WHEN VICTORY MEANS DEFEAT.

THERE is little cause for Johnson enthusiasm in the California election. Although victorious by thirty or forty thousand votes, the result shows the marvellous Johnson political machine only hitting on one cylinder. A majority of two hundred thousand votes would have been Johnsonian normalcy. A terrific loss has been sustained, therefore, since the struggle with Herbert Hoover, in the presidential primaries.

But the actual loss in voting strength, can not compare with the moral loss. As a matter of plain fact, the militant and progressive Hiram cut rather a sorry figure in the campaign. And Human Nature Did. That's all the victory amounts to. Inertia won. But in prestige and power as a national figure, which had been his, Hiram Johnson lost.
