Bishop Keator was a member of the special committee which voted to accept the resignation of Bishop Paddock.

OPPONENTS DYE EMBARGO LOSE BY CLOSE VOTE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—Opponents of dye embargo lost today in the house in the first phase of their fight to have that provision stricken out of the tariff bill.

Speaker Gillette overruled a point of order by Representative Fish, republican, New York, that the conferees exceeded their authority in writing the embargo back into the bill after both house and senate had voted it out. An appeal was taken from that, but by a vote of 150, to 147 the appeal was laid on the table.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—Action of the republican conferees of writing back into the tariff bill a dye embargo provision was denounced today in the house by Representative Fish, republican, New York, as the worst example of the workings of the invisible government the house has ever seen.

Mr. Fish's statement was greeted with vigorous applause from both the republican and democratic sides and it was with difficulty that Representative Longworth, republican, Ohio, one of the tariff conferees, was able to break in with a point of order, which was sustained.

Representative Fish made the point of order that the conferees had exceeded their authority in writing into the bill a provision which both the house and senate had rejected by direct votes.

STOP MOTOR CRASHES BY PRISON TERMS

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—Prison sentences as the only effective means of checking accidents due to the carelessness of motorists were advocated for traffic law violators by James W. Inches, Detroit commissioner of police, in an address at the international police conference today.

"About 12,500 persons are killed in automobile accidents yearly in this country," said Commissioner Inches, "and about 300,000 are injured. Prison sentences are being given in Detroit for traffic violations, and we are finding that it is actually checking the joy riding and reckless drivers."

ATLANTIS CITY, N. J., Sept. 13.—Bad weather today prevented carrying out the full program of events scheduled for the second day of the American championship trap shooting tournament. One hundred and twenty-five amateur trap shooters had entered for the doubles championship and 39 professionals for the professional doubles title.

Scores were very low owing to the wind and rain. R. A. King of Delta, Colo., winning the title and first honors with 179, out of 100 doubles. Phil Miller of Dallas, Texas, who won the 15 yard championship yesterday and Frank Hughes of Morbridge, S. D., tied for second with 169. Frank Troeh of Vancouver, Wash., was fourth with 164.

Two World Records

STOCKHOLM, Sept. 13.—(By Associated Press). Two new world records were established by Paavo Nurmi, Finnish runner, in the stadium here yesterday. In the 5000 meter event he bettered by one second the time of 14 minutes 36.3 seconds set by H. Kolehmainen, also of Finland in 1912. He did the three mile run in 14 minutes 8.4 seconds. The old mark was 14 minutes 16 seconds established by Schrubbs in 1903.

Hominy Factory Burns

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Sept. 13.—Damage estimated at nearly \$1,000,000 is believed to have been caused by fire which early today practically destroyed the plant of the American Hominy company here said to be one of the largest of its kind in the world.

ASKS INVESTIGATION OF VETERAN'S BUREAU

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—Investigation of the veterans' bureau to determine whether laws relating to treatment and care of disabled former service men are being administered properly and promptly will be ordered by the senate under the terms of a resolution introduced by Senator King, democrat, Utah. The resolution sets forth it had been charged that unreasonable delays had characterized the functioning of the bureau, that its dealings with the former service men had been slowed up and tangled by multitudinous rules and that large amounts had been expended by the bureau in overhead charges at the expense of the former service men.

Page W J B.—Nearly 16 to One
FLORIDA, Mass., Sept. 13.—But one democrat is in this town. He voted yesterday for unsuccessful candidates in the primary. Fifteen republicans voted.

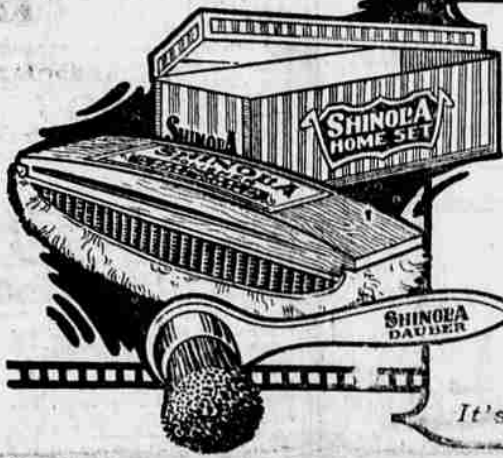

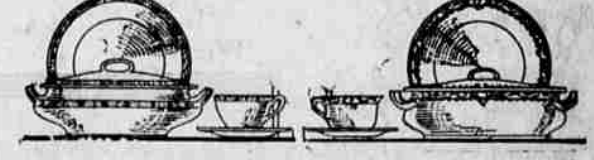
