A BIG DIVIDEND

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—The Studebaker corporation, automobile manufacturer, today declared a common stock dividend of 25 per cent on common stock.

A statement said that it was voted to capitalize \$15,000,000 of net earnings which have been permanently invested in plants, equipments, etc., to provide for future growth. The stock will be given to shareholders of the present \$50,000,000 capitalization at the rate of one share for every four.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—The Kennecott Copper corporation today declared its first dividend since December, 1920, voting a quarterly payment of 75 cents. The last dividend was 50 cents.

state territory are going forward and it is understood that the last of the military will have left by December 18. Although the appointment of the new governor general of Ulster has not been announced, the report that the Duke of Abercorn will be the choice seems likely to prove accurate.

HOLYHEAD, Wales, Dec. 5.—(By the Associated Press)—An historic meeting occurred here last evening between the first president of the Irish free state and its first governor general.

William Cosgrave, president of the Dail Eireann, accompanied by Richard Mulcahy, minister of defense in the provisional cabinet, met Timothy Healy on his return from London, where he had been in connection with his appointment to the governor generalship. Cosgrave warmly congratulated Mr. Healy and all returned to Dublin together today.

President Cosgrave declared that the situation in Ireland was well in hand and that he had high hopes that the troubles of the Irish people were at an end. He said union of the north and south could not long be delayed.
