

3500 ACRES SHALE LAND AT ASHLAND TO BE DEVELOPED

ASHLAND, Aug. 15.—A tract approximating 3500 acres in extent has been leased from the government by the Hartman Syndicate, Inc., which has southern Oregon headquarters in this city, engaged in the extraction of oil from shale, this particular rock abounding on the leased lands—in fact, there is a big mountain of it. The Hartman brothers are engineers, both civil and mining, and for weeks past, in a quiet sort of way, preliminary work has developed the extent and richness of the shale territory in question. Locally, J. A. Barrett is also connected with the enterprise. In a broad sense the Dead Indian country will be the scene of this new industry, the head of Antelope valley, near Grizzly Peak, being the specific locality. Already appearances indicate that the eastern exposure of Grizzly will be stripped, baring the rock for development on a colossal scale. The Hartmans are patentees of a retort which is said to be a marvel of inventive genius in the way of extracting oil from the shale. The by-products are also of importance, including fire clay and lampblack, while the gas generated will be of sufficient volume to produce a commercial revenue.

J. E. Jones, local painter residing on Iowa street, has gone to California for a visit with relatives near the old home surroundings at Cedarville in Modoc county.

Entries in the major divisions close on Sept. 12. Each premium booklet is accompanied by an entry blank. By all means get a copy and study the rules and regulations. Premiums are generous, covering every phase of livestock, agriculture, horticulture and domestic and fancy arts.

SOY BEAN IS TAKING PLACE OF OAT CROP

WASHINGTON, August.—(By the Associated Press)—The soy bean is rapidly taking a place as a major crop in the farming systems of the corn belt, replacing oats to a considerable extent and taking part of the corn acreage, says the department of agriculture. Although primarily used for forage, pasture and ensilage, the growing of seed during the last few years has become a very profitable industry. The production of seed has now increased to the point where the supply greatly exceeds the demand for planting.

EX-EVANGELIST OF OREGON FACES CHARGE MURDER

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 16.—The trial of Herbert Wilson, former evangelist of Oregon and Canada and alleged mail robber, for the murder of Herbert R. Cox, said to have been his companion in numerous crimes, opened here today before Superior Judge J. Perry Wood. Cox was shot and killed here a few months ago while he, Wilson, and Eddie O'Brien, alleged mail robber, now held at Toledo, Ohio, were attempting to escape from the county jail. Cox's last words were "Herb did it."

The state contends Wilson blamed Cox for their failure to escape, thinking he told the plan to the officers. Federal charges against Wilson have been held up pending the result of the murder trial.
