

LIE DETECTOR IS EXPLAINED TO BAR ASSOCIATION

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 8.—Pre-
convention activities of the American
Bar Association were in full swing
today.

The Conference of Bar Association
delegates which includes only the ac-
credited delegates from the various
bar associations of the nation, open-
ed its sessions, as did the Section on
Legal Education, the Judicial section,
the section on Public Utility Law and
the section on Criminal Law.

Chief Justice William Howard
Taft was scheduled as the chief
speaker before the Judicial section,
which includes all of the judges of
the United States.

Judge Clarence M. Goodwin, of
Chicago, presided at the sessions of
the Bar Association delegates.

Great interest centered in the ses-
sions of the Section on Public Util-
ity Law. Edwin O. Egerton, former
railroad commissioner of California;
Nathaniel T. Guernsey of New York,
Hugh Gordon, attorney for the Cali-
fornia railroad commission, and
Franklin T. Griffith of Oregon, were
among the experts on the program
for addresses.

Dr. John Larsen, inventor of the
"lie detector," was to explain and
demonstrate his apparatus for the
Criminal Law section, and Chief of
Police August Vollmer, originator of
the "scientific cop," was to speak on
"Policemen." The indeterminate sen-
tence was to be discussed by this
body. Prof. A. M. Kidd, of the Uni-
versity of California Law school, was
to lead this discussion.

The sessions of the national at-
torney-general continued today.

All is in readiness for the formal
opening tomorrow of the American
Bar Association convention, when the
many specialized meetings which
have preceded the main convention
will come to an end, and the general
sessions open.

Considerable disappointment is felt
by the delegates over the inability
of Secretary of States Charles E.
Hughes and former Secretary of State
Ellihu Root to attend this convention.
Both have been important figures in
past conventions, but press of other
matters prevented their coming here
for this convention.

WIFE SENATOR NELSON DIES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—Mrs. Nich-
oline Jacobson Nelson, wife of Senator
Nelson of Minnesota, died early today
after a long illness. She was a native
of Norway and married Senator Nelson

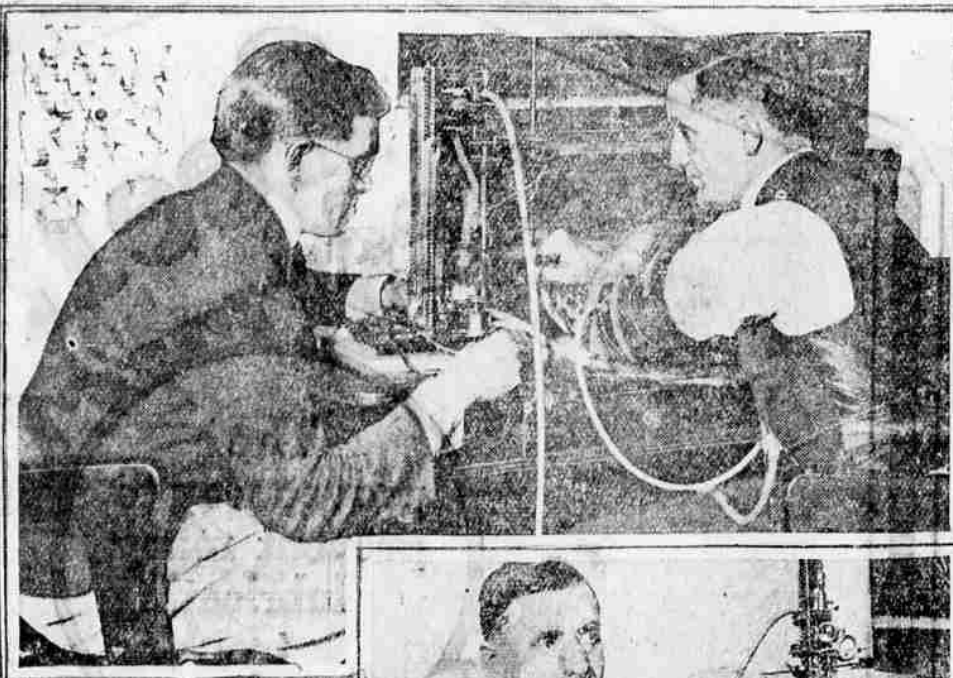

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BERKELEY, Cal., Aug. 9.—What
will the invention of the "lie detec-
tor" mean to criminal investigation?

This question was asked Chief of
Police August Vollmer, head of the
only police department in the world
employing the device, and in whose
department it was worked out by Dr.
J. A. Larsen, one of Vollmer's super-
cops, who is a university graduate
and a scientist.

"It will eliminate conviction of the
innocent and insure the conviction of
the guilty," said Chief Vollmer.

"It will put an end to spurious wills
and eliminate the long and costly
legal contests which ensue in such
cases.

"It will assist in putting to an
end forgery of documents and ma-
terially aid in settling civil cases in
which deception figures—

"If it works out."

And it is upon this IF that Dr.
Larsen is now working.

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Labor and Ku Klux Put Over Win in Arkansas

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 9.—The
combined endorsement of labor, the
Ku Klux Klan and at least a fair per-
centage of the women's vote, appar-
ently has swept the state in victory
for Governor Thomas C. McRae, can-

didate for re-election in the demo-
cratic primary, held throughout Ark-
ansas yesterday. Unofficial returns
compiled today from approximately a
fourth of the state gave Governor
McRae a lead of more than two to
one over his opponent, E. P. Toney,
of Lakeview.

The vote was McRae 261,294; Toney
17,288.

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JAPS FEAR EFFORT BY BOLSHEVIKI

TOKIO, Aug. 9.—(By the Asso-
ciated Press.)—A vernacular news-
paper report predicts that the Jap-

anese evacuation of Siberia will be
made the occasion of an effort by the
Far Eastern republic at Chita, which
is favorable to the soviet to over-
throw the Vladivostok administra-
tion. Chita troops are reported ad-
vancing southward along the Usuri
railway while local garrisons are be-
ing reinforced.

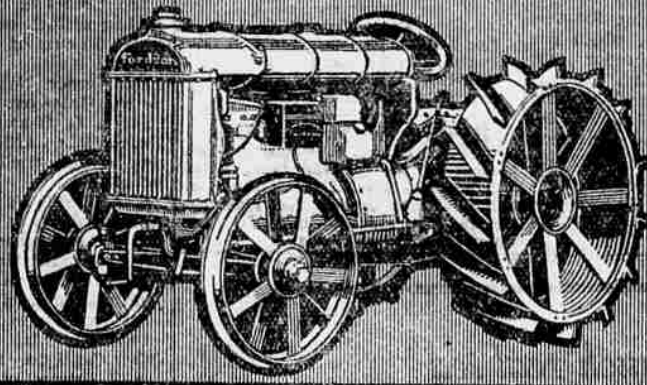

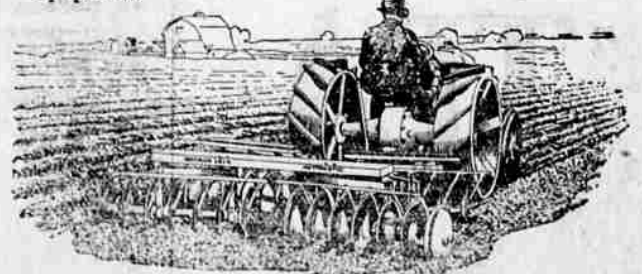
