THE CAUSE OF LAWLESSNESS.

THE report of a special committee before the American Bar association in San Francisco, shows that the United States is the most lawless country in the world. Crimes of all sorts have increased until to quote the report, "our situation today appears as bad as that of England, France, Italy and Spain as late as 1837 as portrayed by Lord Bowen."

It is fashionable to blame the war for everything undesirable including the crime wave. But this special committee declares the war is not to blame. Statistics are quoted to show there has been no similar increase in crime in England, Canada, or France, "although the effects of the war naturally must be more marked in those countries."

A number of causes are given such as delays in justice, the expense of litigation which handicaps the person of modest means; unlimited sale of firearms, etc., but in our judgment, the greatest single cause is a general public indifference toward law violations.

Few criminals are born. They are made, largely the product of their education and environment. When the public, as a whole, winks at violations of the fundamental law, how can anyone expect the young or misguided to grow up with any very strict sense of their obligation to obey all laws.

There is no logic that can justify the violation of one law, and not justify the violation of another. It is not for the individual to pick and choose. As long as a law is on the statute books, it is the duty of all right minded citizens to obey it. If they believe the law wrong, it is their privilege to work for its repeal, if they believe the law right it is their duty to support its enforcement.

When public opinion in this country has risen to this plane of citizenship, there will be a marked decrease in lawlessness, and there will be no material improvement until universal respect for all laws, becomes a common habit.

FINANCE WHEAT
GROWERS IN STATE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—Applica-
tions for loans from cotton and
wheat growers associations aggregat-
ing \$17,000,000 were approved today
by the war finance corporation.

The corporation approved the ap-
plication of the staple cotton growers
competitive association of Mississippi
for an advance of not exceeding
\$7,000,000,000 to assist in the orderly
marketing of cotton.

The other advances approved were:
Washington Wheat Growers' asso-
ciation \$2,000,000; Idaho Wheat
Growers' association \$1,500,000; the
Montana Wheat Growers' association
\$1,500,000 and North Dakota Wheat
Growers' association \$5,000,000.

"These four associations," the cor-
poration said, "now have under ne-
gotiation or have completed arrange-
ments for considerable advances from
the banks in their respective states.
The Oregon Wheat Growers' Co-opera-
tive association has already ar-
ranged to finance all its requirements
through private banking channels in
Oregon."

Advances to co-operative market-
ing associations to assist in financing
the orderly marketing of agricultural
products during the coming season
total \$104,000,000 to date, the corpora-
tion added.

Beer Keg Cork Pops
Man in Eye; He Sues
For \$50,950 Damages

AKRON, O., Aug. 10.—(By I. N. S.)—
An "unsuitable cork," which popped
from a keg full of temperance drink
known as "cream beer," is responsible
for the suit for \$50,950 alleged dam-
ages filed by Jacob Burger against
the Renner Products company.

Declaring that the company failed
to tip him off that the keg of beer
would generate a "kick" of gas, Bur-
ger told the court that he lost twelve
weeks of his time, the sight of his
right eye and 25 per cent of the
vision of his other eye.

Burger stated that when he bought
the temperance drink the company
gave him something to put into the
keg "to make the beer suitable to
the trade."

The cork, designated by Burger as
"unsuitable," hit him in the right eye.

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LONG DROUGHT
IN WASHINGTON
BROKEN AT LAST

WENATCHEE, Wash., Aug. 10.—
Wenatchee was visited by the first
rain of the season last night. Rain
began falling at eight o'clock again
this morning. The Waterville coun-
try reports show a heavy rain storm
last night, although it is too late to
be of any benefit to the crops. The
rain was accompanied by a strong
wind which blew down much of the
grain, it was said.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 10.—While
of incalculable benefit in quenching
forest fires, last night's rain will not
materially aid agriculture through-
out the state, in the opinion of E. L.
French, state director of agriculture.
The moisture will help late pasture
and benefit the potato crop, said Mr.
French and it may assist spring
wheat not yet harvested. Most of the
wheat crop has already been cut. The
rain may help late fruit in the south-
ern part of the state.

TACOMA, Aug. 10.—The long dry
spell in southwest Washington was
broken today by a rain declared to be
worth many thousands of dollars to
dairymen, fruit and berry growers
and timber owners. The last pre-
vious rain was on May 24, or 77 days
ago and the dry stretch, the longest
in several years, reduced berry crops
all over the southwest dried up pas-
tures and parched the woods so that
forest fires raged with frequency.

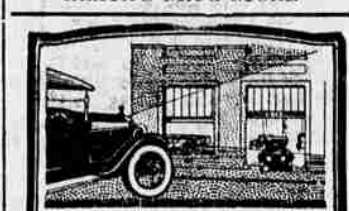
The rain today began to fall at 3
a. m. after slight sprinkles last night
and it was continuing today over the
entire southwest section. A half inch
had fallen here up to ten o'clock this
morning.

Late berry crops are expected to
be revived by the rain, and present
forest fires checked and possibly ex-
tinguished. The weather forecast
here is for continued rain for to-
night and tomorrow.

WEAR PHEASANT CAP

SEATTLE, Aug. 10.—American
Legion delegates from the state of
Washington will wear novel and dis-
tinctive headgear when they attend
the national convention of the legion
which will be held in New Orleans
next November.

Formed along the same lines as the
overseas caps, the official cap is tilted
slightly to one side by a pheasant's
tail cockade which sweeps over the
wearer's left shoulder while on the
opposite side is represented a
large red apple. The cockade is held
in place by a green felt pine tree.
Around the band the word "Washing-
ton" will appear in large yellow let-
ters.
