MORE CROSSINGS NEEDED OVER S. P.

SOME day there will be a fire on the west side of Medford. And the whistle will blow just as a lengthy freight train from the south comes to rest blocking Main street.

The fire engine will swoop from the fire hall, headed for the west side, and find its way blocked at Main street. It will also find its progress hampered by the quickly congested automobile traffic.

Now anyone who knows anything about fires and the problem of fighting them, knows that the first few minutes form the critical period,—five minutes at the inception of a fire are more important than half an hour after the fire has once gained headway.

It must be apparent to anyone, therefore, that some arrangement should be made whereby this danger to the safety of Medford be removed. An ordinance compelling a train blocking the Main street crossing to move on at the sound of the fire whistle, is of no practical benefit, for the time consumed in such an operation would probably exceed the time required to find another outlet.

This prospect is drawn to emphasize the need of more crossings between the east and west sides of Medford, and the great desirability of an underground crossing.—Extending Sixth street under the tracks would not only provide necessary fire protection, but would be a great benefit in a business way, and in the solution of the important problem of lessening traffic congestion on Main street.

Medford is growing. The automobile traffic is increasing tremendously. Blocking Main street during business hours, even for five or ten minutes is a great annoyance to people of the city and its frequency seems to be increasing. When added to this we have a positive menace in ease of fire, and the necessity of radical change in the lines of communication across the S. P. tracks becomes of immediate and serious concern.
