I took occasion to go down and see the samples and I found some of the finest grains and grasses I ever saw. I took the liberty to count the stalks on one seed, and anyone would do well to take this idea into account when buying seed grain. It readily tells you which is the better yield. Here are my findings:

Bluestem Wheat, 50 stalks to one seed; Jenkins Club wheat, 76 stalks Early Bar, 87 stalks and 77 stalks.
