

HIRAM JOHNSON UPHOLDS HARDING STRIKE SOLUTION

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5.—It is the duty of the railroad executives acting for the carriers in the strike of railroad shopmen to accept the settlement plan proposed by President Harding, according to a statement made public today by Senator Hiram W. Johnson. The statement follows:

"The president cannot be too highly commended for his very earnest effort to settle the railroad strike. No state has hoped more fervently than California for the success of the president's efforts. The marvelous productivity of California is of little value without transportation. We are dependent on railroad facilities for the successful marketing of our fruits, our melons and agricultural products. The president has presented to both sides a plan of settlement which is the result of his study of the situation and one in which all his advisers concur. Apparently the plan is fair to employers and employees. The men have accepted the president's plan. The railroad companies have declined it.

"We may take it that the present administration will do injustice to neither side and would present no plan which does not safeguard the rights of both. The present situation, therefore is that a settlement is being blocked by the railroad companies. If this attitude continues California will suffer untold losses. Because of the vast stake that is ours in this controversy, indeed for the welfare of the nation and their own welfare, too, we devoutly hope the railroad executives will join the shopmen in yielding to the request and accepting the plan of the president."

DEMOCRATS WILL RUN INDEPENDENT AGAINST JIM REED

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—With the nomination of United States Senator James A. Reed assured, the St. Louis Post-Dispatch today publishes an article that a movement is afoot by anti-Reed democrats to bring out an independent candidate to oppose him at the November election. Should this materialize the race for the senatorial seat will be a three-cornered one.

The Post-Dispatch says half a dozen conferences have been held by anti-Reed forces since Breckinridge Long's defeat became apparent two days ago on the face of incomplete unofficial returns, and that the purpose of the conferences have been to consider the procedure to be followed in the effort to defeat Reed.

"It is the position of the anti-Reed democrats that Reed is not the nominee of the democratic party," the article continues, "that he was nominated by republican votes in St. Louis, Kansas City and a few counties and that on the democratic votes cast in the primary, Long really was nominated."

With only 31 precincts in the state unheard from, the count today stood: Reed 193,724; Long 187,649.

Reed departed for Washington this afternoon.

ORGANIZE SOCIETY TO PREVENT LOSS AUTO ACCIDENTS

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—As we of this society regard it, education and also an awakening of the moral sense of responsibility throughout the United States are the only means by which the immense toll of dead and injured by avoidable accidents, which take place yearly, can be reduced, for there is no expectation that accidents can be entirely averted. The dead from automobile accidents in this country in 1920 are given as 15,000 and the accidents from the same cause as 500,000, in round numbers. It is for the purpose of checking the conditions which made such a record possible and from every other source that this society has been organized.

There can be no question that life can be made safer if the public will support to a movement which is intended to benefit everyone. The slaughter which occurs every year by accident in the United States is possible of reduction to a comparatively small percentage, but this can only be accomplished if the public itself will aid.

Will Educate Public
There is no expectation on our part that we can do the impossible or change conditions overnight. What we have in view here is to educate the public mind to a point where everyone instinctively will do whatever may be possible to avoid accidents to themselves or their fellow beings. In this welfare work we seek to interest everybody.

We hear a good deal about "safety week," and that movement is an excellent one, but that comes around only once a year—one week out of every fifty-two. What becomes of the other fifty-one? That is just the trouble. A spurt of just one week, when, as a matter of fact, there should be no let up in work of this kind.

Of course, neither we nor any other reasonable person expect that, no matter how careful, accidents may be entirely averted. But have you thought of what might be done to avert accidents throughout the country and which could be done but which is not? Every day we read of accidents that involve either death or injury, or both, which might easily have been avoided if only caution had been exercised. Ask yourself honestly if this is not true.

Individual Aid Necessary
Well, if this be so, why should not advantage be taken of the fact and people everywhere be brought to realize what may be accomplished by the individual aid of men and women everywhere? Could there be any stronger plea for co-operation with friend and stranger?

We seek to inform people of the dangers which threaten them in various forms almost every hour of the day and night and that they in turn, like good Samaritans and sensible human beings, warn others of the care and caution needed to avoid those dangers. In the great majority of cases accidents are due to carelessness or heedlessness. These can and should be avoided.

The power of this movement will lie in numbers.

In this work there will be no great buildings erected or plans formulated involving great expense. Our funds will be devoted to actual work along lines provided for in our articles of incorporation. If we can save 100 lives each year we shall count our money well invested.

States senate by Senator Spencer of Missouri would establish a new federal court of conciliation for settlement of disputes between employers and employees.

A statement by the federal department of agriculture yesterday said the railroad strike had not affected shipment of perishable food supplies.

Shipments of fourteen leading fruits and vegetables were nearly 30,000 cars ahead of last season, the report added.

In asking their legislative representatives in Washington to arrange a conference with President Harding, the heads of three of the big four brotherhoods said dangers of their occupation were increasing because of the strike to such an extent they feared a continuation of the conditions would result in their members being drawn into the controversy. The association of railway executives last night denied that impairment of locomotives and cars had reached the stage which would justify any public concern. At Newark, Ohio, a negro claiming to be a federal deputy marshal shot and killed a striking shopman.

The state of Nevada offered a reward of \$1000 for the arrest and conviction of men who kidnaped and tarred a Union Pacific trainmaster at Las Vegas. An effort to blow up a coal chute in the yards of the Southern railroad at Chattanooga, Tenn., was frustrated.
