RILEY MAKES BIG ORATORICAL HIT AT FORUM LUNCH

Frank Branch Riley, famous author and lecturer appeared before a record-breaking crowd at the Chamber of Commerce forum luncheon this noon at the Hotel Medford and gave his listeners a tantalizing whiff of what they may expect in the way of entertainment and humor judiciously combined with education at the Presbyterian church tonight.

"Pop" Gates presided over the meeting and introduced the speaker, after the forum members in the outer dining room had brought their chairs to a point of vantage. The attendance was larger than it has been for any forum meeting in months past.

Mr. Riley opened his address with the remark that he thought it would be beneficial if the members of other civic organizations all over the north-west could come to Medford and receive periodical inoculations of Medford enthusiasm. From this point on his entire address was interrupted by bursts of applause and laughter and at the conclusion of his speech, although he had spoken over time, the listeners were reluctant to allow him to be seated and the applause lasted for several minutes.

Mr. Riley explained that the tour-latt is the forerunner of industrial development and that the man who comes to the northwest for recreation will be the one to see the business possibilities of this vast region.

"His aim, he declared, is to make the easterner realize that he is safe from Indians in the west at the present time if he keeps out of the way of their automobiles, that there is snow on the mountains the year around, that the Columbia River does not empty into Puget Sound and that there are hotels and railroads west of the Ohio river."

Mr. Riley told of his visits in the east and of the eastern scenic wonders which he visited, notably "Eagle Top," rising twelve hundred feet above the Hudson and Crestview, nearly as high. He stated that he was advised to bring his mountaineering tools to make the ascent of these two mountains. When he characterized the scenery of the northwest as "adult" scenery and the mountains

The duet was arranged on the spur of the moment when someone suggested jokingly that the two sing. The song was one of the Medford booster songs and when Mr. Riley sang the line stating that Portland had no charms for him he crossed his fingers and held them up that all might see.

A resolution that the board of directors of the chamber make a \$20 donation to the community Christmas tree passed unanimously.

Following Mr. Riley's speech the meeting adjourned. Mayor Gates proffered the thanks of the assembly to the speaker and expressed his regrets that the speech was not of longer duration. Mr. Riley addressed the high school student body this afternoon.

POST-SEASON GAME NOW UP TO SCOTT HIGH SCHOOL TEAM

Although it is not yet definitely known that Scott high school of Toledo will make a trip to the west to play Medford on New Year's day, "Shy" Huntington, University of Oregon football coach arrived this morning accompanied by Mrs. Huntington, and will take the Medford high school football eleven in charge.

"Shy" visited the sick room of Eddie Durno this morning and had a long talk with the Medford coach who is enthusiastic over the game and who is convalescing rapidly from the operation performed on him Monday for appendicitis.

Portland required that Medford guarantee \$1500 for a game with Scott here on New Year's day. This was done and the Washington high school coach in Portland was so informed by wire yesterday morning. He stated last night over the telephone that Portland would not guarantee \$3500 despite efforts he had made to have Portland civic clubs get behind the proposition and that he had wired Scott high of Toledo the following terms to this effect: "Portland will give you 60 per cent of gate receipts from Christmas day game on Multnomah field; Medford guarantees you \$1500 for New Year's Day game. Come on." Up until press time this afternoon no answer to the above terms had been received from Toledo. It is necessary that the Toledo team be assured of \$5000 from two games on the coast.

W. A. Briscoe, superintendent of Ashland schools called Superintendent A. G. Smith here this morning and stated that he wished to offer his sympathy in regard to Durno's illness. He stated that if Medford could in any way be benefitted by the services of Coach Walter Hughes of the Ashland high school that Hughes was willing to come and help out and that the Ashland school authorities would be pleased if they could be of service.

Mr. Smith replied that "Shy" Huntington was here and had taken charge of the team but that in any way it should occur that the services of Mr. Hughes could be used to advantage that Medford would not hesitate to accept Ashland's kind offer with gratitude both to the school officials and to Hughes personally.
