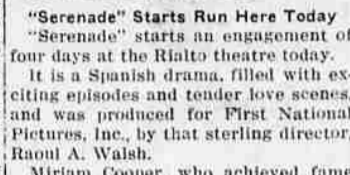
At a meeting of Modern Woodmen, on Monday evening, arrangements for joining in the big picnic demonstration in Ashland parks on Labor Day were expedited.

CHICAGO, Aug. 23.—(By Associated Press.) Headed pennant-ward while the Chicago and St. Louis rivals falter, the New York Giants today are four games ahead of the Cardinals and five and a half ahead of the Cubs, despite the fact that they have been invading the enemy's strongholds.

George Uhle held the Yankees to a brace of hits while Tris Speaker's homer in the first inning started an attack on Bush that caused him to be benched in favor of Murray Archer.

Herman Pillette registered his seventeenth victory of the season and Harry Hellmann his nineteenth homer as the Tigers, continuing their heavy batting attack, pounded out two victories over the Athletics, 6 to 4 and 17 to 3. Lou Blue increased his margin as the league's leading run getter by tallying seven times in the two games.

Max Carey's hit drove in the run that enabled Pittsburgh to down Philadelphia 4 to 3. The Pirates as a result of the victory moved back into fourth place.

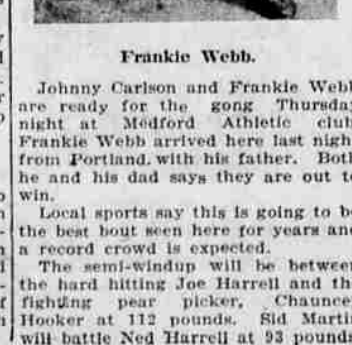
