UNION REVIVAL MEETING ASHLAND SUNDAY, SEPT. 3

ASHLAND, Aug. 18.—A big union revival movement, to begin in this city on Sunday, Sept. 3, at the chautauqua auditorium, implies that the building will have to be gotten in shape insofar as interior arrangements are concerned, consequently on Tuesday of next week, Aug. 22, active workers from various denominations will tackle the job. The chautauqua auditorium has been passing through a period of comparative desuetude for sometime past, and the need of a renovation is apparent. These meetings are to be somewhat different from the ordinary revival gathering, inasmuch as the guiding spirit will be a healer-evangelist, the term "healer" applying in both a physical and spiritual sense.
