

WEBB AND CARLSON FIGHT A HOT DRAW THURSDAY SMOKER

Frankie Webb of Portland and Johnny Carlson of Gold Hill fought an eight round draw at the smoker of the Medford Athletic club last night, before a fair sized crowd. One of the judges gave the fracs to Carlson, and the other two called it a draw, which was a fair and just decision. Some of the Carlson adherents became bellicose, after the gloves had been put away, and one of the esteemed boxing commission was threatened with a kicking, as an aftermath.

The affair was a slambang affair with Carlson having the better of the open work, and Webb excelling at close quarters, especially when he had John on the ropes. Both landed some rib roasters that could be heard a block away as they socked each other on the jaw savagely.

The semi-final between Chauncey Hooker and Joe Harrell was called a draw, but Hooker really out ran and outboxed his opponent. Mr. Hooker would assume a terrifying pose, a la Roman gladiator killing a Nubian lion, and maintain it till the foe got too close. EFFORTS TO SETTLE STRIKE FAIL

hood leaders, who have maintained that the strike must end because the public demanded it, had spent two hours conferring with executives representing about thirty per cent of the country's mileage.

Bomb Throwing Epidemic

CHICAGO, Aug. 25.—The railroad strike approaching the end of the eighth week today to the accompaniment of bombs.

While rail heads and union leaders at the conference in New York were wrestling with proposals for bringing the strike to a whole or partial settlement, new outrages increased.

An Illinois Central suburban train running between New Orleans and the company's shops at Harahan was stoned. A passenger on the train was injured.

Officials of the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy railroad and county authorities were investigating an attempt to dynamite a railroad bridge near Spanish lake, Missouri.

Earlier disorders at Jacksonville, Fla., were followed by the dynamiting of the home of J. A. Williams, foreman in the Seaboard Air line railroad shops and a member of the city council. The front of the house was damaged, but Williams and his wife escaped injury.

Proposals were made to United States Marshal MacDonald by striking shopmen at Shawnee, Okla., to replace federal and company guards at railroad shops with strikers.

Following reports from a National Guard officer, Governor McCray of Indiana asked federal authorities to intercede in strike disorders in Gar-

ret, Ind., where workmen were threatened, their homes painted yellow and where bombs were discovered.

Charges of murder were made against a negro commissary worker for the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe at San Bernardino, Calif., where a striking electrician was shot and killed.

With the question of seniority the chief barrier to peace, officials of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railroad declared they would not yield in their stand against restoring seniority to returning strikers.

The Santa Fe announced at Topeka, Kas., that conditions had so changed it was impossible to take back all strikers.

Quiet was restored in the Chicago-Rock Island and Pacific yards at Herrington, Kans., following the shooting of a fireman by a railroad guard and a general suspension of work.

U. S. Marshals Called
ROODHOUSE, Ill., Aug. 25.—(By the Associated Press.)—United States deputy marshals are patrolling the railroad yards here this morning, following an explosion which they believed was intended to wreck the Illinois hotel, headquarters of the non-union Chicago and Alton shop workers.

The hotel is across the street from the Chicago and Alton roundhouse and the explosion is believed to have

been caused by bombs and hand grenades. There was no damage done, as the missiles exploded in the air. No one was injured.

Federal deputy marshals who have been on duty here ever since a mob tarred and feathered Bert Dickson, night roundhouse foreman, July 11, began an investigation.

Shaking foundations of all the houses and deluging the town in darkness the explosion occurred about 3:50 a. m. A second explosion at the roundhouse followed. Great confusion ensued. Hurriedly dressed residents gathered at the edge of the yards, fearing a repetition of the blasts.

teen prisoners are held under bonds of \$10,000 each.

Each is charged with two counts—violation of the Michigan syndicalism law and conspiracy against the government.

A telegram said to have been sent William F. Dunn, one of the prisoners, and bearing the signature: "I. Scott, Minneapolis," was found in Dunn's possession and may be introduced in evidence when the defendants are given a preliminary hearing. The federal agents intimated that it contained radical sentiments and also offered Dunn the author's congratulations upon his arrest.

Dunn formerly was one of the editors of the Butte (Mont.) Daily Bulletin, according to federal officials.

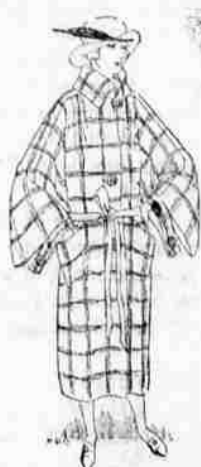
