A. B. Cordley and Sam H. Moore of Corvallis, and Martin D. Bowers of Gold Hill, members of the state limestone board, made an official inspection of the plant and quarry Saturday. Orders for 2000 tons of limestone for farmers of western Oregon have been filled for immediate and fall delivery. At least 2000 tons additional are expected to be sold. The plant is being operated by Ross & Shoemaker on a tonnage basis. The original contract calls for not less than 1000 or more than 2000 tons. The board is entering into a new contract with these operators for several thousand additional tons of fertilizer, which will insure uninterrupted operation of the plant for the year.
