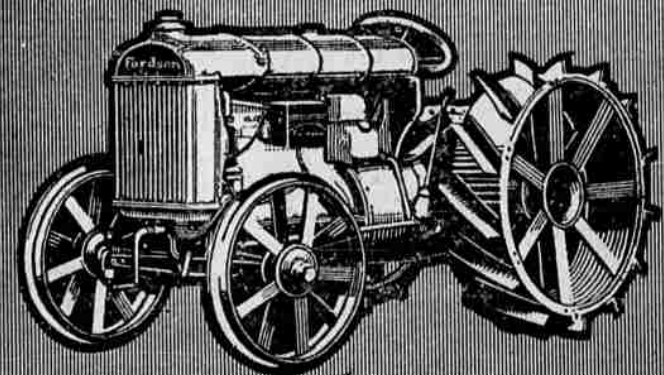

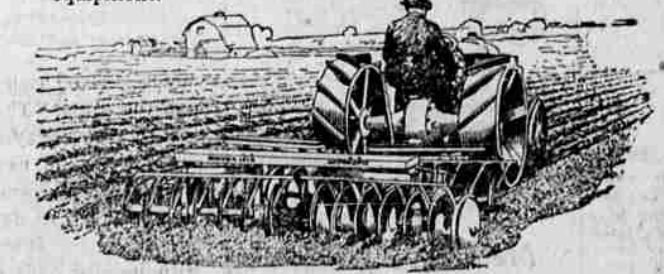
