5000 KILLED IN TYPHOON CHINESE SEA

One of Worst Disasters in History Visit Swatow, 250 Miles North of Hong Kong—Chinese Pirates Loot Victims—Scores of Ships Are Wrecked.

HONG KONG, Aug. 5.—(By Associated Press.) Wednesday night's typhoon at Swatow, 250 miles north of here, was the worst in the history of that city. Dead bodies are floating amid the wreckage everywhere in the harbor. Nearly every house in the city was damaged. A flood following the wind drove inhabitants from their homes.

Telegraph lines between here and Swatow are down, but details of the disaster were brought here today by steamer. The storm broke at 10:30 o'clock Wednesday night and gathered force until daylight, when it subsided, leaving death and destruction in the city and harbor. The death list is placed at 5000.

Hundreds of native craft along the waterfront were wrecked and their occupants drowned, while practically every house ashore felt the effect of the terrific wind.

Warehouses Destroyed

Several godowns, or warehouses were badly damaged and their stocks of merchandise wholly or partially ruined. Trees were torn up by the roots, telegraph poles were snapped off, roofs were carried away and entire houses laid flat in the pathway of the storm.

Native boats in the harbor were picked up as the wind and the water linked forces and were carried far inshore. Coasting steamers dragged their anchors, some of them over distances of two miles, and were pitched on land, damaged.

The lighthouses at the entrance of the harbor, despite their solid foundations and sturdy construction, also show the scars of the typhoon.

The water in the harbor rose rapidly until several feet deep in the shore line warehouses and as it continued upward inhabitants of the houses left or retreated to their upper stories.

HONG KONG, Aug. 5.—(By Associated Press.) Full reports of the disastrous typhoon which swept Swatow, 250 miles north of here, with estimated loss of 5000 lives and great property damage August 2, are awaited here. Foreign warehouses were demolished by the storm and their contents lost or extensively damaged. Two British steamers were swept ashore and their cargoes and stocks will be lost for pirates before they can be salvaged.

PADEREWSKI MUST PAY W. A. PAVLOSKI

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 5.—A judgment for \$220,42 against Ignace Jan Paderewski, pianist and former premier of Poland, now said to be in Switzerland, has been obtained in a township justice court here by W. A. Pavloski.

The amount involved was asked by Pavloski in payment for his labor in arranging for a loan of \$120,000 on the Paderewski estate at Paso Robles, Cal.

MOTORLESS AIRPLANES MAKE NEW RECORDS AT FRENCH FIELD MEET

CLERMONT FERREAND, France, Aug. 5.—(By Associated Press.) Optimism over the future of motorless flying prevails at Camp Mouillard, where the "glider" contests under the auspices of the first international experimental congress of motorless airplanes will begin tomorrow, to continue until August 20.

Fifteen of the motorless airplanes which are entered in the contests have arrived and some of the machines already have made successful unofficial flights. An American monoplane has been entered by the Aeronautical Engineering society. Edmund Allen will pilot the American plane.

A Swiss-designed stationary thick-winged monoplane remained in the air for four minutes yesterday, covering about a mile and three-quarters in a half circle with a loss of altitude of about 300 feet. A flapper parashut machine covered about 200 yards at an altitude averaging between 6 and 10 feet. It landed because the human motor gave out.

Bologna Sausage Is Fatal to Mother; Three Others Sick

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Aug. 5.—Physicians attending George Barnhart and his two sons, who, with Mrs. Barnhart, contracted an unusual case of ptomaine poisoning last Tuesday at their home in Starbuck, still have doubt as to their recovery.

The poison has paralyzed their throats and made treatment difficult. Mrs. Barnhart died as a result of the poison. Mr. Barnhart is a merchant in Starbuck and well known in this section.

The poison followed eating of Bologna sausage, Mrs. Barnhart being first to feel the effects. She was brought to the hospital here and immediately after Mr. Barnhart became ill and then the two young sons.

BLAME AFFINITY FOR FLIGHT OF TACOMA BANKER

Assist. Manager Bank of California Leaves Prostrate Wife, Child and Shortage of \$6000—Federal Agents in Pursuit.

TACOMA, Aug. 5.—Friendship for another woman, it was declared today by officials working on the case, was the motive which caused Spencer Conrow, assistant manager of the Tacoma branch of the bank of California, to leave behind him a prostrate wife a child and a shortage of about \$6000 in his accounts, and flee the city as a fugitive from justice.

Agents of the department of justice and the United States marshal were seeking today to apprehend Conrow on a federal warrant. The action was brought in federal court by reason of the Bank of California being a national bank.

According to Manager G. H. Raleigh of the bank, a complete check of Conrow's accounts has disclosed a shortage of \$6,003.07. He did not have access to the bank's cash and his pecuniary, which extended over a period of two years, were obtained through securities. It is believed at the bank that Conrow was contemplating flight before he was confronted with the charge of thefts, for \$1,500 was found in his desk following his flight from the city Tuesday night. Conrow was receiving a salary of \$450 a month and bonuses which brought it up to about \$500 monthly, or \$6,000 a year.

OREGON LAWYERS TO SAN FRANCISCO

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5.—The first contingent of the Oregon Bar association's automobile caravan to the San Francisco convention of the National Bar association, August 9, 10, 11, left early today.

The caravan will pick up representatives of the different county associations on its way south and will wait at Redding for another train of machines from eastern Oregon which will come down through Klamath Falls and the central highways. Three days will be taken to make the journey. The party is scheduled to arrive in San Francisco August 8.

PUT RAIL R. STRIKE UPTO LABOR BOARD

General Belief Is President Has Asked Strikers to Return to Work Leaving Seniority Rights Up to Labor Board for Final Decision—No New Developments.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—B. M. Jewell, head of the striking railroad shopmen, W. H. Johnston, president of the International Association of Machinists and James N. Noonan, president of the Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, reopened negotiations today with President Harding in the railroad strike.

The union leaders, after an hour's conference, left the White House under restraint of a presidential request to maintain silence as to the matters under consideration but all three expected to remain in Washington for at least a day or two.

It was indicated that the issues in the strike had again been gone over, but whether President Harding and proposed that the strike leaders send the men back to work and leave the difficult seniority question to be dealt with by the railroad labor board, was not definitely determined, although it was suggested in connection with the suggestions.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—Legislative agents representing the engineers, trainmen, firemen and engine-men's brotherhoods of railroad workers and the Switchmen's union, after an hour's conference today with President Harding declared that no arrangements had been made for a conference between the heads of their organizations and the president.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Aug. 5.—Word was awaited today by W. D. Roberts, vice president of the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees from President F. E. Grable at Detroit, as to his proposal that a sympathetic strike be called to support the striking shopmen.

Mr. Roberts announced last night that he and E. L. Enke, a member of the union executive board had wired their recommendation to Mr. Grable proposing such action.

The vice president said he believed that all railroad organizations should come to the aid of the shopmen in view of the attitude adopted by managers of "certain eastern railroads." These managers, he believed, had joined managers in other regions in declining to restore seniority rights of striking shopmen and it was apparent their determination was to break up the shop crafts organization.

Mr. Roberts and Mr. Enke hold jurisdiction on 28 eastern railroads from the New York, Ontario and western on the north to the Baltimore and Ohio on the south.

Unions Refuse Proposal.

RICHMOND, Va., Aug. 5.—Members of the local shop crafts union, formerly employed by the Southern railway will not accept the proposal of the road that they return to work without prejudice to seniority rights. Decision to remain out was reached at a meeting last night and B. M. Jewell, president of the shopmen's union has been so notified it was announced.

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—New peace conferences were pending in Washington today in connection with the six-week-old shop walkout with strike threats from maintenance of way men and other workers and a conference with President Harding concerning the situation was sought by the big four brotherhoods.

Congress indirectly came into the negotiations, eastern railroads sent detachments of shop workers to the relief of roads in coal mining districts in Virginia, West Virginia and Kentucky and outbreaks of violence were reported from new points.

B. M. Jewell, president of the railway employees department of the American Federation of Labor, the shop crafts leader was in Washington where he was summoned by President Harding. Union chiefs here looked upon Mr. Jewell's presence at the capital as indicative of further settlement parleys. Officials of the Southern railroad and representatives of its shopmen were in Washington to confer on a possible separate peace.

William Roberts, vice-president of the maintenance men's union and E. L. Enke, member of the brotherhood executive board telegraphed, President F. E. Grable, recommending a sympathetic strike.

Ship Perishable Fruit.

HALL GAINS 7 VOTES IN PORTLAND

In 46 Precincts Net Gain for Defeated Candidate Seven—Judge Declares Hall Must File Specific Charges Concerning Each Name in List of 300 Contested.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5.—3:15 p.m. The recount at 2:15 this afternoon wiped out Hall's gains and the count for 55 out of 135 precincts gave Olcott a net gain of one vote.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5.—A recount of 46 precincts in the re-check of the republican primary vote for governor in 135 Multnomah county precincts shortly before noon today showed a net gain of 7 votes for Charles Hall, contestant, over Governor B. W. Olcott.

During the morning count Hall lost one vote. Losses and gains in the Olcott vote cancelled one another.

Circuit Judge Bingham announced that he would require attorneys for Hall to make specific charges concerning each name on the list of 300 filed yesterday. The same requirements will apply to the Olcott forces when they file a similar list Monday.

The recheck of precinct 2, however, precipitated an argument by counsel on an issue of which the court reserved decision until later. On the recheck of this precinct, Olcott gained one vote. It developed, however, that the ballots were not numbered nor signed by the election officials, nor was the ballot box sealed. In this precinct Hall received 81 votes and Olcott 40 votes. Two ballots were found to have been defective and one was spoiled.

Only one ballot was thrown out, but it had been previously thrown out by the regular judges of election. This ballot was secretly marked—the names of all gubernatorial candidates being pencilled out except those of Olcott and Benn. No cross was marked for either of these, however.

FINAL TARIFF VOTE BEFORE END OF MONTH

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—A unanimous consent agreement which republicans and democratic leaders hope will bring about a final vote on the tariff bill certainly before the end of this month was entered into today by the senate.

Under the terms of the agreement the highly controversial subjects in the bill, such as sugar, potato, white arsenic, boots and shoes, the flexible tariff and the scientific tariff, would be disposed of before August 11.

After that, remaining committee amendments and individual amendments would be considered with debate limited sharply.

Hunt Idaho Slayer

WALLACE, Idaho, Aug. 5.—Deputy sheriffs today were searching the hills between St. Maries and Wallace for Joe Farrir, who, according to official reports, yesterday shot and killed Joe Marsden, cedar pole contractor at Herdick, following a dispute over wages due Farrir. At last reports Farrir was headed for the Big Creek mining country where he is familiar with the country.

Fatty Arbuckle to Live in China for Indefinite Period

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 5.—Roscoe (Fatty) Arbuckle, motion picture comedian, has applied to federal officials here for passports for himself and his secretary, Harry Brand, "for a business trip of indefinite length" to China, Japan and Korea. They plan to sail from San Francisco August 16 on the Siberia Maru.

UNION ORGANIZER EMBEZZLES \$1400

TACOMA, Aug. 5.—James Boland, former secretary treasurer of the local lodge of the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and Railway Shop Laborers, is under arrest here today charged with embezzling \$1,400 from the union. The warrant for the arrest was sworn out by C. S. Taylor, traveling auditor of the brotherhood. Boland was put in the county jail here and his bail set at \$5,000.

Mr. Taylor said that Boland operated by issuing cards to members of the union, pocketing the money and tearing up the duplicate receipts. Boland declared his shortage resulted from the fact that burglars stole the funds from his home shortly before his term of office expired.

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Trace to Meet Firpo

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 5.—Louis Angel Firpo, heavyweight champion of South America, is to meet Jim Tracey, Australian champion, here on October 8, it was announced today by Jose Agusti, boxing promoter. The bout will be 15 rounds with six ounce gloves.

Forest Fire Patrol Plane Crashes Near Eureka, Men Escape

EUREKA, Ore., Aug. 5.—Sergeant Fred Kelly, pilot, and Sergeant Gravelin, both attached to the army's forest patrol aviation base here, were uninjured when their plane was forced to land 10 miles east of Eureka, Cal., at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The plane is a complete wreck. The men were taking the plane to Mather Field for overhauling. The report first given at Eureka was that the plane carried civilians, one a Portland man on the way to San Francisco to attend a sick wife.

PROFESSOR EINSTEIN PURSUED BY ASSASSINS, FLEES FROM GERMANY

LEIPZIG, Aug. 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—Professor Albert Einstein, originator of the theory of relativity, has fled from Germany temporarily because he was threatened with assassination by the same group which caused the murder of Dr. Walter Rathenau, the German foreign minister, according to a letter from Professor Einstein cancelling an engagement to address a meeting here.

Efforts to induce the noted scientist to return in view of the government's success in coping with the situation are said to have so far proved unavailing.

Considerable comment was caused in Geneva early this week by the absence of Dr. Einstein from the meeting of the members of the intellectual committee of the league of nations, to begin the work of organization. He had been designated to represent Germany but did not appear. It was said he was unable to leave his work at the University of Berlin. Dispatches from Germany shortly after the Rathenau murder quoted police authorities there as accusing the notorious "consul" organization with having marked 12 leading politicians, editors and financiers of Jewish extraction for assassination, including Dr. Rathenau, Theodore Wolff, editor of the Berliner Tageblatt, and Max Warburg, the Hamburg banker.

PARIS MAKES FIRST MOVE ON GERMANY

Premier Poincare Notifies Berlin First of Series of Measures Against Country for Non-Payment Reparations in Effect—More Severe Measures Held in Reserve.

PARIS, Aug. 5.—(By Associated Press.) Premier Poincare at noon today notified the German embassy at Paris that the first of a series of measures to conserve French interests against a lapse in Germany's pre-war debt payments, would be put into effect immediately. The notice followed the receipt of a note from Germany refusing to meet the \$2,000,000 installment on these payments to French citizens due August 15.

The first of the French measures consists of the immediate suspension of all payments to German nationals for debts contracted with Frenchmen before the war: both in France and Alsace-Lorraine. The offices in Paris and Strasbourg which were brought up to liquidate these debts were notified to cease operations and pay no more claims until further orders from the premier.

Payments Suspended

The initial measure also include the suspension of all further payments to Germans for German property sequestered in France. The property includes estates, villas, art collections, etc.

The agreement reached at Baden under which Germans were being compensated for the house furnishings, stocks, bonds and cash left in Alsace and Lorraine also is suspended.

It was explained at the foreign office that these first measures taken are not penalties, in the strictest sense of the word, but merely action to safeguard the French interests which have been jeopardized by the German refusal to pay.

If these measures fail to bring a satisfactory settlement, further and more severe measures, it was said, will be enforced.

The nature of these is withheld pending the effect of the present action.

DISALLOW INCREASES ON LUMBER TO EAST

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—Rates on lumber from California producing points to consuming territory around St. Paul, Minn., which railroads sought to increase May 1, were ordered held at present levels today by the interstate commerce commission. After investigating the new schedules which transcontinental railroads prepared to put into effect and which increased the lumber rates on concerned from 66.5 cents per 100 pounds to 73 cents per 100 pounds, the commission held today that the increase was unreasonable.

Bank Reserves Increase.

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—The actual condition of the clearing house banks and trust companies for the week shows that they had \$50,821,010 in excess of legal requirements. This is an increase of \$11,197,450 from last week.
