MAJOR POWELL TO OPEN WINTER SEASON PROGRAM

In order that Medford people may be given advantages equal and in no respect, even superior, to advantages secured in large cities by Medford business men, professional men and musicians, have entered into a co-operative agreement and have guaranteed a certain amount of money to obtain the performance of three nationally famous artists in Medford during the winter. The first performance under the auspices of the local association will be given on October 27th when Major Powell, nationally famed lecturer, will appear and give an interesting lecture accompanied by some remarkable motion pictures. The second performance will be the appearance of the Laurence Concert company on November 14th and the third performance will be the occasion of the appearance of Arthur Middleton, Metropolitan Opera company baritone on January 8, 1923. In order to engage these famous artists it was necessary for the association to post a heavy guarantee. Season tickets for the three performances will be sold for the remarkably low price of three dollars. Middleton was heard in Portland last season at an admission price of \$5.00. Season tickets, of which there are a limited number for sale, must be purchased before October 27th. It is believed that Medford people will realize their opportunity and that the tickets will not last any great length of time. All performances are to be staged at the Page theatre. The effort has been put forth by the local association for the betterment of the community and as can be seen from the prices at which the tickets are being sold, the undertaking is on a non-profit basis. DEATH CLAIMS VINCENT COOK PORTLAND, ORE.

News of the death of Vincent Cook, well known citizen of Portland, received in the city yesterday afternoon by Mrs. John H. Orth, a niece, Mrs. A. H. Miller and Mrs. Cora Crump of Medford are also nieces, and the departed man was also widely known in Medford and vicinity, having formerly been connected prominently with the Sterling Mining company. His son, Floyd Cook, is also well known in the city. Relative to his prominence, last sickness and career, the Portland Journal yesterday contained the following: "Vincent Cook, who has been seriously ill at his home, No. 426 Fifth street, for several weeks, is not expected to live through the day. He has been unconscious for more than 24 hours, and at noon it was reported from his home that he might not last more than another two hours. "Vincent Cook, one of the city's most respected citizens and pioneers, has been one of a remarkable group of far seeing city builders who have contributed much to the establishment of Portland's present commercial activity. "He came to Portland in 1854, from New York, with his mother on the Star of the West, one of the earliest passenger ships from the east, and, journeying via Nicaragua, thence to San Francisco, arrived in Portland, where he spent five years on his father's donation claim in Washington county. Since that time he has been in business in the manufacture of tents, awnings, bags, etc., and dry goods, his store, at First and Washington streets, being the first department store in Portland. He went into partnership with Captain A. P. Ankeny and H. E. Ankeny in 1888 in a mining firm known as the Sterling Mining company, and retired from active business in 1896. Mr. Cook married Oronoco L. Ankeny, who died in 1897. In 1907 he married Mrs. Martha G. Crowell. One son, Ray A. Cook, lives in southern Oregon. Another son, Floyd J. Cook, lives in Portland, and his daughter, Leila A. Mrs. George Maxwell, lives in Asuergrove, Klamath county.
