ROGUE RIVER, Aug. 10.—On Saturday last President A. R. Brashear of the Rogue River Community club received a telephone message from Medford and was much gratified to learn that H. O. Frohbach, secretary of the Medford chamber of commerce, would be in Rogue River Monday evening at the Community hall to address the members of the club and furnish entertainment. True to his word Mr. Frohbach was on deck Monday evening, accompanied by a number of business men of Medford, including County Agent Cate, H. G. Launsbach, V. H. Vawter, Paul McDonald, Larry Mann, and Benj. C. Sheldon. County Agent Cate gave an interesting and instructive talk relative to the preparation of exhibits for the fair. V. H. Vawter, cashier of the Jackson County bank and president of the Medford chamber of commerce, and Benj. C. COUNTY COURT TO INSPECT MT. ASHLAND ROAD

ASHLAND, Aug. 11.—The stage of practical inspection has arrived in regard to deciding upon merits of the Mount Ashland highway. The city is unanimous as to completing this roadway from the standpoint of a scenic asset, but co-operation is necessary from other sources. Upon representations being made to the county court, that body will visit the canyon and its surroundings in the near future, and, like Moses of old, "view the landscape over," accompanied by the state highway engineer, who will pass upon the technical details as applying to actual construction. The city council will act as sky pilots to the visiting delegation. Hence, on or about the 15th of the present month, if anybody happens to note a cavalcade winding its way up the canyon, rest assured that the delegation is not a mere picnic party, but an official one duly authorized to pass upon the question of extending an important link in the chain of scenic highway construction. The road is already completed in a substantial way two or three miles beyond the Sap-and-Salt hacienda. Councilmen Pierce, Harner and Frost, as a special committee, recently interviewed the county court respecting this road improvement project, with the result that, after a thorough personal inspection, some definite results are anticipated. The possibilities of a fine automobile roadway on easy grades from city precincts to Siskiyou station on the railroad, via the canyon route, with stopovers at Sap-and-Salt, Gribble's Cabin and the summit, are worthy of development in connection with the major plan of making Ashland an ideal resort center.

The ranch of Joe Sander, in this vicinity, will be the scene of one of the dairy meetings to be held throughout the county. This gathering will be at 2 o'clock on Friday afternoon of this week, Aug. 11. Next week the 1925 exposition caravan, heralding the big show at Portland in that year, will visit southern Oregon territory. Its arrival here is scheduled for Friday, Aug. 18, and already plans are suggested for dining the visitors as a preliminary to a big outdoor gathering in the parks incident to boosting the exposition movement.

Nearly a dozen representative musical masterpieces from an instrumental viewpoint were incorporated in the band concert, which according to the weekly program was given in the parks on Thursday evening this week, Carl Loveland being the director.
