

11 COMMUNITY EXHIBITS PLANNED FOR COUNTY FAIR

Eleven community exhibits are being prepared for the Jackson county fair with more in prospect, according to N. C. Cheney, secretary of the Fair Bureau. Products entered must have commercial value to the community where grown in order to participate in the credits given the community.

Exhibits entered by communities may include a wide diversity of products such as threshed grain and grass seed, grains, grasses, etc., in sheaves, fruits, berries, root vegetables, tomatoes and peppers, potatoes and onions, melons, pumpkins, squash, etc., nuts, corn, wool, mohair, dairy and poultry and canned fruits and vegetables.

Every community exhibit scoring 66 points will be awarded \$50. Detailed information regarding rules for community exhibits and prizes may be secured from Mr. Cheney or by procuring a copy of the Jackson county fair premium list from the secretary, chamber of commerce building, Medford.

THE FOOD VALUE OF SAFE MILK

The estimate of the food value of milk must be based not only on the several substances which it contains, such as sugar, fat, casein, albumin, and salt, but on its digestibility and its peculiar usefulness in feeding the young. The price paid for cow's milk is very small compared with the price paid for other animal products having equal food value.

One quart of milk is equal in value to: 3/4 lb. lean beef; 8 eggs; 2 lbs. fresh codfish; 2 lbs. chicken; 1 pt. oysters; 4-5 lb. loin of pork; 3-5 lb. ham.

No family can get along without milk; it is the natural food for babies and children. They will work better, play better and grow better if they have plenty of good milk. Give them the right start by supplying all the rich, pure milk they will drink. Milk used freely in the kitchen makes all foods better and cuts down "the high cost of living." Pure milk supplies all essential food elements in the most perfect and convenient form.

Milk is the sole article of diet whose only function in nature is to serve as food. It is a complete food in that it contains all the needed nutrients and is easily digested and thoroughly assimilated.

Its many advantages as a "tissue former" makes it especially valuable for children. Its proteins have high nutritive value, being rich in certain essential amino acids in which the cereal grains are poor. So the two make a valuable combination.

Milk is looked upon by most people not as a good food but a drink. While the correct way to measure any food is by its nutritive value, that is by the proportion of the amount assimilated and by the amount thrown off as waste. Over 99 per cent of milk taken into the body is assimilated and goes to build up the tissue of the body, while in other foods as high as 30 per cent cannot be assimilated into the body and is thrown off in waste.

PROTESTANTS JOIN IN HONORING GRIFFITH

DUBLIN, Aug. 14.—(By the Associated Press)—The body of Arthur Griffith, president of the Dail Eireann cabinet, lay in state today in Dublin city hall. Thousands of mourners streamed by the bier around which was stationed a guard of honor from troops of the national army. The body will lie in state until tomorrow night when it will be removed to the pre-cathedral. Archbishop Byrne will preside at solemn requiem mass at 11 o'clock Wednesday morning, the burial at Glasvin, a Dublin suburb, immediately following.

In the protestant churches yesterday remarkable tributes were paid to Mr. Griffith, the trend of which was that the free state had lost in him a pillar of strength.

PLAN ROUTE FROM DULUTH TO OCEAN

DULUTH, Minn., Aug. 14.—Following the announcement last month of plans for a lake-to-ocean boat service in advance of the deep waterway project, wholesalers, small jobbers and the general public are viewing with interest commencement of excavating at the site of the new terminal warehouse on the Duluth bay-front.

Contracts for the building of the first two of a fleet of modern freighters will be let in time to have the ships ready at the opening of lake navigation next spring, according to A. Miller McDougall of Duluth, president of the McDougall Terminal Warehouse company, which will operate the terminal and vessel service. The terminal will cost \$1,750,000 and the barges \$200,000 each, Mr. McDougall said.

The route will be down the Great Lakes and through the Erie canal to the ocean at New York. It will be the first time this route has been used for direct shipments from the head of the lakes to the ocean.

Equals 100 Yard Record. CALGARY, Alta., Aug. 12.—Cyril Coaffee of Winnipeg today equalled the world record for the 100 yard dash at the annual meet of the Canadian amateur athletic association by running the distance in 9.3-4 seconds. The time constitutes a Canadian record for the distance. The former Dominion record was 9.4-5 seconds, held by Bobby Kerr of Hamilton, Ontario.



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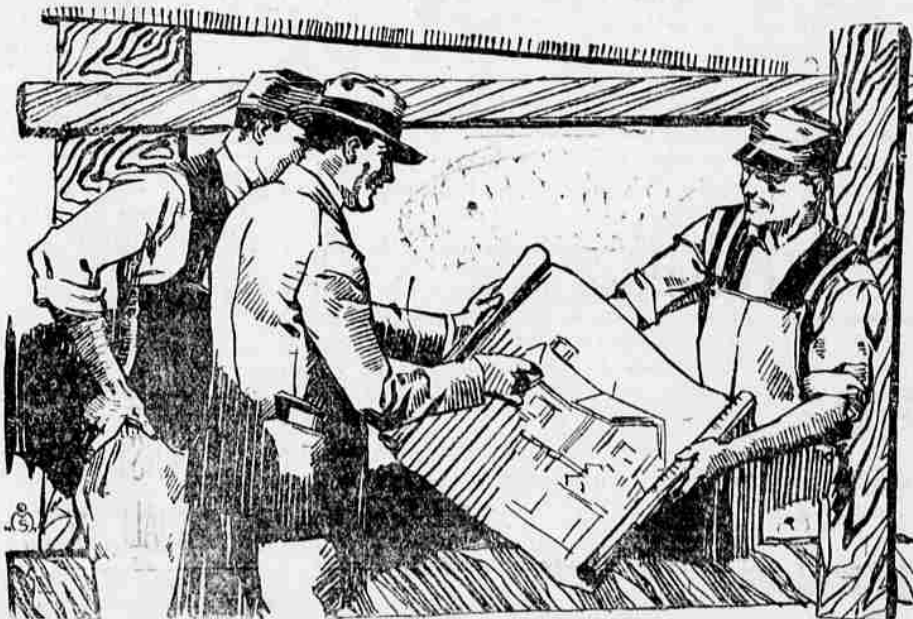
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
