After the business session, discussions on Rural Schools, Institutes and Building Clinics were led by Mr. Jewett, Superintendent, Home-Career and Mr. Smith. The meeting closed at 4 p. m. At this time members of the Medford Commercial club appeared with cars to take the visiting teachers for a visit to Astoria.

State Superintendent J. A. Churchill in an address before the annual Teachers' Institute lauded the teacher, "The dignity of American citizenship." After leading through to the report of every step in history that led to the current conditions of school, he turned from the history of the past to present active citizenship. While not in the least belittling reverence and honor to heroes and heroines, he pointed to the duties and opportunities of our citizenship of today. Liberty, justice, temperance, and order were his motto. A corrupt judicial, and demagogic exploitation of the passions of the mob, crime, internal disorder, and weakness. Our national strength can weaken through complacency over no problems to solve; through indifference and lack of ability to do straight thinking; through ignorance coupled with lack of interest and unwillingness to learn.

We need a reconstruction of common sense and aims. Teachers can neither lead the state return to what the state does for teachers, only through work toward educational welfare of whole communities. From being with our teachers there should be advance to the third degree—a rise to the social degree where there is the opportunity and leadership that inspires.
