HIDES SENT BACK TO FREE LIST BY SENATE, 39 TO 26

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—Concurring in the action of the house, the senate sent hides back to the free list.

The vote was 39 to 26. Rates of two cents on raw, green or pickled and four cents on dried hides had been recommended by the finance committee majority at the instance of the republican tariff bloc. There was a split among both republican and democrats on the issue, with some majority leaders refusing to go along with the committee. The tariff bloc also failed to hold all its forces in line.

Boots and shoes were restored to the free list without a record vote.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—The proposed tariff on hides would increase the nation's shoe and leather bill \$110,000,000 a year, Senator Walsh, democrat, Massachusetts, declared today in the senate, in opening the fight against the rates proposed by the finance committee majority and supported by the republican agricultural-tariff bloc.

Senator Walsh argued that even if the imports were reflected in the prices paid to cattle raisers, the total benefit to cattlemen would amount to only \$15,000,000 a year.

"Whatever benefit will inure to any individual or group of individuals by reason of a duty on hides," he said, "will be chiefly to the packers, as they handle 65 per cent of the domestic hide production."

"The duty will tend to break, if not destroy the independent tanning industry and extend to the packers a growing monopoly of the tanning business."

COAL STRIKERS ASK IMPEACHMENT GOV.

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Aug. 9.—(By Associated Press.) Impeachment of Governor Warren T. McCray for his action in sending troops into the coal field here was demanded by a mass meeting of striking miners and union labor men here this afternoon, following a demonstration on the streets when more than 4000 men staged a protest parade.

The parade was made up of miners, striking railway shopmen and members of unions not on strike. Banners denouncing the governor, mine operators and railroad executives were carried in the parade. Following the march, a mass meeting was held at the courthouse, where addresses were made by labor leaders.

REDUCE FREIGHT ON EGGS SHIPPED EAST

SEATTLE, Aug. 9.—Reactions in freight charges on eggs to points east of Chicago announced yesterday by the trans-continental railroads mean a saving of \$35,000 a year to western Washington shippers, according to H. E. Wills, manager of the Washington co-operative and poultry association.

The rate for several years has been \$3 per hundred pounds to Chicago and points east. A cut to \$2.60 to Chicago was made by the railroads last May and now this rate is made

AMERICAN MINER KILLED IN MEXICO

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 9.—The body of Thomas Martin, the American who was killed near La Zaca mine by a band of men from a nearby mine last Sunday was shipped to El Paso yesterday, according to dispatches from Torreón.

Reports to the war office from Captain Martinez, commanding the troops in the Torreón region, confirm the published story that bandits were not responsible for the killing. Martin and his companion, George Markers, being attacked by a rebellious mining faction. Ten men have been arrested, several of whom were identified by Markers, who is seriously injured.
