## SENATOR REED'S FATE IN HANDS OF WET VOTERS

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—Missouri polls opened at six o'clock central standard time this morning for the first primary election in which women of the state have taken part, marking the close of one of the bitterest primary fights of recent years.

The democratic race between Senator James A. Reed and Breckenridge Long, third assistant secretary of state under President Wilson, has overshadowed every other issue.

Friends of Senator Reed see a menace to the state in the activity of William Sacks, oil man, and of the six republican candidates. Mr. Sacks is making the race on a wine and beer platform.

Senator Reed's friends have counted on a large number of wet republicans in St. Louis voting for him in the democratic primary. Others in the republican race for senator are: Attorney General Joseph W. Barrett, carrying the progressive banner; R. R. Brewster of Kansas City, endorsed by the regular republican organization; David M. Proctor of Kansas City, an admitted opponent of the "old guard"; John C. McKinley of Unionville, who had been making his campaign by mail and Colonel John M. Parker of Jefferson barracks, a soldier candidate who has also endorsed wine and beer.

There are four parties in the field—republican, democratic, socialist and socialist-labor.

All the present congressional incumbents, with the exception of Representative Samuel A. Shelton, republican, in the 16th district are seeking re-nomination.

Among the candidates opposing them are four women, three in St. Louis.

To the Editor:  
On election day there was circulated in Ashland a statement by the friends of the Ku Klux Klan candidate for sheriff, D. M. Lowe, that I had said that the W. C. T. U. ladies were a bunch of prostitutes. On election day I made a trip to Ashland to ascertain who it was that put out that scurrilous lie.

I am now informed by a member of the Ku Klux Klan, who sat in the Ku Klux Klan lodge with D. M. Lowe (notwithstanding the statement made by one of the ministers of the gospel in Medford, that Mr. Lowe is not a member of the Klan), that D. M. Lowe stated that I had called these ladies prostitutes, and that he had personally approached me and required me to retract the statement.

To start with, I wish to say that no such statement by me was ever made of that kind, or anything of that character, and that the statement put out is a malicious lie and if Lowe made the statement, he is a malicious liar, and if he desires the name of the member of the Ku Klux Klan who reported to me that he heard Lowe make the statement, he may call on me and I will give him the name of the member of the Ku Klux Klan who gave me this information.

The statement put out by Lowe is fairly illustrative of the character of the campaign that the members of the Ku Klux Klan carried on in order to consummate the defeat of Mr. Terrill.

## IRISH ARMY NOW READY TO ATTACK

DUBLIN, Aug. 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Irish national army, according to indication here, is ready for an attack upon the irregulars along the whole front. The fall of Tipperary, which was captured by the nationalist forces Sunday, disposes of an awkward salient and is expected to enable the free state forces to advance on Cashel, thus paving the way to a further advance on Clonmel, reputed irregular stronghold.

## 15 Killed, 30 Injured In R. R. Collision Near Cincinnati, O.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 1.—Fifteen persons were reported killed and 25 to 30 injured in a head-on collision today between a north-bound negro excursion train and a southbound passenger train No. 11 from Dayton on the Cincinnati, Lebanon and Northern railroad at Lester Station, a suburb of Cincinnati today. The southbound train No. 11, composed of five cars behind the locomotive crashed into the north-bound special excursion train of three cars, carrying several hundred negroes to a picnic at Highland Grove. The two trains came together with a terrific force, telescoping each other.

## ENGLAND PUTS WAR PAYMENT UP TO AMERICA

LONDON, Aug. 1.—(By Associated Press.) It is understood the British circular note on reparations and war debts, which was recently reported to have been prepared and taken under consideration by the cabinet, will be addressed to France, Italy, Roumania, Greece, Belgium, Portugal and Jugoslavia.

The note, the understanding is, will indicate the doubt of the British government whether Great Britain, in view of the position of the United States regarding payment of the debts due that country, would be able to act upon the various suggestions that may be for the good of Europe if she would take the lead in a comprehensive settlement of inter-governmental indebtedness by remitting to the European countries their debts to this country.

Declaring that it is regretfully constrained to ask the French government to make arrangements for dealing with the best of ability with the Anglo-French loans, the British government says it desires to explain that the amount of interest and repayment for which it asks depends less on what France and the other allies owe Great Britain than what Great Britain has to pay to the United States.

ment from the White House giving the basis of the executive's settlement plan as follows:

1.—Railway managers and workmen are to agree to recognize the validity of all decisions of the railroad labor board and to faithfully carry out such decisions as contemplated by the law. 2.—The carriers will withdraw all lawsuits growing out of the strike, and railroad labor board decisions, which have been involved in the strike may be taken, in the exercise of recognized rights by either party, to the railroad labor board for re-hearing. 3.—All employees now on strike to be returned to work and their former positions with seniority and other rights unimpaired. The representative of the carriers and the representatives of the organizations especially agree that there will be no discrimination by either party against the employees who did not strike.

Hoover Meets Executives  
NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—(By Associated Press.) The conference of railroad presidents, assembled at the grand central terminal today to discuss President Harding's proposals for settlement of the nation-wide rail strike, adjourned until this afternoon without taking action after Secretary of Commerce Hoover had presented the administration proposition.

Mr. Hoover entered the conference shortly before noon and remained only a short time.

"I simply presented the position of the administration and made some further explanations of President Harding's proposal, which was already before the meeting," he said. "I did not take part in the discussions and I don't know whether the meeting will take any vote on accepting the president's proposal."

CLEVELAND, Aug. 1.—The New York Central railroad today posted notices in all shops over the entire system that it will not change its position on the seniority question in the strike of the shopmen and that it "will stand by the old men who remained at work and the new men employed since the strike," company officials announced here.

expected to end the walkout immediately. Union chiefs were here and railway executives in New York to consider President Harding's plan for a settlement.

At Chicago were most of the ninety general chairmen of the shop crafts workers and several other leaders, including B. M. Jewell, president of the railway employees department of the American Federation of Labor, and Timothy Healy, head of the striking firemen and others.

Mr. Jewell presided. Chairman Ben W. Hooper of the United States railway labor board also was on hand and it was understood he bore authority to speak for President Harding. The New York meeting included executives of 148 leading railroads.

The president's plan, a union official said, included restoration of seniority rights to strikers, subject to the rights of men who stayed at work. Old employees who remained on the job would gain such additional rights as they acquired during the strike. As men at the foot of seniority lists are the first laid off in slack time, many workers who struck would lose assurance of steady employment.

Other provisions of the peace plan were that the shopmen would accept the recent wage reductions of the railroad labor board pending a re-hearing by the board and that they would agree to abide by decisions of the board in the future. The railroads were to discontinue "farming out" of shop work. The question of national and regional adjustment boards to expedite settlement of labor disputes would be discussed further.

## UP TO MINE OWNERS

(Continued from page one)

Cleveland next Monday for the purpose of negotiating a basic agreement designed to terminate the present coal strike was called today by John L. Lewis, international president of the United Mine Workers.

President Lewis also summoned the general policy committee of the union to meet in Cleveland at the same time for the purpose of passing promptly upon developments in the joint conference.

The following telegram was sent today to the operating interests in the central competitive field, which includes western Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois:

Philadelphia, Pa., Aug. 1, 1922. "In behalf of the United Mine Workers I am herewith inviting the coal operators of the Central competitive field to meet in joint inter-state conference at the Hollenden hotel, Cleveland, Ohio, at 10 o'clock a. m. Monday, August 7, 1922, for the purpose of negotiating a basic wage agreement designed to terminate the present suspension in the mining industry. I express the sincere hope that the interests represented by you will find it possible to participate in the joint negotiations."

(Signed) "JOHN L. LEWIS, President United Mine Workers of America."

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"In issuing an invitation to the coal operators of the central competitive field to assemble in joint conference in Cleveland on August 7, I am actuated by the highest consideration of public welfare and the compelling necessity for an early adjudication of the issues involved in the bituminous and anthracite coal fields.

"This strike, unparalleled in its magnitude is now in its eighteenth week and constitutes an industrial convulsion which menaces the financial and social fabric of our nation. Aside from the tremendous personal sacrifices so bravely endured by the mine workers, the strike is exacting penalties from every citizen of our land and is clogging the channels of commerce and disturbing the realms of finance and credit throughout the civilized world. Its effect will continue to be felt long after its termination, and the burden will fall heavily upon those least able to bear it.

Prefer to Have Peace  
"In consideration of these facts and notwithstanding the powerful position of advantage now enjoyed by the mine workers, we have resolved to again attempt to assemble a conference where passion will cease and reason predominate. We are able to fight indefinitely, but much prefer the peace to the ills of industrial warfare.

"We feel that the American public will support our effort to meet at the conference table and will encourage the corporate interests involved to have their representatives present.

"The making of a basic settlement in the central competitive field will permit of an immediate following settlement in all of the outlying bituminous coal districts and should pave the way for an immediate adjustment in the anthracite fields as well.
