CALIFORNIA GETS 7 MEN ON VARNELL'S ALL-PACIFIC TEAM

SPOKANE, Dec. 8.—University of California, with seven out of eleven places, is favored in the selection of its all-Pacific coast conference mythical football team by George M. Varnell, Pacific coast and northwest conference referee and local sporting writer. Of the other members of the conference, Oregon Agricultural college, University of Oregon, Stanford and University of Washington were awarded one place each, and Washington State college, University of Idaho and University of Southern California were given no representation in the lineup, made public here today.

In the second team, Washington and the University of Southern California were given three places each, Oregon two and California, Washington State and Stanford one each. The lineup:

Big Football Profits.
SEATTLE, Dec. 8.—According to figures from Darwin Meisner, graduate manager of athletics, the University of Washington in the football season that closed Thanksgiving day, netted \$30,000 on the games. This is pronounced the best showing in the history of the institution.

The total of gate receipts for games played in the stadium at the university by its football team was \$81,000. Disbursements were \$51,000, including sums paid to visiting teams, salaries of coaches and other employees, equipment and transportation.

O. A. C. Basketball Starts.
CORVALLIS, Ore., Dec. 8.—The first-out of basketball material has been made by Coach Hager, leaving only 21 men trying out for the O. A. C. squad. With the football season over, four more regulars from last season, Mush Hjelle, Mose Lyman, Luke Gill and Ray McCart, have donned hoop suits.

Both Stockton and Livermore, California, have signified their willingness to meet the Aggies on their forthcoming barnstorming tour of northern California, while Fresno has written in for a game.

PARIS, Dec. 8.—An offer for Georges Carpentier to meet the British heavyweight fighter, Arthur Townley in April at Prague, has been accepted by Desamps, Carpentier's manager, according to the Herald.

The newspaper adds that Carpentier says while he is training for this bout he will be glad to meet his conqueror "Batling" Siki, as a "tryout."

"The Gold Diggers" Tonight, Ashland
"The Gold Diggers," Avery Hopwood's comedy, produced by David Belasco, will be presented at the Vining theatre, Ashland, tonight. The company is making its first tour to the west, the runs of two years in New York and a season in Chicago having precluded earlier introduction of the play to audiences in other cities.

Mr. Belasco has assembled a large company of the first order for the presentation of the play and it will be precisely the same fashion as when it was on view in New York and in Chicago. Radio Program

Radio broadcasting station K. F. A. Y., of Medford, has received a letter from the National Broadcasters' association, the essence of which is as follows:

"The American Society of Composers, Authors, and Publishers, has decided to force the broadcasting stations to donate a large fee for the privilege of broadcasting any copyrighted music of any description."

In other words, they are demanding revenue from a source which receives nothing for its services. They place broadcasting on a commercial par with dance orchestras and theaters. The dance and the theatre receive a revenue in return for what they produce; therefore, they can rightly be expected to donate proportionately. Radio broadcasting, on the other hand, donates its services free of charge.

To meet this situation, our suggestion is that each broadcaster appeal to the local composers in his district, to have them submit their writings to the broadcaster who will pass same to a board of critics and if approved by this board, have the piece sold outright to the Theatrical association.

This would obviate the necessity of the composer submitting his music to outside publishers and stimulate local interest.

For instance, one local composer, copyrighted and submitted direct to the radio public a march entitled
