

LEGION MEMBERS URGED TO TAKE PART POLITICS

Medford post of the American Legion numbered among its visitors last evening a prominent Legionnaire, Comrade Walter L. Toozee, who as chairman of the republican state central committee is in Medford to address the republican banquet to be given in his honor tonight.

Following the regular business meeting Mr. Toozee spoke in advocacy of the ex-service man taking a strong interest in politics. The speaker's remarks were of a non-partisan nature. He declared that as the legionnaire was sworn to uphold the constitution and the laws of the country he was as much in the country's service as when wearing the uniform and pointed out the necessity of the individual working along party lines, either as a democrat or republican, if higher ideals in government were to be achieved.

Mr. Toozee declared himself as strongly opposed to any dabbling in politics by the American Legion, as an organization.

A committee was named by Commander Wilson to prepare for the annual Labor Day dance which will be given Monday, September 4. The committee includes H. P. Bromley, Earl York, Donald Reames, Cole Holmes, and B. R. Elliott.

Following receipt of an invitation to attend the Soldiers and Sailors' reunion at Rogue River on September 6th, it was voted to send a delegation of Medford legion members to the reunion and a committee was named to perfect arrangements.

EUROPEAN TRIP FOR CANNING CLUB GIRLS

CHICAGO, August.—(By the Associated Press)—A three month trip to Europe for four country girls with all expenses paid, is the prize that has just been announced for winning members of the canning clubs of the United States. These clubs are conducted by the agricultural colleges and the United States department of agriculture. The American committee of devasate France is providing the prize trip for which 55,000 girls the country over are expected to compete this summer and fall.

The plan provides for the usual local, county and state elimination contests conducted by the state agricultural college extension departments. Following that there will be five interstate or sectional contests held at convenient expositions, namely: Eastern States Exposition, Springfield, Mass.; Southeastern Exposition at Atlanta, Georgia; Interstate Fair and Exposition, Sioux City, Iowa; Colorado State Fair, Pueblo, Colorado; and the Pacific International Livestock Exposition, Portland, Ore.

CHICAGO CUBS MAKING BID FOR LEADING LEAGUE

CHICAGO, Aug. 16.—After a record of thirteen straight victories in two years over Pittsburgh Art Neff, star Giant southpaw, was driven from the box. Wilbur Cooper twirled the Buccaneers to their fifth straight victory over the Giants. The Chicago Cubs, in third place and sharing the limelight with Pittsburgh as an added starter in the National league race, climbed to within three and a half games of the top by trouncing the Boston Braves 5 to 0 and 8 to 3. Bob Meusel's homer in the ninth enabled the Yankees to tie the score, and Elmer Smith, filling Babe Ruth's place, popped out another circuit blow in New York's victory while St. Louis was dividing a double header. Tillie Walker of the Athletics pulled up on Ken Williams and Rogers Hornsby in the slugline race by closing home runs in each game of a double header which Cleveland and Philadelphia divided. His total is now 27.

Chicago collected 25 of the 43 hits registered in a game with the Boston Red Sox and won, 18 to 11.

JOHNNY DUNDEE IS VANQUISHER FRUSH WITH A KNOCKOUT

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—Johnny Dundee did two things last night in his bout with Danny Frush of Cleveland, that he seldom does.

He landed a knockout and he annexed a title, the former much more realistic than the crown bestowed upon him by the New York state boxing commission—"featherweight champion of the world in New York state."

Johnny Kilbane, basking behind a shield of greenbacks in Cleveland, wears the crown that outside of New

York state is acknowledged as genuine. Dundee put Frush to bed in a cool, methodical manner. Both began carefully but after the first round Frush was dazed. He relied on a stiff left arm to keep Johnny at his distance and also to win. Dundee pawed around for a few rounds, hitting a stinger now and then and doing more damage than was then apparent. Dundee lowered his guard in the seventh and Frush repeatedly stepped into Johnny's long left.

Stung by a hard left toward the close of the eighth round, Dundee drew back, began his invariable practice of bouncing off the ropes, landed a few short uppercuts then both

hands in hooks to the head and finally a terrific right to the stomach. Frush reeled and dropped to the mat out of breath. Dundee was on him like a tiger. He rushed Frush across, hitting twice with both hands. The going then came.

Rushing from his corner in the ninth, Dundee met Frush as the latter emerged from his seat, landing both hands, and sending the Cleveland to the ropes with a volley, stood back and pumped a terrific left to the head and then crashed a burning right to the pit of the stomach. Frush fell dizzy, but not unconscious. He broke the fall with his left hand and lay there so exhausted he could not rise.

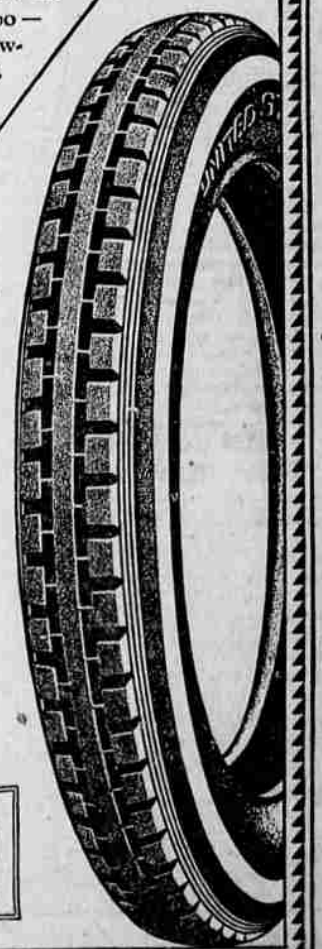
