# S. P. AGENT BOOSTS JACKSON COUNTY

I. T. Sparks of the local Southern Pacific office who returned today from a short stay in the Medford district says that that section is going to have a banner pear crop this season. The field will amount to about 1250 cars. During the time when the strike was most threatening, the growers were worried for fear that they would be unable to move their produce, but the empties are available now. The pears are of good size and shape. They are moving at a rate of about 20 cars a day. The Bartlett is most going to the canneries of Oregon and California, and the other varieties are being shipped to the east.

Sparks says the new buildings put up for the Jackson county fair are remarkably fine. The fair grounds is located about a mile south of Medford. The fair this year promises to be rather a southern Oregon celebration than a county affair. The people expect to have much fine livestock, as the trains carrying the animals from the Sacramento fair to Salem will stop there long enough for the owners to exhibit their stock. A fine race track has been built, according to Sparks and racing will be part of the program. The fair will come September 13-16 inclusive.—Eugene Guard.

# NOTED SCIENTISTS VISIT IN VALLEY

Dr. E. J. Kraus, and Dr. H. Rickett, of the department of botany, University of Wisconsin, spent Saturday and Sunday with Prof. Reimer at the Experiment Station. Dr. Kraus is considered one of the greatest authorities in America on plant physiology, and especially in its relations to horticultural plants. He is the man who worked out the nitrate and carbohydrate ratio in fruit trees, which is now the foundation of modern pruning practices, and which places pruning on a rational basis for the first time. This is Dr. Kraus's third trip to the Southern Oregon Experiment station, as he is vitally interested in the work this station is doing on blight resistant pears and pear stocks. Arrangements are being made whereby Dr. Kraus and some of his specialists will cooperate with Prof. Reimer in some phases of this work.

This time your Eagle Point correspondent accompanied them and after reaching Medford, passed on through that beautiful city to be inspected by its thousands of electric lights, and passed on up the valley, viewing the fine farms and orchards, enrapturing their gaze, passing over and admiring our highway and noting the beautiful lawns, buildings and streets and ornamental trees and shrubbery along the street of Ashland, leaving the park until later in the day, going on and on until we reached the California line over one of the finest highways, but when we reached the California line found a change in the nature of the road, but better than it was the first time your correspondent passed over it in October, 1861, on horseback, but quite a change from the Jackson county highway, we passed on to the once noted town of Hornbrook where we stopped and ate lunch and rested a while, began to retrace our steps. # Portland Journal's View of Judgeship Race in Jackson County

In Jackson county there is example of the bitterness that results when a religious issue is made the overshadowing issue in an election.

Former Senator Thomas, with a most excellent record in the legislature, was overwhelmingly nominated in the republican primaries, for circuit judge. Very bitter feeling was aroused in the recent recall election on that, and some of his critics are publicly demanding that Senator Thomas declare his position with reference to the Ku Klux Klan.

Suppose Senator Thomas, as a candidate for judge, should make a statement denouncing secret organizations in general and the Ku Klux Klan in particular, and suppose that he should be elected judge.

Several Jackson county citizens are now under indictment for alleged connection with Klan activities. Their cases might not come to trial until the judge soon to be elected takes his seat. It is scarcely thinkable that the fair minded people of Jackson county would want them tried by a judge who, through a public statement, had unreservedly acknowledged that he had prejudged their cases.

The situation exemplifies the mistake of raising up a sixteenth century religious controversy as a 1922 election issue. In such controversies

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# ADVISE U. S. FIRMS TO ABANDON BRANCH OFFICES IN GERMANY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—Warning against the establishment of branch factories in Germany by American firms was contained today in a report to Secretary Hoover by a special committee of businessmen appointed to handle economic problems relating to western Europe. The report asserted that any temporary benefit to be gained by the location of branches in Germany by

American firms would be more than offset when stabilization in that country brings on further violent displacement. The committee making the report consisted of Fred I. Kent, New York, chairman; Edwin Greene, Boston; Rudolph S. Necht, New Orleans; Clyde L. King, Philadelphia; Alexander Legge, Chicago, and George M. Verity, Middletown, Ohio. The gigantic subsidies granted by the German government, including the railroad deficits, post and telegraph deficits, grain subsidies, deferred taxation and others, are rapidly being brought to an end under pressure from the reparations commission, the report said. "With the elimination of these subsidies and the stabilization of the mark, the present export premium on German goods will practically vanish."

The protection of life and property is in the hands of the courts. Every judge should always maintain a free and open mind to the end that he may act impartially and without prejudice in all matters that come before him for adjudication. What would be the use of having courts if judges beforehand formed opinions and publicly expressed them concerning questions that might be presented before them for decision? If, as in the Jackson county case, the religious debate and controversy over the Klan threatens to involve the judiciary, it is certainly time for sober-minded citizens to stop and think over the question. Whither are we drifting?—Portland Journal.

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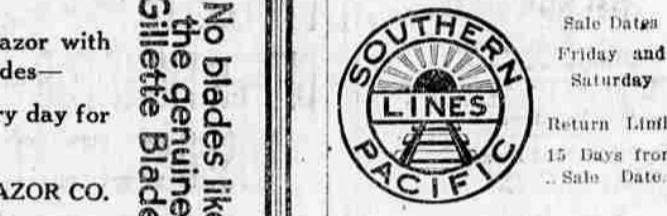
