ST. LOUIS BROWNS
HOLD THEIR LEAD,
CARDINALS GAIN

CHICAGO, Aug. 2.—(By Associated Press.) Behind Ray Kolp's steady hurling, the St. Louis Browns won their fourth straight game from the Red Sox and increased their lead over the Yankees whose game with Chicago was halted in the fourth frame by rain, to two full games.

The St. Louis Nationals, idle because of the rain, profited by the Pirates' fourth consecutive victory over the Giants and are within a few percentage points of first place.

WHITE SOX PROTEST
YESTERDAY'S GAME

CHICAGO, Aug. 2.—The Chicago White Sox filed a protest with President Ban Johnson of the American League over yesterday's game with the New York Yankees which was called on account of rain after 4 1/3 innings with the Sox leading 5 to 1. The protest terms the conduct of the Yankee players a disgrace to the game, pointing out that they evidently were stalling when rain appeared likely.
