STRIKE BREAKER BRINGS CASE IN MEDFORD COURT

B. F. Montgomery, R. A. Miller and Frank Feigh appeared this morning before Justice Taylor on charges of carrying concealed weapons. The complaints against the three men, who are striking S. P. employees, were filed by Victor Q. Potter, a strikebreaker, who is employed at the Ashland S. P. roundhouse.

Potter alleges that the men came to his tent at the Jackson Hot Springs auto camp ground, and ordered him to quit work at the Ashland roundhouse. They informed him that he was "scabbing" and told him to go "back to California where he belonged." Potter's car bears a California license.

Montgomery was the only man who got out of the car when the men drove to the camp ground, according to Potter's testimony. He also said that if Montgomery had a gun, that he, Potter, did not notice it. However, when it became apparent that action was about to begin in the argument at the camp, stated Potter, Montgomery called to the other men who drew pistols from their hip pockets and laid them on the auto seat beside them.

Potter said that he was standing beside his own car and that the men who drew the guns were sitting in another car 50 feet distant with the top and windshield up. Upon cross examination he was asked by Attorney F. P. Farrell, for the defense, if he was sure that the men drew guns, was asked if the barrels of the guns were blue, to which he answered in the affirmative, and was asked if he was sure that they had been drawn from the hip pockets. At first he said that the men might have been sitting on the guns and when asked the question a second time, said that he was positive that they had been drawn from the hip pockets.

After the alleged guns appeared Potter went into his tent, got his gun, started his car and left for Ashland, where he went to the S. P. trainmaster for advice. The trainmaster advised that he go to the justice of the peace, where he swore out the complaints. Potter testified that the men followed him the entire distance to the justice's office after he had left the camp. Four men occupied the car and no complaint was sworn out for one of them as Potter could not identify him.

PUBLIC IS INVITED TO ATTEND PICNIC WOODMEN LODGES

The various camps of the Woodmen of the World and the Modern Woodmen of America in the valley from Grants Pass to Ashland, have united for a monster picnic at Lithia park in Ashland on Labor Day, Monday, September 4, and the various committees are now busy arranging a splendid program for the occasion.

Some of the features of the picnic will be addresses by prominent members of both orders, music and dancing, a variety of unique races for good prizes, and a big basket dinner. In the valley there are about 2000 members of both orders, and the gathering will be known strictly as a "Woodmen" picnic, neither order attempting in the slightest manner to attain more prominence than the other. The principal speaker, whom the committee expects to secure, has a state-wide acquaintanceship, and is a member of both orders and will confine his address to woodcraft and fraternalism.

Although the picnic will be given under the auspices of the two Woodmen orders, it will be open to the families of the members and the public. A general invitation is extended to everybody in southern Oregon and northern California to come and enjoy the day whether they are members of the order or not. Bring well filled baskets, coffee, cream and sugar will be furnished by the committee.

In a few days the entire program will be completed and given to the press of the valley for publication.

GIANTS ON SKIDS BEATEN BY REDS, CARDINALS WIN

CHICAGO, Aug. 11.—(By the Associated Press) — The skidding Giants tumbled to defeat for the third straight time yesterday, 7 to 3, at the hands of the Cincinnati Reds, falling still further away from the National league lead as the Cardinals won an easy victory from the Braves by the same score.

The American league teams were idle. The Pirates, winning from the Phillies for their eleventh straight victory in their steady march toward first place, are hammering the ball with such tremendous force that the pitchers on the opposing clubs are beginning to wonder if it is possible to stop the slugging. They drove out 16 more hits giving them a total of 84 in the four-game series with the Phillies for a total of 108 bases. They also have been traveling fast on the bases, the records showing they scored 57 runs in the series.

The Dodgers came back at the Cubs after dropping the first two and handed their opponents a 16 to 1 defeat.
