

NOW BOOMING SENATOR REED FOR PRESIDENT

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Aug. 22.—Antagonism towards United States Senator "Jim" Reed, foe of Woodrow Wilson, within his own party in Missouri apparently is gradually dissipating.

Anti-Reed democrats were numerous and open in their denunciation of his renomination in the recent primary until the statement by Beckinridge Long, the defeated candidate on the democratic ticket, that he was willing to abide by the official announcement of the voters' decision.

Until that time talk of contesting the nomination of the senator was heard on all sides, but through it all Reed's opponent remained silent. Some of Long's friends were attempting to persuade him to run as an independent candidate, but he finally came out and officially announced his refusal to the people of Missouri in words amounting to "They will be done."

At Marshall, Mo., a "Reed-for-President" club has been formed, with an initial membership in that community of 2400, which reflects the attitude of the staunch supporters in other parts of the state.

Reed is working for a united democratic party in Missouri and hopes to carry away a victory in Missouri next November. In a statement before returning to Washington, Reed thanked his friends for their primary support and predicted victory for the party in the election.

Presidential Boom Talked
At Washington Reed's friends are offering to come to this state and take the "stump" to re-elect him to the senate. He was welcomed back to the capitol warmly by his colleagues and immediately the buzz of a boom for president was started.

While possibly a little early to be discussed seriously his political friends in this state nevertheless are laying the foundation for building support for his presidential candidacy.

PORTLAND PHONE CO. PROTEST ACTION

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 24.—The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company has intervened in the circuit court here in the suit brought by Robert G. Duncan and others to set aside the telephone rates fixed by the public service commission, two members of which were recently recalled.

The petition charged that the newly elected commissioners, Newton McCoy and T. M. Kerrigan, conspired with Duncan and the other plaintiffs to injure the company, prevent its acting in the suit and to repudiate the order of the old commission by which the company was given rates "adequate to earn a fair income."

Circuit Judge Evans allowed the motion for intervention and gave the company five days to move, plead or answer.

The new commission recently instructed the state attorney general to withdraw the state's answer to the suit filed by Duncan.

Train Women Farmers
CLARKSBURG, W. Va., Aug. 24.—What is said to be the first training camp for farm workmen in the United States is in progress at Jackson Mills, W. Va., near here today.

Eighty-five women from farms located in eighteen counties of the state are registered.

BRITISH CHEMIST SAYS MAN SHOULD LIVE TO REACH 125 YEARS OF AGE

LONDON, Aug. 24.—"Live to be 125" is the slogan of Professor Barton Scammell, one of England's best known chemists.

"Every animal," he says, "normally lives for five times the period of its full growth. A human being continues growing until the age of twenty-five. His span of life should be 125, not seventy."

According to Professor Scammell the duration of life entirely depends upon diet. The farmer, who probably lives closest to nature, outlives the townsman by far. He lives on the fresh vegetables and fruits which constitute the finest scientific food that the human body can assimilate.

"Regard the human body merely as a chemical organism," says the professor, "and treat it as such. To keep it at its highest efficiency it requires the continual replacement of certain chemicals. If unsupplied the body wastes and dies."

Potash an Essential
"We have discovered that the most important constituent of this organism is an alkaloid called potash. When there is a full and adequate supply of this substance, then the body remains vigorous for long over the Palmist's allotted span."

"But the trouble has been to supply potash in a form in which it can be assimilated by the body and taken into the blood. We have now discovered how this can be achieved."

"Experiments in the past five years have shown that if potash is mixed with radio-active water it can be taken into the system with the most amazing results. It not merely prolongs life, but it keeps people in what we regard as advanced middle age in a state of perfect health and efficiency."

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NARCISSUS LOVE IN CHILD TASK FOR MOTHERS

LONDON, Aug. 22.—Dr. Davis Forsyth, famous hospital surgeon and writer of many books on psycho-analysis and mental diseases, lecturing at the institute of hygiene, had a severe shock in store for those present who regard the child as the symbol of happy innocence when he exploded the theory of the innocent-minded child, alleging that it was a myth.

"Accepting the principle of animal evolution," said Dr. Forsyth, "we expect to be much nearer animals when we are born."

"Children, instead of being golden, pure and unalloyed, as many people think them to be, have primitive, unanalyzed instincts of the crudest kind. Impulses of which we are ashamed in later life are found manifest in the early stages of life."

"Children are subject to the same emotions as grown-up men and women. Love, jealousy, hate and fear are all apparent, and you get emotional life even in the nursery."

"Little children can only see life from a selfish point of view; their self-importance seems magnified beyond deserts, and they experience the greatest difficulty in restraining their impulses or fail in their promises to their mothers."

"It is quite a mistake to imagine that we are not concerned with love before we reach puberty. There are few boys and girls who go to parties who do not have love affairs."

"The great difficulty that a mother experiences," concluded Dr. Forsyth, "is to detach the self-love felt by every child in his first years for himself (Narcissus love it is called, after Narcissus, who fell in love with his own face), and turn it to a directed object. If she fails in this she is sowing seeds of mental disorder for the child."

ALASKA MINING IS ON THE INCREASE

ANCHORAGE, Alaska.—(By the Associated Press)—Readjustment of wages bringing a close approach to normalcy as applied to mining, has resulted in a return of the pendulum toward greater mining activity than has been experienced in the history of Alaska since the boom days.

While the Alaska railroad was building it was impossible to obtain help for mining operations owing to the good wages in railroad construction. Even now there is a general shortage of miners throughout the territory and every man of experience who can be employed. Mining takes on an entirely different complexion than of a few years ago attention is being given to gaining access to known placer deposits suitable for hydraulic and dredges, and aside from this phase of the placer situation there is little doing save where old-timers have a little piece of ground from which they may strike out a grubstake for the winter, and who do not care to take out a fortune.
