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## OBITUARY

CASAD—Ralph Emerson Casad was claimed by death in the granite City hospital at Ashland, Oregon at 6 a. m. on the 27th of July where he had undergone a major operation for intestinal trouble three days before. After a short rally he gradually grew worse until the end came which was peaceful. He had asked for the members of his family who were speeding on fast trains from different parts of the country in a race with the grim reaper. His mother, Mary E. Casad of Los Angeles, and his niece, Ethel M. Moss of Santa Barbara, Calif., were the only members from a distance that reached his bedside in time. They had their tickets and baggage checked for the Hawaiian Islands when they received the word. They cancelled their transportation and caught the last train arriving before his death.

Ralph E. Casad was among the early native sons of Johnson county, Kansas, having been born at a place called Squiresville on the old Santa Fe Trail, two and one-fourth miles due east of Ocheltree, March 18, 1869. He was the fourth child of Isaac D. and Mary Elizabeth James Casad, and the first to depart this life after reaching maturity.

His father died when Ralph was nearing seventeen years of age leaving his mother with five younger children. Ralph assumed the roll of a father to them and was of great service to his mother and the younger children in those days of trials. His duties in his new field cut his school career short having up to this time attended the local district school at Ocheltree.

At the age of twenty-one he became united in marriage to Etta Hartley, the eldest daughter of Joel Hartley who lived near Busyrus. To this couple were born one son and one daughter, Arthur, Willard and Florence Julia. Willard Casad at present is married and has five children, three boys and two girls, and is living at New Plymouth, Idaho. Florence married Charles Etem and is living in Minneapolis, Minn.

Ralph Casad at the time of his death was living on a ranch near Talent, Ore. He lived in Johnson county about 36 years. After leaving the old home where he was born he moved to Kansas City, Mo., for about seven years in 1906. In 1913 he moved to Hickman Mills, Mo., and engaged in farming and dairying for six years. Selling his dairy he and his wife went overland in an automobile from there to Talent, Ore. He is survived by his wife, Etta, his mother, Mary E. Casad, a sister, Cornelia Casad Moss of Santa Barbara, Calif., a sister, Helen Hartley, Vancouver, Wash., a sister, Irene Casad Hartley of Covina, Calif., a sister, Ora M. Burk of Myrtle Creek, Ore., a sister, Eva Casad Bates of Redondo Beach, Calif., a brother, Roland C. Casad of Los Angeles, Earl P. Casad, Newbury Park, Calif., a son, Arthur Willard of New Plymouth, Idaho, a daughter, Florence J. Etem of Minnesota, and five grandchildren, Ralph, Schooley, Maxine, Paul and Jannita, besides many brothers and sisters-in-law, nephews and nieces, all of whom will greatly miss him.

The funeral was from the Methodist church, the pastor, C. A. Edwards, officiating, and the burial in Mountain View cemetery under the auspices of the Modern Woodmen of America of which he had been a member for more

than twenty-five years, and was at the time of death a member of Talent camp, Talent, Oregon.

CRONEMILLER—Miss Kate Cronemiller died at her home in Jacksonville, August 1st, after a very brief illness from heart trouble, aged 57 years, 3 months, 9 days. She was born in Jacksonville on April 22, 1865, and was a lovable character, quiet, unassuming, and always ready to help a neighbor or friend. She was a member of Adair Chapter, No. 2, O. E. S., and the Presbyterian church of Jacksonville. She leaves one brother, J. M. Cronemiller, and two sisters, Miss Mayme Cronemiller of Jacksonville and Mrs. Carolyn C. Horton of Fullerton, Cal. The funeral services will be held at the Presbyterian church, Jacksonville, Thursday at 2:30 p. m. Rev. J. K. Howard officiating. Interment in Jacksonville cemetery.
