TESTS SHOW NO TUBERCULOSIS IN VALLEYVIEW DIST.

The first day of T. B. readings of the cow tests gave very good satisfaction as the entire Valley View community was tested without finding a reactor or even a suspicious animal.

It is hoped that the present drive will find all sections of the valley as free from the dreaded disease.

Testing work is being completed in the southern part of the valley first and will continue north. All cow owners should watch the papers for notice of the presence of the tester in your community and keep your cows tied up and in readiness to avoid the loss of time for testing.

Testing is being done by a federal inspector, Dr. G. D. Bishop, working in cooperation with the county agent's office. The work is free at this time and testing will be compulsory in cases where milk is sold.

When Medford is reached with the work the city will be divided in sections for gathering the cows to certain designated points. Announcement will be made later as to the location.

ASTORIA DESTROYED BY FIRE

missing. W. H. Fellman, furniture dealer, who had been reported dead earlier in the morning, later was found to be safe.

The fire was discovered in the Palace restaurant on Commercial street between Eleventh and Twelfth streets, in the heart of the business district and it quickly spread to adjoining buildings, leaping across the street to the Rex Hire department store. It spread from Commercial street to Bond street.

Fire Department Hampered. The local fire department was hampered by lack of sufficient water and apparatus and a call was sent at 3:23 for aid from Portland. In response to this appeal a special train with two fire companies and full equipment including 4000 feet of hose, arrived here at 4 a. m.

Dynamite was resorted to and failed to check the sweep of the flames. Most of the buildings destroyed were of frame construction, but some of the city's substantial structures of brick also were among those razed. The brick buildings wrecked were the Astoria Savings bank, four stories, Weinhard hotel, six stories, the Astoria Budget, Elks Temple, Astoria National bank, Staples Motor company, Savoy Motor company and Railroad drygoods store.

Rain was falling when the fire broke out and there was no wind. The rain stopped after about two hours but resumed after an intermission of half an hour.

Guests at the hotels in the fire swept area were warned in time to escape in safety, according to reports to fire fighters.

The fire at nine o'clock had swept the entire district between Astor street at the river front, south to Exchange street and north and south between Eighth and Sixteenth streets. Between Eleventh and Twelfth it had penetrated as far as Franklin street.

Fire Chief C. E. Foster said the fire got out of control because the flames got hold underneath the buildings and burned through the piling on which the city was built. He said the fact that the piling had not been fitted in as the city was built, was the cause of the disaster. All the streets in the devastated area have collapsed with the burning of the piling.

All the docks were saved.

ASTORIA, Ore., Dec. 8.—Astoria, whose business district was swept by fire early today, is located at the mouth of the Columbia river. The principal industries are lumbering, shipping and salmon fishing and canning. The city had a population of 14,927, according to the 1920 census. The business section of the city is built along the river bank and a large part of it is on piling. The residence district is on high ground.

Astoria was established more than a century ago as a trading post and was named in honor of John Jacob Astor, pioneer trader whose agents were active at the post.

Red Cross Aid Promised. WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The American Red Cross today telegraphed Colonel George Flinn, its Pacific coast division manager with headquarters at San Francisco to make an investigation of the fire at Astoria, Oregon, with the view of giving relief, if found necessary.

SEATTLE, Dec. 8.—The Seattle Chamber of Commerce is prepared to rush any assistance to the stricken city. Frank Waterhouse, president of the chamber said in a radio message to the mayor of Astoria.

"Please let us know what we can do," the message said.

cation to continue in control of the Central Pacific be denied, so that this development could be brought about. Mr. Biddle described the growth of southern California, which he has visited every year since Los Angeles was a city of 11,000 population. The growth of that section, he stated, started with the advent of the Santa Fe, augmented later by the construction of other lines, both steam and electric. Joint usage of Central Pacific trackage in California and Oregon he believed would result in the construction of various lines that would open up additional territory and this he predicted would be of financial interest to the Southern Pacific as well as whatever other lines used these tracks.

Tonnage Declared Ample. There is plenty of tonnage in sight to sustain two competitive railroads such as the Southern Pacific and the Central Pacific with the Natron cut-off completed, F. M. Bramwell testified.

"The possibilities of development along the territory that would be taken care of by the Natron cut-off, can hardly be estimated," he said.

"There are almost untold possibilities there in agriculture, livestock and this vast amount of timber to be taken up in my judgment, the Natron cut-off would be furnished tonnage from the ineffectiveness of its operation to make it profitable and the natural growth and development of the country."

A. Spencer, general counsel for the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company, drew from the witnesses a statement that in wide circulation in southern Oregon on both sides of the Cascades he had

found farmers and business men generally clamoring for an independent Central Pacific. Here Mr. Spencer placed in the record a bundle of resolutions and petitions urging Southern Pacific-Central Pacific separation.

ment came to the farmer, and it will not be a readjustment fit to abide until he is relieved. The distress brought to the farmer does not affect him alone. Agricultural ill fortune is a national ill fortune.

Again and again the president was applauded as he outlined his recommendations to the senate and house members assembled in joint session in the hall of the house. His hearers responded particularly to his discussion of rural credits and the Americanization of aliens.

There was a craning of necks when the president launched into his discussion of prohibition enforcement and some of his declarations on the subject—that suggesting that rigorous and literal enforcement of the dry law would concentrate public attention on any requisite modification, was applauded.

This congress already has taken

cognizance of the misfortune which precipitate deflation brought to American agriculture. Your measures of relief and the reduction of the federal reserve discount rate undoubtedly saved the country from widespread disaster. The very proof of helpfulness already given is the strongest argument for the permanent establishment of widened credits, heretofore temporarily extended through the war finance corporation.

The farm loan bureau, which already has proven its usefulness through the federal land banks, may well have its powers enlarged to provide ample farm production credits

as well as enlarged land credits. It is entirely practical to create a division in the federal land banks to deal with production credits with the limitations of time so adjusted to the farm turn over as the federal reserve system provides for the turnover in the manufacturing and mercantile world. Special provision must be made for livestock production credits and the limit of land loans may be safely enlarged. Various measures are pending before you, and the best judgment of congress ought to be expressed in a prompt enactment at the present session.

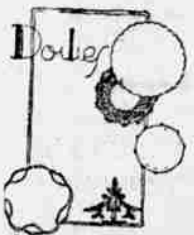
