

BROWNLEE LUMBER GETS EQUIPMENT FOR SPRING WORK

Two Clyde skidders were received this week by the Brownlee Lumber company for use in their timber operations in the Butte Falls district, and are being shipped to that section. The skidders are the same type as used by the Weed Lumber company in their logging, are a highly complicated piece of machinery and some idea of their size can be gained from the fact that six flatcars were used in transporting them from the east. They are used in hauling logs with wire cables to the tracks, and take the place of the old donkey engines. A loader and steam shovel to be used in the work, are en route from the east, and are expected to arrive this month.

It is expected that the machinery will all be on hand, and installed by February 1st, and ready for operation at that time, though no definite date has been set.

Unusual Film at Page

Considered the most ambitious bit of marine construction as yet attempted in motion pictures is that which revamped the old South sea trader, the William G. Irwin, for "To Have and to Hold," a picture featuring Betty Compson and Bert Lytell, the current attraction at the Page theatre, that closes its run tonight.

The William G. Irwin, 330 tons, 133 feet long and a three-masted schooner, made a San Francisco-Honolulu record of eight days in 1881 when she was launched. She was first made over as a British man-o-war, vintage of 1820, and later as a pirate ship.

The scenes aboard the William G. Irwin are considered among the most colorful of the production. A real sea fight is staged, with smoke belching

from real cannon of 17th century type. Strenuous duels between Bert Lytell, Theodore Kosloff, Walter Long and Fred Huntley are "thrill" features of the offering.

It is aboard the man-o-war that Betty Compson, as "Lady Jocelyn Leigh," comes to Jamestown, Va., to escape the attentions of "Lord Carnal." In the rough colony she is first protected and then loved by Bert Lytell as "Captain Percy," who, thru an exciting sequence of events, becomes captain of the pirate ship as a prelude to the final denouement in the court of King James I at London.

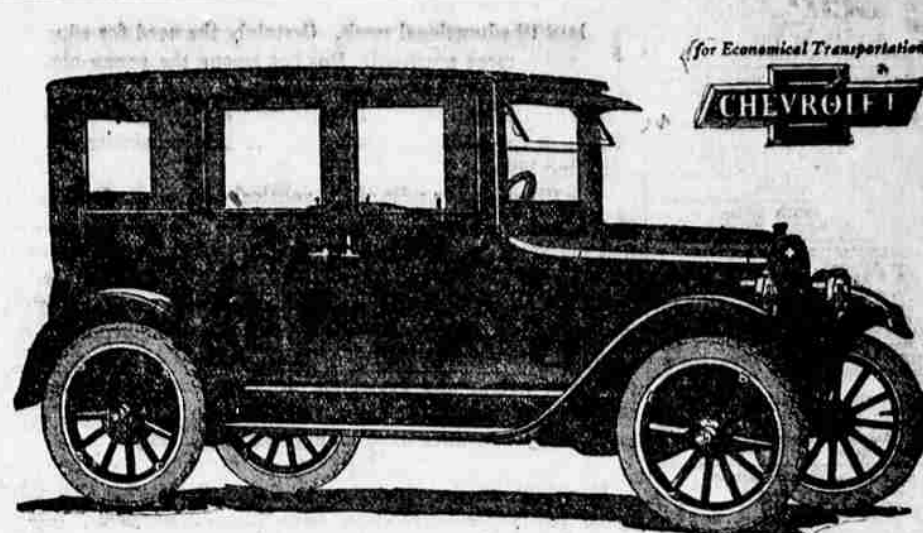
