NEWPORT, Ore., Aug. 16.—The gasoline schooner E. L. Smith, en route Portland to Siletz, ran aground in the fog today off the entrance to Siletz bay. The crew are all ashore safe, and the sea is smoothing. The vessel is lying easy and may be saved. She carried a cargo of general merchandise. The coast guard crew is standing by.
