nost respected citizens and pioneers has been one of a remarkable group of far seeing city builders who have contributed much to the establishment of Portland's present commercial

"He came to Portland in 1854 from New York, with his mother on the Star of the West, one of the earlest passenger ships from the east and, journeying via Nicaragua, thence to San Francisco, arrived in Port land, where he spent five years or his father's donation claim in Wash ington county. Since that time he was in business in the manufacture o tents, awnings, bags, etc. and dry goods, his store, at First and Wash-ington streets, being the first department store in Portland. He went into partnership with Captain A. P. Ankeny and H. E. Ankeny in 1888 in a mining firm known as the Sterling Mining company, and retired from active business in 1896. Mr. Cook mar ried Oronoco L. Ankeny, who died in 1897. In 1997 he married Mrs. Mar tha G. Crowell. One son, Ray A Cook, lives in southern Oregon. other son, Floyd J. Cook, lives in Portland, and his daughter, Leila A. Mrs. George Maxwell, lives in Aspgrove, Klamath county.

#### **NIECE WHITLAW REID** BURNS IN CARMEL HOME
