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GOLD SUPPLY IN
WORLD LARGEST
IN ALL HISTORY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—Gold held by the central banks of all principal world powers now amounts to \$7,851,000,000—a new record. This sum is an increase of \$1,238,000,000 in two years. The increase is due to the fact that governments by restrictive gold policies have brought gold out of hiding. Then there has been a steady flow of new gold from the mines.

Of the world's total the United States has 40 per cent, or \$3,170,000,000. Most of this gold is in the possession of the twelve federal reserve banks of the federal reserve system, or in the vaults of the United States treasury and its branch depositories. The grand total of all available gold does not include gold in Russia.

The federal reserve board is authority for the statement that the major part of Russian gold has found its way into the reserves of other countries. Most of it has reached the vaults of the reserve banks in the United States. The Russian central reserve gold fund originally amounted to \$787,000,000 in 1913.

America's gold holdings have risen at a tremendous rate since the Great War. Total gold stocks in the United States in 1913 were \$691,000,000. Five years later it had increased to \$2,245,000,000.

Gold reserves of Great Britain and France have dropped considerably in the past two years because of heavy shipments to the United States to pay obligations. Japan is absorbing much of the gold that is now going out of the United States. Japan now stands fourth in the list of principal gold holders.

CAPTAIN HONEYWELL
LANDS PARIS RACE

PARIS, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press)—Captain H. E. Honeywell, piloting an American army balloon in the James Gordon Bennett cup race, landed on Monday at Taplo-Gyrgy, forty kilometers east of Budapest, having traveled a distance of 1060 kilometers, says a Geneva dispatch this afternoon to the Havas agency. This is the greatest distance yet reported from any of the contestants.

PRESIDENT OF HIP
SING TONG LIES
IN REGAL STATE

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—In a copper-sheathed casket with gold handles and name plate, the body of Ko Low, murdered national president of the Hip Sing tong, lies in state in the tong's black draped lodge room as hundreds of Chinese from all over the United States pass in a last tribute to the dead leader, stricken down by an assassin's bullet.

Delegates of the Hip Sing tong from foreign countries are hurrying here to attend the funeral, which will be held Sunday and will cost more than \$10,000 according to those in charge of the arrangements.

Reports are current that the slaying was the result of a private feud and will not cause a renewal of the long buried tong war saws.

3 GERMANS BORN
TO 1 FRENCHMAN

PARIS, Aug. 10.—(By L. N. S.)—Three Germans are born for every Frenchman, claims Gustave Hervé, writing in L'Homme Libre and basing his statement on French population figures just published for the first three months of 1922.

According to Hervé the population of France is decreasing 200,000 a year.

Out of twenty departments reported on for January, February and March, 1922, eighteen show a serious preponderance of deaths over births. Hervé points out at present basis the number of men coming into military service each year now being estimated at 250,000, the classes which will come to serve in 1921 will not exceed in number 225,000 and in 1924 140,000.

Meanwhile, Germany, with a birth rate exceeding a death rate by 700,000, according to Hervé, already has made up the difference in her population occasioned by the loss of Alsace-Lorraine (population 1,800,000), and is on the way to even greater than pre-war numerical advantage.

MAY REDUCE RATES
EAST TO CALIFORNIA

CHICAGO, Aug. 10.—The Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad has submitted a proposition to other trans-continental roads to reduce regular one-way passenger fares \$10 and sleeping car charges \$2 between Chicago and California. It was announced today. The proposed reductions were considered at a meeting of general passenger agents of the trans-continental lines today.

The contemplated rate cuts are to be brought about by placing in effect a second-class passenger fare which has not existed since the war, at \$10 less than the present first class passenger fare of \$20.

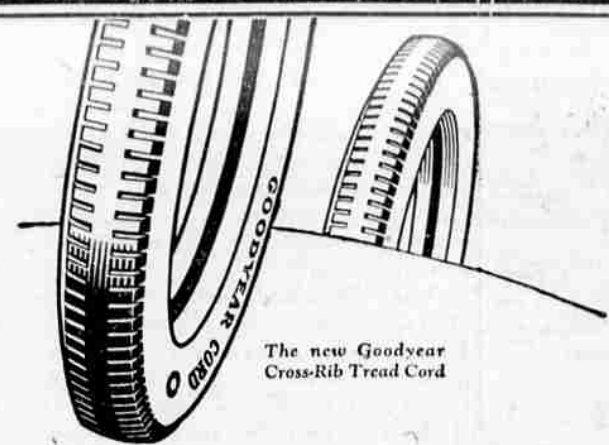
