

START WORK SOON ON BIG AMUSEMENT PAVILION AT FAIR

The Medford Amusement Co., a newly formed syndicate of local business men, will start work at once upon the amusement pavilion at the new county fair grounds. For a time it appeared as though the 1922 fair would have to go through without adequate amusement facilities to entertain the vast crowds who will attend the biggest and best county fair ever held in Jackson county. However, at the 11th hour, a number of "live-wire" Medford business men stepped in, formed a company and made all necessary arrangements for immediate construction of this important concession.

The structure will not be, as first planned, a temporary pavilion to be torn down after fair week, but will consist of a permanent building to take care of any local demands which may occur the year around. It will be located on the Pacific Highway about midway between the woman's building and the grand stand and will eventually have an entrance gate of its own, facilitating traffic directly from the highway.

The building will be 72 by 92 feet in size and will conform to the lines of architecture laid down by the fair board, estimated cost to be around \$5000. Special attention will be paid to the selection and construction of the dance floor which promises to be one of the finest floors in the state. All modern conveniences for the comfort of patrons will be installed, including a nicely appointed ladies' rest room, gentlemen's smoking room, sanitary drinking fountains and other up to date equipment.

The entire structure will be built with a view to permanency and will prove a welcome addition to the present collection of fair buildings.

Last but not least, the members of the company have announced that upon the termination of their contract with the fair board, they will turn over the entire building, free of all encumbrance to the Jackson County Fair association, to become a unit of the finest fair grounds on the Pacific coast.

his return, resumed the active direction of Sinn Fein affairs.

Early in June, 1921, there were reports of a London conference at which Irish leaders would be invited to consult with members of the British cabinet.

Griffith's release followed later in the same month and he accompanied Mr. DeValera to London in July, when the extended series of conferences was opened.

Breaks With DeValera

Later Griffith was appointed chairman of the Sinn Fein mission and was in London through October, November and December, carrying on the negotiations which culminated on December with the signing of the treaty between Great Britain and Ireland.

While DeValera has stood uncompromisingly for absolute independence, Griffith, with Collins held to the view that the system of Irish freedom typified by the free state treaty was the best for the Irish nation. The two factions worked together in all matters until the Anglo-Irish conference was called when their divergent views came into open conflict, with the result that even with the treaty ratified by vote, warfare against its execution continues between the republicans and the free staters.

S. P. STRIKERS ARE FREED ON CHARGE IN JUSTICE COURT

Frank Feigh, B. F. Montgomery and R. A. Miller, Southern Pacific strikers who were brought before a jury yesterday in Justice Taylor's court on charges of carrying concealed weapons were found not guilty. The charges were filed by Victor F. Potter, a strikebreaker, now employed at the Southern Pacific roundhouse who alleged that the men were carrying concealed weapons when visited his camp at Jackson Hot Springs and ordered him to quit his job, saying that he was "scabbing."

The jury which heard the case was composed of: Wm. Bayes, A. W. Walker, Ralph Jolly, H. C. Burgess, F. F. Stone and Ed Blinn. Frank Farrell represented the three defendants and District Attorney Rawles Moore handled the state's side of the case.

Potter who took the stand as first witness for the prosecution testified upon cross-examination that there were four men in the car. It later developed that there were five. He stated also that the car which drove into the camp and which contained the men that threatened him was 50 feet from him and was facing his tent when he saw occupants of the car draw pistols from their hip pockets.

The defendants who took the stand in their own defense did not deny having made the trip to the camp for the purpose of intimidating Potter, but testified that not one of them had a gun. They also refuted Potter's testimony that, when action seemed apparent that he had gone into his own tent and secured his gun, by saying that no such action had taken place and that even Potter had no gun. Several nearby campers who were present when the argument took place, testified for the defense.

WHAT SALVATION ARMY HAS DONE HERE IN ONE YEAR

Even though the Salvation Army has carried on a successful work for 57 years, its value to the various communities was not fully realized by the general public until a few years ago. It was the late World War that opened the eyes of the public. The unostentatious but faithful workers soon made their mark on the battlefields of Europe, causing floods of letters to reach friends and loved ones at home, telling of the great work done by this organization over there. Up until this time the public in general little realized the value of the work done by the Salvation Army, and therefore they had assumed an attitude of toleration, instead of appreciation of the great value of the organization.

"To not have availed ourselves of the honor during the war would have been folly," some one has declared. Even so, at the present time and in times of peace many have come to realize the great necessity of the use of the Army to their fullest capacity in the battlefields of life. Medford is no exception. Although the Army has been here for only a year, the following report shows the great necessity of the valuable work the Army is doing in Jackson county.

For the past year there has been a steady growth in the relief and rescue work in this county. Looking at the figures just presented to the advisory board for the past year's work we find that there have been held:

Two hundred open air meetings; approximate attendance 9575.

Two hundred fifteen indoor meetings; approximate attendance 3082.

Number of people forward to altar during year, 82.

Young people's meetings, 58; attendance, 1542.

Relief work during the year as follows:

Garments given away to worthy poor, 78.

Number of pairs of shoes, 123.

Lodgings, 73.

Positions found for unemployed, 42.

Meals furnished to hungry, 72.

Families given temporary relief, 183.

Number of persons in those families, 439.

Total relief for the year \$920.85.

1000 Hours Visitation

The officers in charge of the corps in this town and county during the past year have spent over one thousand hours in house-to-house visitation, seeking to alleviate the suffering of the poor and needy.

The fundamental principle of the Salvation Army is to help a man or a woman so that they can help themselves. The Army endeavors to use each and every deed of kindness, each act of charity, and each branch of its work to make men and women self-supporting, better citizens, and capable of taking care of themselves.

It is the intention of the Salvation Army at this time to put on a financial campaign in this county to raise a budget for the relief and rescue work of the army for the coming year.

The exalted ruler of the Elks lodge, together with other members of the order, met with Envoy E. L. Graves, financial representative of the Salvation Army, at the Elks club yesterday, and formed a plan whereby the B. P. O. E. lodge of Medford will get behind the campaign and push it to a success.

The Salvation Army also has the endorsement of the Chamber of Commerce. And the amount necessary for the work for the coming year is placed at \$3500.

Representatives of the Salvation Army, together with members of the Elks lodge, will be calling upon the people of this county in a few days to put the campaign over.
