

CARAVAN LEADER STAGED BLOW-UP KLAMATH FALLS

The Portland Caravan staged a sensational affair in Klamath Falls according to the Portland papers, when Fred Fleet, a local humorist read a paper poking some good natured fun at the city visitors.

All of which apparently riled the temperamental Mayor Baker of Portland who proceeded to come back as follows, according to the Oregonian report:

"The young man has failed to add that Klamath might send Oregon's Irving S. Cobb to the exposition—the comedian writer. In his speech just made Mr. Fleet belittles Medford because it has a road to Crater Lake. He has belittled Portland when we have come here in a spirit of co-operation and friendship. I am amazed. We didn't come here with sweet words. We made no references to the squabble among your own citizens which would show the lack of co-operation here.

"We came down here in good faith to promote the upbuilding of this state. What right have you to insult us? We came as representatives of 17 civic organizations of Portland and we came in friendship. When we come here in unselfishness on such a mission you might have refrained from such remarks."

Mayor Baker sat down amid a rather heavy silence. Mr. Fleet broke it. "I want to say," he declared, "that I had no idea or intention of insulting our Portland visitors. Nothing was further from my thoughts. What I said was in a spirit of fun. I greatly regret that my remarks were so misconstrued by the mayor."

FOREST HILLS, Aug. 19.—Mrs. Molla B. Mallory, woman's national tennis champion, retained her title today by disposing of the youthful Miss Helen Wells of California in straight sets, 6-3, 6-1. Mrs. Mallory became invulnerable in the fourth game on her own service and won 4-0. Miss Wells led in the next game, in which one of the most spectacular rallies of the tournament occurred. Mrs. Mallory came from behind to win 5-3. Miss Wells lost her steadiness and began to volley wildly. Mrs. Mallory won the next game 4-2.

TRADE BALANCE 'UNFAVORABLE' BUT WILL HELP WORLD

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—A reduction of more than \$90,000,000 in the nation's favorable trade balance during July as compared with a year ago will help the international exchange situation, the commerce department declared today in a statement making public the results of the country's foreign trade for the month.

Substantially increased gold imports but slightly decreased commodity exports and imports, the department stated, characterized the foreign trade of the country for July, as compared with June.

The decided reduction in the favorable trade balance from \$147,000,000 a year ago to \$54,000,000 for July, the department declared to be a "healthy sign, pointing to a gradual return to more normal relations between our exports and imports, which is bound to have a beneficial effect on the international exchange situation."

Commodity exports for July aggregated \$35,000,000 against \$324,000,000 in June and \$325,000,000 in July, 1921, while imports totalled \$251,000,000 against \$260,000,000 in June and \$178,000,000 for July a year ago.

U. S. EXPENSES ARE CUT \$157,000,000 FROM A YEAR AGO

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—Running expenses of the government fell off by more than \$157,000,000 during July, as compared with the same month last year, while public debt disbursements were reduced by \$196,000,000 according to the monthly statement of expenditures issued by the treasury.

The total expenditures chargeable against ordinary receipts amounted to \$225,000,000 during July, against \$382,000,000 a year ago, while public debt disbursements aggregated \$34,000,000 compared with \$230,000,000 for July 1921.

Of the expenditures chargeable against ordinary receipts, the largest item was \$184,000,000 of interest on the public debt, with \$43,000,000 for the veterans' bureau next, while of the public debt disbursement \$16,000,000 expended in the retirement of the Liberty bonds for the fourth loan was the largest item.
