



'STRANG.' LEWIS RETAINS TITLE ZBYSZKO HURT

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 15.—(By the Associated Press.)—Youth triumphed over age, and today Ed (Strangler) Lewis of San Jose, Calif., champion, retained his laurels, having defeated Stanislaus Zbyszko, former champion, in a match for the heavyweight wrestling championship of the world here last night. The champion won the second and third falls after losing the first.

Zbyszko, 43 years old, a native of Poland, and prominent mat man for many years past, attempted to regain the title which Lewis won from him at Wichita, Kas., last year, but instead the champion won permanent possession of a diamond studded belt presented by Tex Rickard of New York. Lewis has been victorious in three contests in which the emblem of wrestling supremacy has been at stake.

The challenger found an opening and obtained the first fall by turning Lewis over his shoulders and pinning him to the canvas.

The champion's painful headlock laid Zbyszko low for the second fall. The challenger previously had suffered a dislocation of the right shoulder as a result of several toe holds applied by Lewis. Lewis won the third and decisive fall with an arm lock around the injured shoulder of his opponent.

The men wrestled before the largest crowd that has ever witnessed a sporting event at the Coliseum, approximately 12,000 persons attending. Receipts were around the \$16,000 mark. Lewis received \$7,500 and Zbyszko's share was \$2,500.

Gibbons vs. Mike Tonight

ST. PAUL, Dec. 15.—Old rivals, Tommy Gibbons and Billy Mike, St. Paul heavyweights, are scheduled to box ten rounds to a judge's decision here tonight. Victory for Gibbons by a knockout, is predicted by his manager, Eddie Kane.

"I'll admit that Gibbons is the better boxer, but I am a better fighter," was Mike's rejoinder to Kane's prediction. "I have fought them all and have been stopped only once, by Jack Dempsey."

Descamps Quits Again

PARIS, Dec. 15.—Francis Descamps in a letter published by Le Matin today, says it will be impossible for him, as president of the managers' committee of the boxing federation, to agree to a Carpenter-Siki fight unless the disqualification against the latter is removed or the bout is specially authorized by the federation.

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—Charley White of Chicago and Ritchie Mitchell of Milwaukee, two of the foremost contenders for the lightweight title now held by Benny Leonard, will meet in a fifteen round bout in Madison Square Garden tonight.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 15.—Football coaches of the University of Southern California have submitted seven Pacific coast football experts to the Pennsylvania coach from which Hugo Bezdek, head coach is asked to select two to officiate at the annual east vs. west contest at Pasadena New Year's day. The Trojan coaches also will select two officials from a list to be submitted by Coach Bezdek.

The western officials suggested by Coach Elmer C. Henderson are Ed Klenholtz (Washington State College); George Varnell (Chicago); Sam Moyer (Franklin and Marshall); Glenn Whittle (Northwestern); Jack Wells (Occidental); Harry Minor (Nebraska) and Louis Foley (Ohio Wesleyan).

Football practice is being held every day by the Trojans. Hard workouts are to begin Monday.

Barrows for Contest
