

BUILDINGS FOR COUNTY FAIR TO BE READY SEPT. 13

The entire building program as decided upon by the board of directors of the Jackson county fair is well ahead of the construction schedule of the board is assured that every part of the big enterprise will be complete and ready to house the exhibits by September 13th, the opening date of the fair.

Official Count Makes Terrill Winner by 308 Majority

The official count on the recall election completed Tuesday afternoon gives Sheriff Charles E. Terrill, a majority of 308, over D. M. Lowe. The total vote, with two precincts, Applegate and Barron, unofficial, give Lowe 2651, Terrill 2959.

On the recall question 2713 voted yes, and 2989 voted no, a majority of 276 against the recall, the discrepancy being due to many voters only voting once on the ticket.

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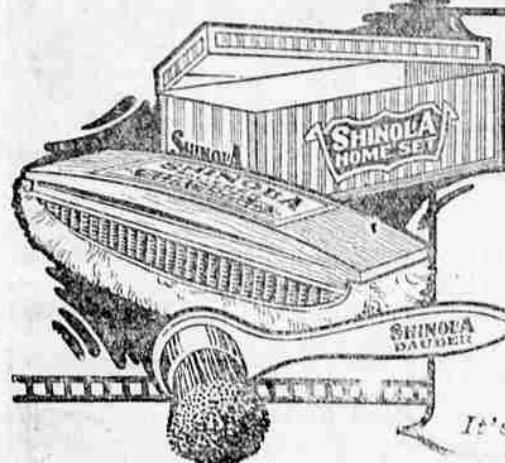
