

CHINATOWN, N. Y. IS SEETHING, HIP SING TONG VICTIM

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—Chinatown today seethed with rumors and sudden periods of panic among its Oriental population while the body of Ko Low, national president of the Hip Sing, lay in state in the tong's headquarters in Pell street. Ko Low died early today after Chinese gunmen toppled him into the gutter with a bullet in his back as he left a Chinese restaurant within the bounds of Hip Sing territory, near his home. The slayers of the powerful tong chieftain were declared to have been strangers in the Chinese section.

Police who flooded the quarter scout reports that Ko Low's murder means a re-opening of the wars of the past that swept Chinatown, leaving dozens of tongmen dead along the boundary line that once separated Leong territory from the Hip Sing and Bing Kong tongs.

"We do not know what it is about," said Lee Yee Hing, state president of the Hip Sing tong. "When we find out who the killers are, then we will know how to act and what to do."

Bankers May Reconvene
LONDON, Aug. 7.—The Times correspondent in Paris says he hears from a competent American authority that the bankers committee is likely to be reconvened not later than October to negotiate a small loan for Germany and that J. P. Morgan is remaining in Europe to be in readiness for such an event.

HUNT FOR REMAINS OF ANIMAL LIVING IN BYGONE YEARS

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—(By the Associated Press)—A five-years' hunt for fossils of extinct species of mammals which appeared 550,000 to 2,000,000 years ago will be begun next October when Professor Elmer S. Riggs, associate curator of paleontology of the field museum of natural history and three assistants will sail for Buenos Aires on the first leg of their journey. Their expedition will be the sixth of this year from the museum.

Sometime during the geological yesterday, many species of warm blooded mammals, predecessors to the animal life of today, began to appear in South America. Most of these were unable to cope with the tremendous climatic and geographical changes which took place and gradually vanished from the ranks of living things.

After exploring the Argentine pampas, from the pampas the party will strike southward along the Atlantic coast as far as the Straits of Magellan. In places the work will be along beaches where the ledges are exposed and accessible only a few hours during the day.

In the extremity of Patagonia, a land of strange legend and folk-story the party will search for fossil remains of unique and much more ancient animals, which were residents of South America in the ages when it was almost as widely separated from its northern sister, North America, as Australia is now separated from Asia. This isolation accounts for strange fossils in that ancient land. From the straits the party will turn inland and the search will be extended westward over the barren, wind-swept plains toward the base of the Andes.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—(By Associated Press). Faced with probable rejection of his latest rail strike settlement proposal by the striking railway shopmen and with a reply from the executives as yet uncertain, President Harding today let it be known that he is desirous of having the house reconvene next Tuesday prepared to enact any legislation which might be deemed advisable in connection with the industrial situation.

The president, it was said at the White House, has informed the house leaders that he is opposed to any program of three day recesses such as has been contemplated. He had suggested to the leaders, it was further stated, that instead of marking time with a handful of membership after the house reconvenes next Tuesday, a full membership be on hand so that congress might function in case any legislation is needed to carry out the administration's program with respect to the coal and railroad situation.

U. S. Hydroplane Hops For a Flight From New York to S. A.

Philadelphia, Aug. 8.—"The Sampaio Correa," the hydroplane which is to make a flight from New York to South America, hopped off on the first leg of its journey from Essington to New York at 3:04 p. m. today.

The huge seaplane was piloted by Lieutenant Walter Hinton, trans-Atlantic flier.

The seaplane is scheduled to leave New York next Saturday for the South American expedition at Rio de Janeiro, reaching Brazil by easy stages. After a brief stay at the exposition, an exploration trip will be made up to the headwaters of the Amazon.

Besides Lieutenant Hinton, the plane carried Dr. E. H. Martin, an amateur aviator of Brazil, a mechanic, a newspaperman and a motion picture photographer.

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—A referee's report recommending that a decree of divorce be granted Arthur A. Gordon against Nora Bayes, actress, who is known in private life as Eleanor Gordon, was filed in court here today.

Mrs. Gordon is accused of misconduct with Arthur Welton. The report recommended that Gordon's adopted son, John Katuz, aged three, be left to the care of his foster father.

Sensational testimony was presented against Miss Bayes, popular in vaudeville and musical comedy, who has been married and divorced several times. Witnesses for the plaintiff, who lives at the Lamb's club, testified that at 5 a. m. on January 30, they entered a private house on West End avenue through a parlor window and found Miss Bayes and Welton, described as a Baltimore banker, in a bedroom.

Miss Bayes, after whom a New York theater was named, once was the wife of Jack Norworth, actor. She married Gordon in 1920.

PACIFIC LINER IS NOW SAFE AT DOCK

SEATTLE, Aug. 8.—Carrying the 326 passengers of the San Francisco-Seattle liner, H. F. Alexander, which stove in her bow early yesterday on Cape rock, thirty miles south of Cape Flattery, the Admiral Schley docked here at 3:30 this morning.

After the transfer of passengers and some of the crew of the Alexander about 25 miles inside the Strait of Juan de Fuca yesterday afternoon, the Alexander was left to make her way to this port with the aid of the coast guard boat Snohomish.

Four slight casualties among passengers were reported when the Schley arrived here. Two women had wrists and two men knees sprained.

Passengers were taken from the Alexander to the Snohomish, which carried them to the Schley. The transfer was completed at six o'clock.
